In Old Lyme Fat Collections Are Increasing

Chairman Says "Lack Of Fats Was One Of The Causes Of The Downfall Of Germany In The Last War."

Preliminary reports reveal that ollections of used household fats for salvage have increased over a hundred per cent in many localitles since the recent OPA regulation allowing extra ration points for used fats. Alexander Williams Director of Information of the American Fat Salvage Committee, 247 Park Avenue, announced,

Mr. Williams said this respons had been most gratifying to the War Production Board and Donald M. Nelson, Chairman, had sent the following letter to the American Fat Salvage Committee:

"Many of us in the War Produc tion Board are watching with a good deal of interest the results that are being obtained from the points-for-fats program put in offect by the Office of Price Administration December 13.

"Preliminary reports coming to used fats from households, indi-cate that receipts will be substanlially increased", Mr. Nelson said. "WPB's functions in war production and the maintenance of civilian supplies make it acutely aware of the need for fats. Besides their

importance as food, fats are indispensable throughout the entire structure of industry", Mr. Nelson said. "Fats are needed in the production of explosives, medicines, protective coatings, plastics, lubricants, synthetic rubber, soap, and many other invaluable products.

"We have obtained clearance rom the Army and Civil Air Patrol for staging a daylight test by the dropping of imitation bombs from planes on Sunday, January 16, 1944.

"This trial should provide a good test of the degree of efficiency maintained by the Civilian Defense rganization and is being held in line with the stated policy of the Army that the organization should be continued on the alert and mobilization status, in readiness and prepared for the unexpected."

Simulating an air attack, 50 Civil Air Patrol plans will bomb tarat the first meeting of the new year towns with some cities and designating various kinds of hombs on Sunday afternoon, January 16, State War Administrator Harold F. Woodcock said today, Civilian defense personnel will be alerted in every community and participate in the mock raid which has been approved by Army officials.

to Mr. Casey. During the blitz in London, he wrote a story referring to "bombs bursting in air." The censor was upset. There hadn't been any bombs bursting in air, he said. And if they had burst in air, that would have implied some sort of time fuse that might well be a military secret. Patiently, Mr. Casey explained that this was a line from a song called "The Star Spangled Banner" and that most Americans would understand the ref-erence. The censor cheerily removed his objection. "I'm getting more American every day," he commented.



The last war . . . remember? Silk shirts!

Pink ones, green ones, blue ones with white stripes-millions of

And silk stockings for the women-on legs that had never felt anything but cotton before.

Wrist watches . . . rings . . . bracelets . . . hand-tailored suits . . . ten-dollar felt hats . . . better, larger, sweller apartments.

Then it happened. 1918 and the Armistice. The war boom petered out. In factory after factory the wheels turn slower-slower-then stopped.

The cuffs on the silk shirts were frayed, and the colors faded . . . and the silk stockings were gone, and the rings and the watches were in pawn shops . . . and people moved back where they'd come from.

"Don't let it get you down, Bud! You can't hold this country back God's country! Don't sell America short-why, with our natural resources—and the way we work . . ."

So we started on the second lap, on the same circular track.

1923-1929. Prosperity. Nothing ever like it before in the world. Stocks-up 50 points in a week-thousands, millions-billions of dollars of profits-on paper.

Bootleggers . . . parties . . . automobiles . . . more silk shirts ... new suits ... radios, refrigerators, real estate, furniture, diamond rings, boats, shoes, hats. . . .

Then-1929 and crash again!

"Sorry, Mr. Jones more margin, or we'll have to sell you out . . . Dear Mr. Jones . . . unless you send us a check to cover two unpaid installments on your furniture . . . Dear Sir . . . in the hands of our attorneys unless . . . mortgages unpaid . . . worry . . . worry . . . sorry, Jones, better look around for a new job . . . no help wanted. . . ." Remember?

Bread lines . . . the Bonus Army . . . ex-soldiers selling apples on street corners . . . "Brother, can you spare a dime?" . . . stocks going down-down-business failures . . . suicides . . . relief . . . N. R. A. . . . W. P. A. . . . C. C. C. . . . and no jobs yet, and shoes. run down at the heels. And the kids lot-and "the lost generation. . . ."

How come? How did we get that way-again? Why did it happen here, when it couldn't happen here? Well, let's look back-let's see how it did happen.

Did we "miss it" in the early "thirties?" Did we "miss it" when some fifteen million men walked the street-camped out-lived in huts and shacks and lean-tos?
