Corcoran-Sundquist Post Arranges Defense Rally For Armistice Program

Annual Parade November 9—Robert Richardson, Marshal—Services At Cenotaph—Organizations Asked To March—Prominent Speaker Expected.

Due to the pressure of national defense activities Corcoran-Sundquist Post, American Legion, has planned a Defense Rally at the Community House Armistice Night, November 11 at 8 o'clock.

The meeting will be called to order by William Kremer, Commander of the post. The program will include advancing of the colors, prayer by the chaplain, silence in honor of departed comrades, preamble to the American Legion Constitution, singing of America, Medley of World War songs by the orchestra, address, song, God Bless America, National Anthem, retiring of colors, Dancing will follow. The entire program will be given without charge and anyone interested is invited.

Refreshments will be sold during the dance and the proceeds deposited in the American Legion relief fund.

As is the custom, Corcoran-Sundquist post will hold an annual Armistice Day Parade, Sunday, November 9th has been chosen and Robert Richardson will be marshal. A bombshell burst in the ranks of the Branford Drama Club on Tuesday evening. To say that they are starting the season off with a bang is putting it mildly. Under the leadership of Scott Buckley, newly elected president and director of the club the plans are for producing four plays each year with the first to be presented early in December. It is the fervent hope of the group to present to drama lovers of Branford a series of plays each year that will awaken an interest that has lain dormant for some time. The first of these is a riotous comedy that left Broadway theatre goers in stitches—the screamingly funny "Meet Uncle Sully." As we go to press with this edition Branford is talking about the new regime in the Branford Drama Club.

Officers Elected

Along with Mr. Buckley as president, John Mooney was elected vice-president, Olive Olson secretary and Beverly Rice treasurer. Mr. Buckley a new-comer to the group has had many years of experience in dramatics, both amateur and professional in New York City, along with several years of radio production with the Columbia Broadcasting System. It is the earnest desire of the group to gain for itself, not only local interest in their endeavors, but statewide and even national recognition, thereby putting Branford on the map in a big way. Mr. Buckley feels that this rehabilitated group is really going places in the field of drama this year and next and bears watching. Some of the plays that are under consideration for the club in 1942 is "Outward Bound," by Sutton Vane, which was very successfully produced in London and New York in 1923 and revived at the Playhouse in New York City on December 22, 1938, by a company including Lauretta Taylor, Florence Reed, Helen Chandler and Bramwell Fletcher, and again it became an overnight hit, "Lavender and Old Lace," a recent presentation to Broadway, starring Karloff, and "Personal Appearance."

One of the most popular and colorful musical organizations in existence today, the U. S. Marine Band through its concerts, has a definite educational value and is a potent agency for promoting patriotic pride, which in view of existing world conditions, is of paramount importance at this time.

Stirring marches, popular numbers and symphonic overtures are included on the program arranged by Capt. William F. Santelmann, who is conceded by critics to be one of the finest program arrangers. While Capt. Santelmann's programs comprise strictly first-class music, they are so well balanced that they are never heavy or dull. They are wide in their appeal and include not only standard symphonic works, arranged for concert band, but novelties as well. 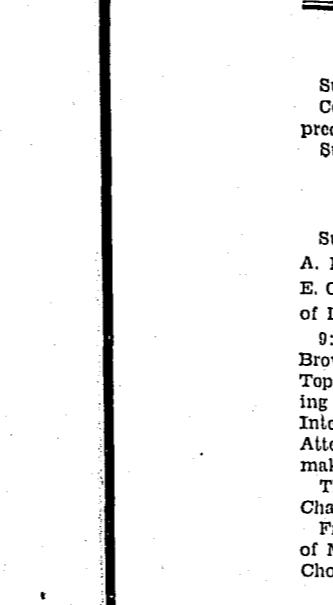

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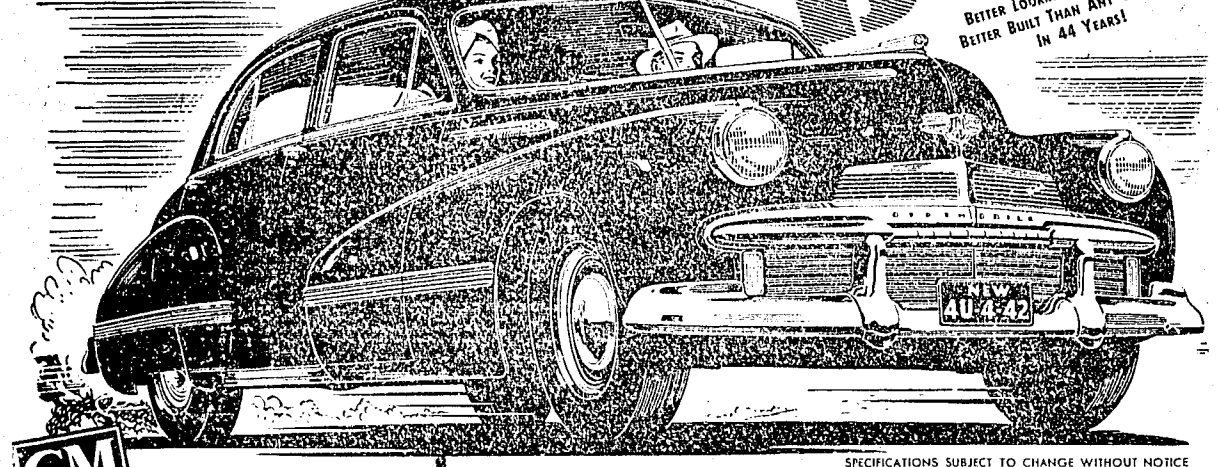

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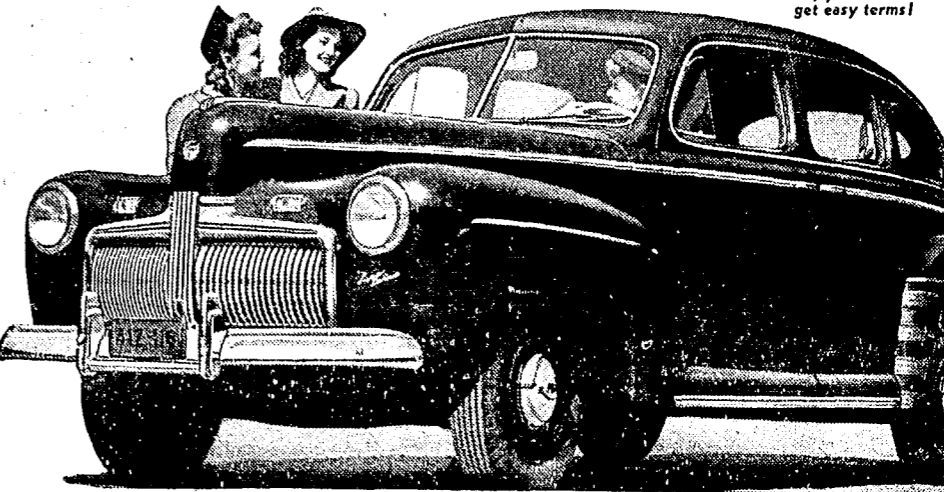
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
