Capitol City Reduces Record From 22 To 10 Within Year.

Hartford achieved the best comparative record of any of the larger Connecticut municipalities in traffic fatality reductions during the first eleven months of this year as compared with the same period last year. The capital city shows a reduction from a total of twenty-two (22) traffic deaths as of December 1, 1936 to a total of ten (10) for the corresponding period this year. Thirty-nine communities, according to a tabulation made public today by Commissioner Michael A. Connor of the State Department of Motor Vehicles, show a clean slate for the first eleven months of 1936 and 1937; fifty-two show reductions for 1937 over 1936; fifty-five are debited with increases for 1937 over 1936; while in twenty-three instances there were no changes in the fatality record for 1947 over 1936 as of December 1st.

Twenty-eight of the communities charged with increased fatalities for 1937 had no fatalities charged against them for the first eleven months of 1936 so that whatever the increase is this year the figure represents the total fatalities for 1937. In most instances it is a small debit. Nineteen of the towns credited with reductions for 1937 over 1936 have reported no traffic fatalities at all this year so that the reduction figure represents the deaths charged against them last year. These tabulations show the locations of fatal accidents. Another list is being prepared by the Commissioner giving the residences of the operators causing these fatal accidents.

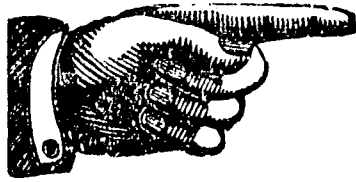
Mr. R. J. Healey Addresses High School Students

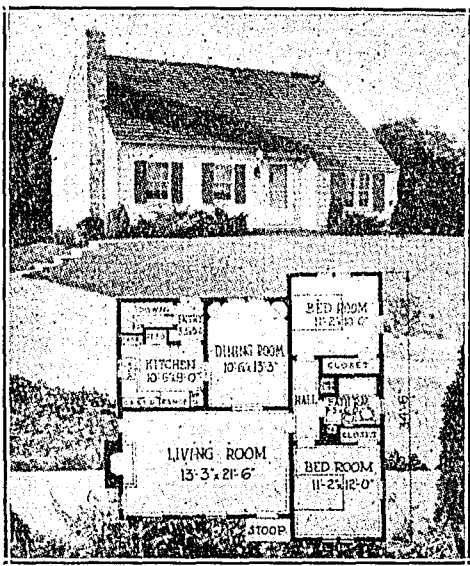

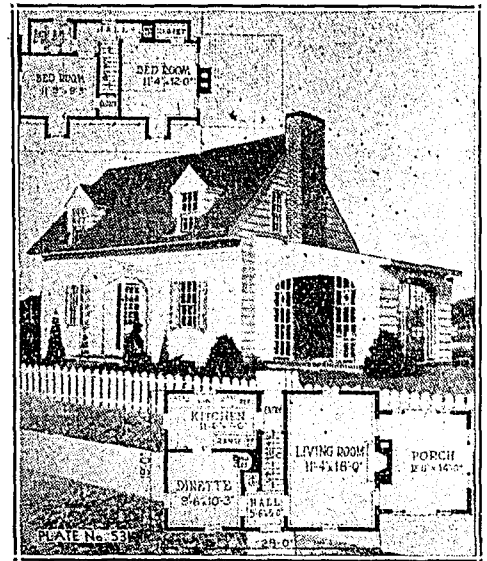

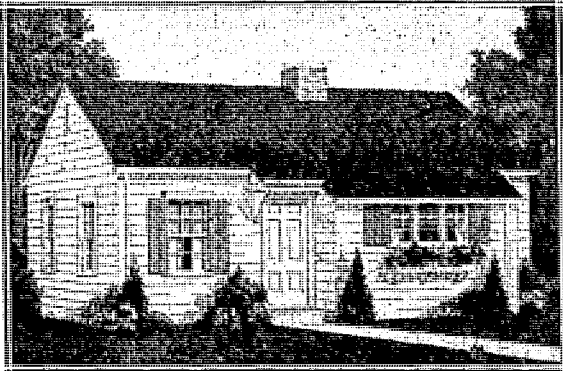
