Annual Adjourned Town Meeting Is Scheduled For Monday Morning

Meeting in Community House at Ten O'Clock Will Decide Routine Business of Town of Branford—Will Consider Report and Recommendation of Board of Finance

Notice has been given to all Branford legal voters that an adjourned town meeting will be held Monday morning, October 12, at 10 o'clock in the Community House.

Among the business matters to be transacted is to act upon the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, department of welfare, boards of education, police, and park; tax collector and civilian defense.

The next item to be considered is the report and recommendation of the Board of Finance and to make appropriations for town expenses for the year 1942-1943.

Item five is to act on the use of funds allotted by the State, under the provisions, 1935 cumulative Supplement to the General Statutes of Connecticut. Another item is to determine when tax on property shall be payable and in what installments, and to authorize and empower the Town Treasurer to borrow whatever money may be necessary to pay the expenses of the Town, interest charges, such notes, bonds and any other obligations of the Town which may become due and payable within the ensuing year, and to withdraw from the sinking fund sufficient sums to pay any bond or bonds, or bonds of the Town of Branford, refunding bonds Series of 1923, which may mature during the ensuing year and to transfer to the Road Bond Sinking Fund Account from an appropriate revenue, such sums as may be necessary to meet contributions from the State to retire road bonds; and to withdraw from the sinking fund such sum or sums as may be necessary to pay Road Bonds of the Town of Branford maturing during the year 1942 to 1943.

ASSOCIATED BUSINESS APPROVES HONOR ROLL

Through the efforts of the Associated Business of Branford the town will get into step with other communities and erect an honor roll, probably on the Green, to honor the Branford Boys in military service, approximately 800.

Oldest Mason Born In 1844 In Branford

John O. Rowland died Monday in the Masonic Home hospital, Wallingford, at the age of 98. He had the distinction of being the oldest member of the Masons in the state of Connecticut, having joined 77 years ago.

He was born in Branford, January 29, 1844, the son of John Rogers and Mary Ann Rowland and at the age of 21 became a member of Adelphi Lodge, 63, A. F. & A. M., of New Haven, of which he has been a member ever since.

In 1901 he was elevated to the highest office in the gift of the blue lodge being made most worshipful grand master of the Grand Lodge of Masons in Connecticut.

He was superintendent of the Masonic Home for several years and after retiring lived in Florida returning to the Masonic Home hospital as a patient last year.

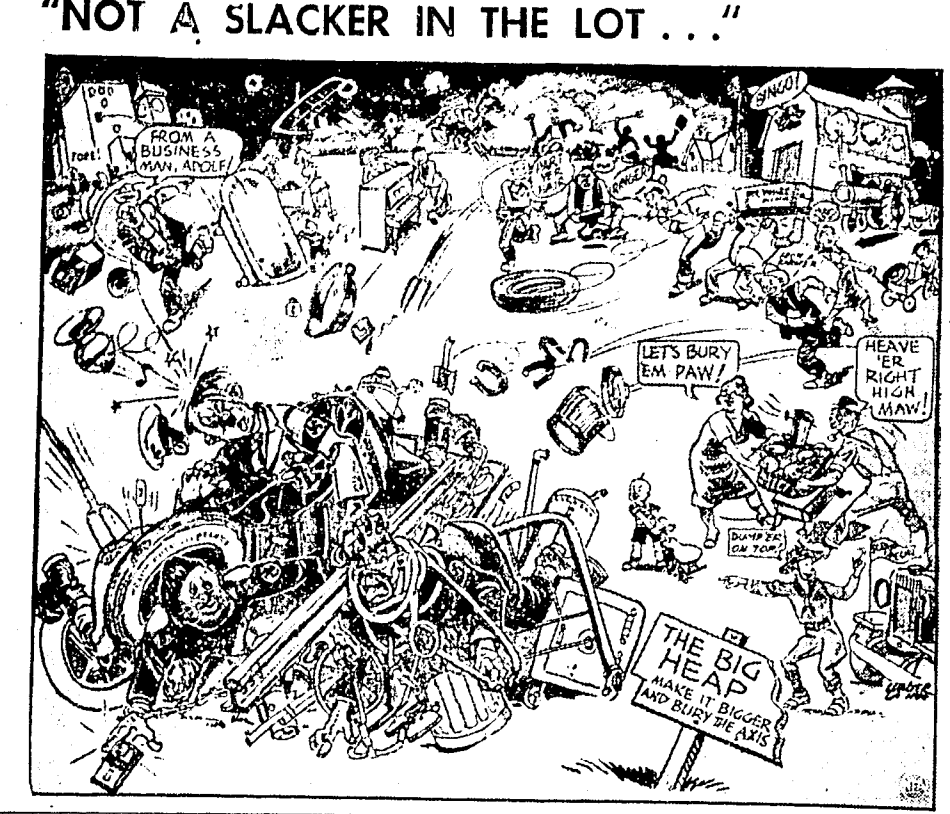

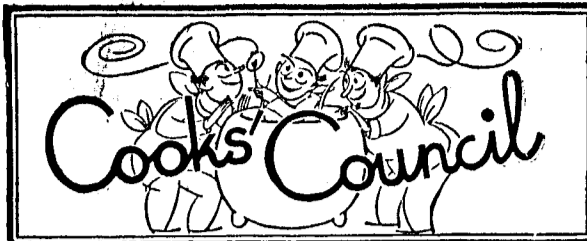

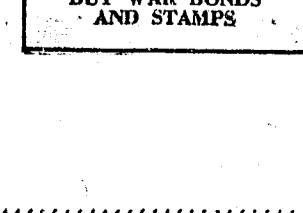
