## Farm River Clean-Up

First Selectman James J. Sullivan told THE NEWS this week that steps have been taken for the immediate cleaning up of Farm River following reports received from Senior State Sanitary Inspector J. Henry Giles from a survey made here Sept. 11.

Mr. Sullivan stated that the river shows evidence of pollution between the Boston Post road and the Sluice and that there is therefore potential danger from bathing in that area. South of the sluice the tidal water except at low tide renders the water comparatively safe in the opinion of the inspector.

PREVUES, VIEWS AND REVIEWS

### ELECTION DAY

Next Monday will be Election Day. East Haveners will go to the polls then, in the three voting districts, to decide who, the Republican nominees or the Democratic nominees, will comprise the Town Administration for the next two years. Both parties have nominated their tickets after free and open primaries and caucuses in accordance with the rules of the respective party organizations. They have chosen candidates well-fitted to carry on the town's business and manage the town's affairs. On Monday it will be the right and duty of every legal voter to go to the polls and cast his ballot in the manner in which he and he only chooses so to do.

In this or in any election there should be no slackers. We have just concluded a long war which has been fought to keep this country and all freedom-loving nations from a tyranny that would cancel out the rights which have been so many years in the shaping. It is the Democratic privilege of American citizens from the lowliest to the highest to have the final say as to who they will elect to be their leaders. The man or woman who fails to fulfill his or her duty as a citizen is not true to the trust which has been left to them at such terrific cost through the years.

This is not a presidential election nor are we electing state officers at this time. It is an election which concerns our town only. But it must not be forgotten that the tap roots back in the towns and cities furnish the life-giving elements that are the strength of state and nation.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

We don't suppose many East Haveners know it now, but when they enter the voting booths next Monday in the biennial town election they will be expected to vote yes or no to three proposed amendments to the State Constitution. These changes in our fundamental law must be passed upon by the voters of each of our towns and cities before they can become effective. Already the measures have passed the House by a majority vote and in the succeeding session both the House and Senate with two-thirds vote of each body as required.

The changes are important ones and the voters should enter the polling places with some knowledge of what the proposals are if they are to vote intelligently.

Perhaps the most controversial measure is that which will determine whether there will be a session of the General Assembly every year instead of once every two years as at present. There are arguments for and against this change and each side has vociferous proponents. As for us we can't see that it makes much difference. If there is special work to be done a special session is possible at any time.

Another of the three amendments would raise the remuneration paid to legislators from \$300 to \$600. It would seem that if legislators are to receive other remuneration than the honor of representing their fellow citizens on Capitol Hill this increase is little enough.

The remaining amendment would provide that the governor-elect be succeeded by the lieutenant-governor elect if the former were to fail for one reason or other to take office. It looks as if this might be a good arrangement in the event such a contingency ever arises.

### RATION BOARD MERGER

Although it will do no good, probably, we feel our voice should be raised in protest to the removal of our War Price and Rationing Board business to Branford where it will be consolidated with the rationing work of a few towns to the east. Personally, we shall enjoy doing business in Branford, we like the town, and have long felt that East Haven and its neighbor ought to have more interests in common. However in this instance we believe it would have been wiser had East Haven's rationing business been merged with the New Haven area. We base our protest then upon the inconvenience the change will bring to the more than 3,000 families who comprise our town.

It is easy enough for policy-makers in Washington and other distant places to look at a map and fix areas. We have observed how they do just this when they start carving up maps of Europe and Asia. This remote control process is not always good when we observe it from the strictly local angle. Here we know that East Haven is tied more closely to New Haven by reason of its public communications systems than it is to Branford or any of the towns to the East. Policy-makers in Mr. Chester Bowles' office cannot be expected to know this.

Take the matter of telephone expense as one item our 3,000 and more families must now face. East Haven as a part of the Greater New Haven exchange has free access to calls anywhere in the exchange area. But that does not include Branford. We face now a five cent charge every time we call the Ration Board. Then there is the trolley or bus fare to consider. A single-taken fare to New Haven as compared with the much higher fare to our neighbor town Branford. And the waste of time ought to clinch our argument, for our own satisfaction at any rate. Hundreds of East Haveners are in New Haven daily on business or for other reason while a trip to Branford for most residents is something out of the ordinary.

## Polls To Open 6 A.M. To 6 P.M. Election Day

East Haven's biennial Town Election takes place Monday and the call issued by James J. Sullivan, Harold C. Hall and John J. Mulhern, comprising the Board of Selectmen, sets the polling hours from 6 A.M. to 6 P.M. The time is Eastern Standard Time.

The polling places will be: First or Center District, Town Hall, Main street; Second or Homauguin District, Branford Manor Hose Co., George street; Third or Foxon District, Foxon Community Center.

Officers to be elected are Assessors, Board of Tax Review, Selectmen, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Grand Jurors, Collector of Taxes, Constables, Registrars of Voters, and Board of Education.

The adjourned annual Town Meeting will be held Monday, Oct. 8 at 8 P.M. in the Town Hall, with six items listed on the call: 1. to appoint three directors for the Library; 2. to act on the report of the Board of Finance and lay a tax rate for the coming year; 3. to grant the usual authorization to the selectmen to carry on the finance board's recommendations; 4. to authorize the selectmen to borrow for current expenses not to exceed \$200,000; 5. to take action on discontinuance of an unused section of the old Short Beach road abutting land of Joseph Winter; and 6. to authorize and empower the selectmen to sell at private sale any and all premises obtained by foreclosure or deed.

Main street was a busy scene Friday and Saturday when the beautiful early autumn weather brought out large numbers of week end shoppers. Store proprietors look for an active season this fall with post-war activities bringing new stock to depleted counters and shelves.

## Riverside Parents Want Safety Signs

Residents of the newly developed Riverside section east of the Town Green are renewing their efforts to have the public safety authorities place "School Crossing" signs at the intersection of Hemingway avenue, River street and Edward street. They claim that Hemingway avenue has become a speedway for automobile traffic and now that school has reopened some 40 or more youngsters living in the Riverside section are obliged to cross the busy street going to and from school. They wrote to the State Traffic Commission and received the reply that the matter of posting signs on Hemingway avenue was up to the local police officials.

## Judge Foote To Be Men's Club Speaker

President J. C. Moody of the Men's Club of the Stone church announced this week that the speaker at the opening supper meeting of the season to be held in the parish house Tuesday, Oct. 9, will be Judge Ellsworth Foote of North Branford. Judge Foote who is a New Haven lawyer and judge of the probate district of North Branford is well known throughout the state as an after dinner speaker.

The supper will be served by the Woman's Aid Society and a toothsome menu is planned. Those seeking places at the table would do well to make their reservations now.

### WHYTE SCHOOL TO REOPEN

Registration is being held all this week at the Whyte School of Dancing at 204 Main street. The classes will open next week. A busy season is anticipated.

### RATION BOARD MOVES

The East Haven War Price and Rationing Board which has been situated during the war in the Town Hall will be terminated Saturday. After that date all business will be conducted at the office of the Branford Area Board in Main street, Branford. All applications for tires, food rations, and furlough and discharge rations for servicemen should be sent to the Branford Board after Sept. 28. This change is due to consolidation of the 185 boards in the state into 35 area boards.

## Gilbert Place, Facing Green, Changes Hands

Another ancient East Haven landmark, the Ebenezer Gilbert Place, in Hemingway avenue facing the Town Green, changed hands the past week. The new owner is Ray Smith of the High school faculty, who has already begun to restore and modernize the old structure which dates back to the Revolutionary period.

The dwelling is of sturdy early colonial construction and has a huge central chimney with fireplaces in each room upstairs and down. One of the original mantels is intact and is of very beautiful design with scrolls and ripples. The property has a frontage of 90 feet on Hemingway avenue and extends to a depth of 200 feet.

It was known as the Egbert Cowles place many years ago and has changed hands many times in the course of years. Mr. Ebenezer Gilbert bought the place from the Frink family in 1863, and resided here until his death. His family consisting of his widow, and a son and daughter, Edmund and Ada Gilbert, now of Spring Glen, lived here five years after his death and in 1900 sold to Messrs. Street and Kirkham, who had planned to extend a street through the property to link Hemingway with Thompson avenue. This plan never was carried out. The house was remodeled by Childsey Brothers into a two family house and was occupied by the families of Lewis Belding and Leon Fowler. Later the house was occupied by Mrs. Myron Munro as a nursing and convalescent home. More recently it had gone into a state of neglect, and there is general satisfaction over the fact that this fine old colonial dwelling is to be restored and preserved. Both Mr. and Mrs. Smith have some interesting plans for restoration of both the house and grounds.

### PLANS NEW STORE

Marlin Olson, builder and developer, announced this week that he plans to start work soon on a building in Short Beach road in the Coe Estates housing project which will be occupied when completed by a modern grocery and market.

## Town Budget \$455,303.47

The Board of Finance issued the following statement this week: "The Town budget covering expenditures for the coming year starting October 1st, has been completed and filed by the Board of Finance.

"The total appropriation asked for is \$465,303.47. An increase of approximately \$100,000.00 since 1939-1940. The tax rate, however, is less by 1/4 mill having been 22 1/4 mills in 1939 and 1940 and 22 mills for the coming year. The budget as submitted this year is approximately \$17,000.00 higher than last year of which \$9,000.00 is for increase in regular school expense.

"The budget of the Board of Education has risen \$57,000 in five

years and at the present time approximately 46c of every dollar goes for schools. Included in the budget is an item of an additional \$10,000. for the Athletic Field on the corner of Thompson and Dodge Avenues, a set aside of \$3,000.00 for re-assessment as well as \$1,500.00 for a sewerage survey. Bonuses of 5 percent of the yearly salary have been given to all full time Town employees other than school teachers, and these have been recognized as recommended by the Board of Education.

"There has been taken from surplus \$42,788.47 which is the one contributing factor in keeping the tax rate as at present. This budget will be presented to the taxpayers at the Annual Town Meeting Oct. 8

## PARTIES MAKE BIDS FOR VOTERS

### Republicans Stand On Record Of Administration Of Eight Years

The Republican Party has issued the following statement concerning next Monday's election.

"For the past eight years the Republican administration has given the citizen of East Haven a business-like administration, constructed on a foundation of efficiency and economy.

"When the present administration took office eight years ago the bonded indebtedness was \$747,000. Today it is \$472,000, a decrease of over a quarter of a million dollars. The present administration has resisted any attempt to increase the bonded indebtedness, appreciative that eight years ago the Town was on the verge of municipal bankruptcy.

"During the past eight years the tax structure has remained static. During each year of the administration a surplus has been created, which has permitted maintaining the same tax structure. This record is significant when one considers the growth of the town has increased greatly in eight years. For example, eight years ago 38 cents of each tax dollar was used for educational purposes. Today, 52 cents of each dollar is used for the same purpose. If the people of East Haven had not been given sound, economic and intelligent government, the tax rate could not have remained at its present figure.

"When the present administration assumed office eight years ago, a policy was instituted of collecting rubbish, without cost to the taxpayer. We feel that this collection saved each property owner many dollars, and it will be continued.

"The new road to Momauguin, victim of war-time restrictions, will be built as soon as material es-

sent and necessary for construction are available. From advice from the State Highway Department, the road is high on the list when road construction starts again.

"It is a matter of common knowledge throughout the State and County that the present administration has given the people of East Haven an administration that is out-standing, economical, and second to none.

"All candidates on the Republican ticket are experienced and well-trained in public affairs. They have had many years of experience and their record is one of efficiency and economy. It is no time to change to a group of inexperienced and untried office seekers.

"The Republican administration has noted an absence of any new items from the Democratic Party. This absence of news leads to the conclusion that the opposing party has not and can not make any claims of substance in reference to the present administration. If claims are made on the eve of election and at a time when counter-statements cannot be brought to the attention of the elector, it is a fair and reasonable question for the voter to decide why such claims were not seasonably made. If this practice is adopted, it is clear that such tardy claims could not stand the test of an answer."

### Democrats Set Forth Platform Calling For Improvement In Town Affairs.

The following statement is issued by Democratic Town Chairman James F. Garland and presents the party platform:

Schools. We pledge: To make Union and South Schools safe for children. To supply adequate and effective protection to children going to and from South School and other schools. To supply adequate medical examinations for all school children, with the assistance of a school physician. To create a dental clinic in the public school system.

Roads. We pledge: To keep all low roads in repair 13 months of the year. To hard-surface all roads in town, particularly in the Momauguin and Foxon districts.

Sanitation. We pledge: To install a full time sanitary inspector. Transportation. We pledge: To press the Public Utilities Commission for more adequate transportation for the Riverside Section, Coe Estates Section, Laurel Street Section, also the Airport Section.

Recreation. We pledge: Full time use of the High School Athletic Field at all times under proper supervision. Better bathing beach facilities under the Town's auspices. To provide a playground for Foxon District.

Sewers. We pledge: To expedite the construction of a sewer system for East Haven. To appoint a commission to inquire into the advisability of the Town cleaning out all cess-pools pending an installation of a permanent sewer system.

Fire and Police protection. We pledge: To increase the Fire and Police personnel and facilities of both departments.

After the election of officers as provided in the first section of the purposes for which said meeting is called and after voting on certain proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Connecticut as provided in the second section of the purposes for which said meeting is called, the business portion of said meeting for the consideration of all items after said time will be adjourned and held on the second Monday of October, Monday, October 8, 1945, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon (warime, unless said warime has been legally changed to Eastern Standard Time on or before October 8, 1945, in which event the time shall be Eastern Standard Time) at said Community House, corner of South Main and Montrose Streets in said Branford, Center.

The following is a statement of the purposes for which said annual Town Meeting is called, viz:

FIRST To elect a member of the Board of Assessors; a member of the Board of Tax Review; three Selectmen; a Town Clerk; a Town Treasurer; an agent for the management of the Town Deposit Fund; six Grand Jurors; a Collector of Taxes; seven assessors; two Registrars of Voters; three members of the Board of Education for three years; and any other officers required by law to be elected.

SECOND To vote upon a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Connecticut concerning the Salary of Members of the General Assembly, which proposed amendment is in the words following: "The salary of Members of the General Assembly shall be \$600.00 for the term for which they are elected."

THIRD To vote upon a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Connecticut concerning the Salary of Members of the General Assembly, which proposed amendment is in the words following: "The General Assembly shall convene annually on the first Wednesday after the first Monday in January and shall adjourn sine die not later than the Wednesday after the second Monday in April."

FOURTH To consider and act upon the report and recommendations of the Board of Finance, and to make appropriations for highways, bridges, schools, charities, parks, state and county taxes, old age pensions, interest charges, for the retirement of bonds and any other Town expenses for the year 1945 to 1946.

"Particularly brilliant," was the way in which a capacity audience learned the opening concert of the Fall-Winter social season at Library Hall last Friday evening when the young talent of Branford presented its best efforts on behalf of the Branford Committee of the New Haven Children's Center.

It would be particularly difficult to single out any one performer's selections over the others for there was a marked difference for the better over the Red Cross Concert of last Spring. But the difference was a marked one although the talents varied from added experience to finer timing.
