## Editorial

### RUBBISH REMOVAL

While reading an article in a small town weekly, recently, concerning a rubbish removal system, it was brought to mind that such a system would be a great thing for East Haven.

The plan would request residents of the town to place their rubbish and ashes on the curbing in front of their homes on the day designated for collection in their vicinity.

The town's part would include the forming of a schedule, wherefore each district or section of the town would be covered on a certain day each week and to supply a truck for the collection.

This rubbish could be used for filling-in purposes, such as meadows, swamps, etc.

Through such a system, disease, mosquito-breeding haunts and the blowing of papers about the lawns of residents would be somewhat eliminated. It is most probable that our Health Officer would be in a favor of such a plan as this.

**Making Roquefort Cheese**  
The process of making Roquefort cheese includes inoculating the curd with a mold grown in loaves of bread. The bread finally becomes a mass of mold in the spore stage. This is dried, ground to a powder, and sprinkled over the curds as they drain.

**Women Withstand Cold**  
Women have different responses to temperature than men. They carry a padding of fat beneath the skin. This fat also acts as a heat insulating medium. It is for this reason that men would feel half frozen in cold weather if they dressed no more warmly than do their mothers, wives or daughters. The body uses all of its heat regulating mechanisms to adjust itself. If it fails to maintain its temperature within a range of two or three degrees above or below normal we are uncomfortable, and if the temperature varies within six or seven degrees above or below normal for any length of time death ensues.

### Prisoner Of Zenda

The best known of Anthony Hope's romances (1894), relates the picturesque adventures of Rudolf Rassendyll, an English gentleman, during a three months' sojourn in the Kingdom of Ruritania. He arrives upon the eve of the coronation of King Rudolf, whom he meets at Zenda Castle. In a drinking bout the king is drugged, and cannot be aroused to reach the capitol, Strelau, in time for the coronation. This treachery is the work of the king's brother, Duke Michael, who wishes to usurp the kingdom. To foil his designs, Colonel Sapt, and Fritz von Tarlenhem successfully assist Rassendyll to impersonate the king. He is crowned, plays his part without serious blunders, and then sets about accomplishing the king's release—a task rendered dangerous and difficult by the cunning and prowess of Michael and his followers. Rassendyll loves and is loved by the Princess Flavia. She is also beloved by the king and his brother. Only the release of the accomplished in a series of dashing dramatic episodes—prevents Rassendyll from wedding Flavia. The story is told with wonderful vim and spirit, and with a freshness and healthfulness of feeling remarkable in an era of morbid fiction. The novel has been dramatized into a successful play of the same name. (Readers' Digest)

## THE PEARL OF THE EAST

How many times I crossed that bridge in the Malate district of Manila and thought of the second "shot heard round the world" that was fired there. While I was living in the bamboo barracks of the Manila Expedition, I crossed that bridge three times a day for my meals. I was eating in a Chinese restaurant just beyond the bridge at the time. The restaurant was on that side of the bridge occupied by the Filipino army at the time of the outbreak of the Insurrection. Then, in the years that followed came war of the most desperate character. The soldiers of the Filipino army received no pay, usually no uniforms, provided their own ponies, ammunition, and often, muskets or bolos. Our own Revolutionary army was far better treated. I am making this statement as a premise as I shall draw a conclusion from this and other premises later. No one who was not in the Pearl of the East in those pioneer and terrible days, can even guess at the warfare that followed. The American army officials then there were so far from Washington that communication was slow and they had to work on their own initiative. Great mistakes were made by both sides because of lack of knowledge of facts. Had the truth been known on both sides there might have been no uprising. Years of the bitterest struggle ensued and the human suffering thereby caused was unspeakable. Really, friends were fighting friends. Luzon was the principal battleground and the vicinity of Manila, the chief center.

## What's What In BUILDING CONSTRUCTION

### SUPERVISING SMALL HOME CONSTRUCTION

Face plates come in a variety of finishes. The usual metal plate stocked is of brush brass and it should be used where hard usage is given. The bakelite plate comes in different colors to match the woodwork, mahogany, walnut, etc. These will not break if of good quality and applied properly by the electrician. If the plugs, switches etc. proper are not aligned correctly in the boxes, if the wall surface is not even, or if the face of the box is not flush with the wall face, pulling results and a half turn too much of the screw which holds them will cause them to crack with usage, if not at the time they are being applied. Then there are chromium plates and mirror plates for the bath and kitchen and ivory plates for the colonial effect with papered walls. All of these plates come in different makes and grades and they should be inspected before applied and proper selection made. Possibly not in line of inspection, are presented: so that the home owner may have a fairly good idea of the newer accessories and of those things which the specifications should include. He will therefore be better equipped to know what to look for and in any case, all of the equipment mentioned should be scrutinized before allowed as part of the electrical system.
