CARE OF THE NAILS

The nails are protection for the nderlying nerves terminating at the ends of the toes. Extreme care them so that their purpose is not defeated. Ingrown nails are the result of improper cutting on the part of inexperienced people, followed in many cases by the pressure of short stockings, short shoes or both. It may be perfectly proper to round toe nails should be straight across. not rounded at the corners and not horter than the flesh at the ends of the toes.




