Rutgers Strong Favorites To Defeat Huskies Saturday

The loss of Bob Harris, star sophomore left halfback, due to an injury received in Saturday's Rhode Island game, seriously cripples the University of Connecticut football squad in its preparation for the Rutgers game on the 15th. For the Rutgers game on the 15th, Harris received a severe knee injury when he was blocked as he was coming down the field after one of his usual brilliant punts. He definitely will be able to play in the game on Saturday. Ray Scussell who has been playing right half-back all year immediately took over his assignment at left and his kicking, passing and running while he remained in the game as an outstanding feature of the Connecticut attack. He has been converted to the left halfback post during the week and should hold up in Harris' assignments very well. The work of John Toffano at all the backfield positions during the Rhode game was another encouraging feature and he is the logical choice to take over the right half back post where in games only only a fine ability in combining ground and punting play but is equally adept at blocking and offensive work. Earl DeCarli, 200-lb. fullback, and Gene Kovacs a left halfback who has been available as a kicker and passer over the past several weeks have both returned to the squad this week after being out of uniform due to injuries and other pressures in the Rutgers game should help a lot. The probable starting backfield will consist of: Co-Captain "Pete" Mohr at quarter; Ray Scussell at left half; John Toffano at right half and Joe Perko at fullback.

Legal Notice

NOTICE TO THOSE LIABLE TO PAY OLD AGE ASSISTANCE TAXES:

The tax collector wishes to call attention to the fact that a large number of taxpayers failed to pay their old age assistance tax during the month of February, 1941. The law requires that these taxes be paid, and the Town has to pay the State its proportion even if they are not collected.

The law provides that if these taxes are not paid, the tax collector shall turn over the names of such delinquent taxpayers to the prosecuting attorney who shall issue a complaint and cause such delinquent taxpayer to be arrested and brought before the court. This of course will result in additional costs which will have to be paid by the taxpayer.

The tax collector therefore urges all taxpayers who are delinquent to see that these taxes are paid before December 1, 1941, because after that date the law will be complied with and warrants issued.

permits so that permits of such persons can be revoked. The date of expiration of the 1941 certificates is May 1, 1942. The expiration date was chosen because of Federal approval procedures for interstate shippers.

The names of all approved out-of-state shellfish dealers who may sell in Connecticut, as well as Connecticut shellfish dealers shipping interstate, appear on the list published periodically by the United States Public Health Service in Washington. Each interstate shellfish dealer has a numbered certificate approved by the Federal authorities and each shipment of his shellfish should be accompanied by a tag or other mark of identification with the name and certificate number of the dealer. The bureau of sanitary engineering of this department would be glad to check up on any out-of-state dealers for local health officers upon request to see whether their names are on the list of the United States Public Health Service. Certificates in all states must be renewed annually and at least and at least annually check-ups of dealers are desirable.

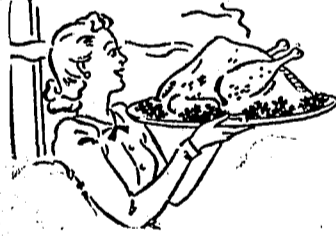

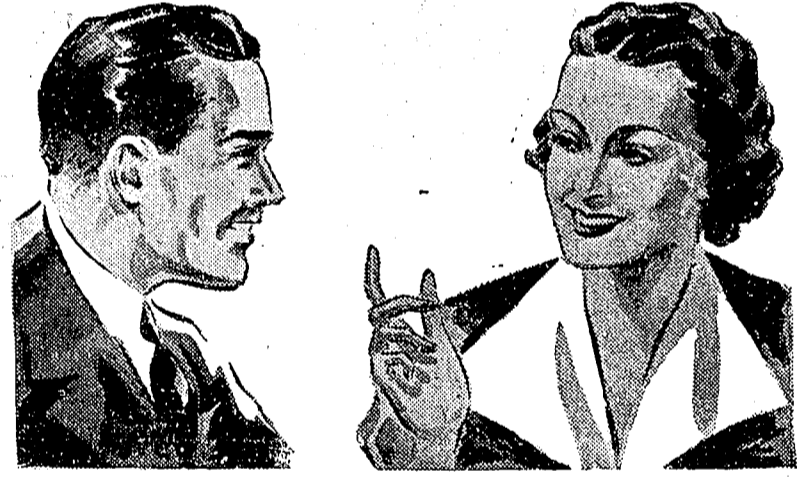
