The Treasury's new V-Mail War Bond certificate has been introduced in the Seventh War Loan for ear-round use in mailing greetngs overseas, making use of the theme ::another bond between us rom the folks back home."

Similar in purpose to the Christ-mas V-Mail Bond gift certificate used in the Sixth War Loan, the new certificate is overprinted in olack against a light green background on a standard V-Mail letter form. Besides providing tangible and authentic evidence of a War Bond gift, the piece can carry good wishes overseas for any occasion.

Purchasers of bonds as gifts fill n on the certificate the denomina ion, serial number, date of issue and the owner's name and home address as they appear on the real ond. The issuing agent will im print his validating stamp on the reproduction at the time he stamps the real bond. The buyer writes a personal message in the space provided on the certificate, adresses, stamps and mails it as he vould a regular V-Mail letter.

It is pointed out that the postal ervice does not deliver V-Mail between points within the continental United States. The certificate, therefore, is intended only for overseas mailing.
