## Conn. D. A. R. To Send Student To Washington Miss Phyliss Freer To **Compete For Trip**

The Connecticut Daughters of the American Revolution are again furthering a plan for the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage to Washton. They will take as their guest on this pilgrimage one girl from the senior class of a Connecticut High School. The girl must excel in dependability, service, leadership and patriotism.

Last year Miss Janet Daniels of East Haven High School won the good citizenship medal which was given to each girl approved by her class and teachers. Seventy-two schools in Connecticut competed for the trip. This year Miss Phyliss Freer has received the honor and it is hoped that she might win the trip. The names shall be drawn under the supervision of the Commissioner of Education. In case the girl whose name is drawn first is unable to go, the second in line may take her place in the Pilgrimage.

Will Include Sites

The trip will include a visit to the Library of Congress where the Harold B. Grist; Two year Vestry-Declaration of Independence will be shown, a visit to the White Hoare, August F. Schmittgall, Archie gonvernmental departments, Arlington, Mount Vernon and other Minott C. Prout, Frank H. Stoddard; points of interest. 

Connecticut's legislature in its January session of 1937 repealed what was generally known as the "guest law," thereby subjecting motorists who give rides to hitchhikers to even more danger of legal suits for damages resulting from accidents than was the case in recent years. | turing woman who has become one The repeal returned the motoring public to the situation existing years ago when damage suits were frequent because the law permitted "guests" of an automobile owner to sue the owner-operator without having to prove "intentional" negligence on the part of the driver.

Generally speaking, a guest in an automobile (and hitch-hikers come under the definition of guests), since the statute has been repealed, may now have an action at law based on ordinary negligence against the owner or driver of either or both cars which may be involved in a collision. This operates to give the thumber who has been injured in an accident the upper hand over the owner or operator who has befriended him on the highway.

SUPERVISING SMALL HOME CONSTRUCTION

Most any wood is fitted for nattural finish, that is, varnish, wax or shellac, without the use of stain, Some very beautiful finishes may be obtained in this way. The color scheme determines the selection of the wood trim in this case as well as the furniture and different woods may be used in each room if so desired. Almost any wood is proper for natural finish except possibly white pine, spruce or fir but Arkansaw pine, or so-called knotty pine, is very beautiful when finished natural and especially proper when the scheme is Colonal in character.

For floors, oak is the usual wood used either white or red. The white is harder and will usually give better wear than the red and if clear grade will be lighter in color.

For a white, hard wearing floor, maple may be used. This makes a very beautiful floor for the home. As a rule it is used for dance floors and factory floors where hard wearing flooring is essential, and due to this custom it has been more or less overlooked as a floor. ing for the home.


