### Says Confidence Need Of Moment

Hook Calls For Understanding Between Industry And Employees

New York (IPS)—Industry is in accord with many of the objectives of the administration but those objectives cannot be reached without confidence built on understanding between industry and its employees. Charles R. Hook, president of the American Rolling Mill Company, of Middletown, Ohio, told the Congress of American Industry at its recent meeting here.

"We know from experience," he said, speaking on the subject of employment relations, "that we can no more legislate peace, happiness and understanding in our industrial relations than we can promote love, consideration and affection in the family through the enactment of law. These things can come only through co-operation and there can be no real co-operation until there is first confidence built upon a foundation of understanding."

"It is not enough to have understanding and confidence between the employer and the employee; there must be understanding, if there is to be confidence, between government and industry."

Mr. Hook said that after more than 32 years' experience with employee representation in his organization, he is convinced "the vast majority of American workmen are far-sighted."

"They want to do the right thing," he said, "and they will if they understand the various elements surrounding each situation affecting their personal well-being. I have heard but few complaints from the men when decisions were rendered contrary to their wishes and when at the same time they were given all the facts and told why that particular decision was necessary. On the other hand, problems of very minor consequence have resulted in ill feeling when they were not properly explained and discussed. Essentially it is a matter of understanding."
