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HATS IN COURT

Magistrates in England are divided on the question whether a woman who appears without a hat in a court of justice is showing disrespect to the majesty of the law. According to the secretary of the Magistrates' Association, there is "no legal basis for insisting that a woman must wear a hat in court"; so that, apparently, "On with her hat!" is as much the expression of a whim of authority as was "Off with her head!" in another famous court.

THE UMBRELLA MUSEUM

What is probably the only Umbrella Museum was recently opened at Olignevs, a small village in North Italy. It has been built on a hillside with a slight south-west. It has failed to capture the most famous of all umbrellas, the "Chamberlain" of Munich. That is a loss not to be made good, and, indeed, one cannot call to mind other historic specimens with a wide celebrity that, if they were in, might compose the Museum.

WHAT TO DO?

All is not well at the New York World's Fair. Everyone admits that it is a grand show and an exhilarating picture of the World of Tomorrow. In short, it has lived up to its physical and artistic potentialities. But, in two different ways, the Fair is not fulfilling its promise. First, it is not being viewed by many who would like to and need to see it. Second, it is not making the grand financial, chiefly due to lack of attendance. And if New York's Fair does not cover its costs, it will be a long time before any lesser city will dare appear as a similar spectacle.

News Item: \$25 per cent of the national income of the United States goes to workers and the self-employed.

It is considered a success. But so far, in two and one-half months, total attendance has been only a little over 13 million. At this rate, the Fair will play to about half the audience anticipated, and it will fail to pay for itself.
