Cold Weather Hints For Motorists

By C. R. Strouse Director, School of Automobiles, International Correspondence Schools


Do not add water to the battery in freezing weather unless you run the engine for at least a half hour to mix the electrolyte. Otherwise the water may freeze and crack the battery case. Even if you are lucky enough to escape a cracked ase, the result is likely to be serious injury to the battery. injury to the battery,

Spark plugs should be checked and cleaned at least twice each winter. Even though the fuel system is working perfectly, a hot spark is needed to fire it in cold weather. A weak plug, or one not working properly for any reason, may cause you to waste as much as one gallon of gasoline out of every ten that you buy.

A light over film of coston eil on

A light, even film of castor oil on the windshield will keep it free of ice during winter storms. A handy device for applying the oil can be made by forcing a tight roll of fian-nel into a small screw-cap glass jar. Saturate the flannel with the oil and keep the cap screwed on when not in use.
