### TIME FOR COUNTRY FAIRS

Connecticut Progress, published by the State Development Commission, reminds us in its August number which came to our desk this week that annual Fair time is approaching. The bulletin contains a list of the Country Fairs and the dates they will be held (which we are pleased to reprint elsewhere) and a number of photographs of typical scenes at Connecticut country fairs. In the past few years many of the old-time fairs of Connecticut have fallen by the wayside. One of these was the East Haven Fair which was a feature on the Town Green twenty-five or more years ago and a community attraction of the first order. The war also spelled fairs for some fairs but others have resumed now that the war is over.

The Connecticut fair fits squarely into the pattern of rural Connecticut living. To many a resident Fair Day is the day when he can compete with his neighbor as to who has the best plate of onions or the strongest yoke of oxen. It is a day when friends get together to discuss old times. Often it is the only time of year for meeting distant neighbors. Fair Day is the Old Home Day in many towns.

Fairs of Connecticut, the bulletin points out, are diverse in their attractions. Of course, they all stress the agricultural note, but the added attractions may range from a lavish midway and automobile races to the simple arrangements for entertainment thought up by 4-H Club boys and girls.

Some Connecticut fairs have been going for a long time. Brooklyn Fair dates back to 1809 and was started only a few years after George Washington had stressed the importance of fairs. Connecticut does not have a state fair, but a Connecticut building is maintained at the Eastern States Exposition Grounds at West Springfield, Mass.

There will be more than thirty fairs held in Connecticut this fall. We don't expect to attend all of them but there are two or three we certainly do plan to take in.

### ARE THE ELM TREES SAFE?

We hate to see the ancient Elm trees go from Main street. One by one they have been disappearing in recent years and the latest to go was ripped down by the wind storm Saturday night doing much damage in the way of disturbed utility services.

It is as painful to see the old elm trees passing from Main street as it is to see the old houses of the early residents make way for modern business buildings. We hope at least some of our ancient dwellings, which have been landmarks for so long will not fall in the path of progress.

But we must not become sentimental about the old elm trees if they become a menace to safety. The tree which fell Saturday night was to all outward appearances, we understand, sound and healthy. When we looked at it Sunday the entire inside of the trunk at the base was rotten. Perhaps there are other diseased elm trees along Main street and in other parts of the town that should be removed before they do damage. The Dutch Elm disease has made headway in other communities and it probably has done so here as well. Last year a number of trees were inspected and some were removed. Perhaps it would be well to have our trees given a thorough going over again.

We hate to lose the ancient elm trees but they will have to go if they are found to be unsafe.

### AID FROM STATE POLICE

The arrests of 53 men in a raid upon a gambling establishment in Foxon in the early hours of last Sunday morning is an example of the splendid cooperation which is given community police organizations by the State Police Department. A small police force such as most towns are obliged to get along with could not have arranged and carried on, certainly not with precision and success, such a large-scale police activity as that of the Sunday morning raid.

Between 14 and 20 trained policemen from the State Police Barracks at Westbrook were sent into East Haven to assist the three men of the local department who had taken the preliminary steps in planning the raid. As a result the whole affair was over in quick time and with no violence, and no one escaped through the police net which had been flung around the place.

The State Police work in well defined districts. East Haven is at the extreme westerly end of the large grouping of towns which extends from Old Lyme to East Haven, with headquarters at Westbrook. Captain Leo Mulcahy, who directed the final stage of the raid, covers a larger area, roughly the eastern half of the state.

Town Prosecutor Vincent Fasano in court Monday spoke high praise for the State Police and the East Haven officers, who included Sgt. Edward Priest, and Patrolmen Joseph Folio and Edward Stenham, for the successful planning and execution of the largest police raid ever conducted here.

### A TRAFFIC DANGER SPOT

Our attention was called this week by one of our readers to a traffic danger spot at Coe avenue and Silver Sands road. Here, at the northerly end of the newly laid pavement, the road narrows and there is an unprotected entrance to the old trolley right of way from which the tracks have recently been removed. This right of way runs parallel with the highway across the meadows. At night the condition here is particularly dangerous. On a few occasions strangers, who do not know the road, have driven off the highway onto this abandoned trolley right of way. We suggest the Trolley Company or our Public Safety Board do something to correct this condition.

### AN OLD FRIEND PASSES

We report elsewhere the death and funeral of Mr. Samuel A. Tourtellotte. Mr. Tourtellotte who was 80 years old had been handicapped by ill health for the past three or four years but during all that time he kept up his deep interest in the affairs of his church and his community which he had served faithfully for a great many years. As president of our neighboring Fairmount Association a number of years ago he was instrumental in the civic development of that part of eastern New Haven. His labors for St. Andrew's Methodist church, which he had represented at the New York East Conference for many years, took vast amounts of his time especially since his retirement from active service as a telegraph operator and signal tower operator for the New Haven railroad a number of years ago. As General Superintendent of the Church Sunday school he was beloved by generations of young people. Although old in years Mr. Tourtellotte never lost the clear eye of youth. He was the type of man his community can ill afford to lose.

## Town "Blacked-Out" When Elm Tree Topples

### Central East Haven Darkened When Heavy Wind Blows Down Ancient Tree In Main Street.

Saturday night's terrific wind and rain storm although of brief duration, left considerable damage and disorder in its wake as it cut a swath across central East Haven.

An ancient elm tree on Richmond Hill, just opposite the Lamb Funeral Home in Main street, was uprooted and crushed to the ground blocking all traffic through Main street and taking with it electric light and telephone cables which threw most of the town into darkness and cut telephone service from 650 homes. When workmen of the Stapleford company who have been taking care of trees for the town inspected the damage afterward they found that although the tree looked sound from without the interior of the trunk was thoroughly rotten.

Buses were put into service by the Connecticut company to reroute passengers around the fallen tree. All auto travel was also rerouted until next morning while the tree was being cut up and removed. The stores in the center of the town were in darkness for two hours or more and candles were pressed into service.

At the Town Hall the Saturday night "Bingo" was in progress when the lights went out. Flash lights were provided, and also candles, but

when the Illuminating company was unable to make any promises that the light would soon go on again, the party was cancelled. The Capitol Theatre was thrown into darkness also and the audience was dismissed.

Telephone company employees said that a big cable had separated when the tree fell and that four telephone poles along Main street had to be replaced.

### High School To Have New Coach For Football

Roy Briggs, teacher of English and coach of the high school football team has tendered his resignation in order to accept a position in the Fairfield high school. Alfred Pullano, of Cranston, R.I., has been appointed to take over the duties of Mr. Briggs. Mr. Pullano is a graduate of Rhode Island State College and a veteran with five years service. He played varsity football for four years.

## Health Officer Gives Polio Warning

### Dr. Bove Cites Facts That Every One Should Know About Infantile Paralysis

Dr. Rocco Bove, East Haven Health officer, believing that East Haven parents will want to learn more about precautions which may be taken against infantile paralysis, quotes the following information from a Connecticut State Health Department Bulletin:

"Every year when the weather gets warm and it is time for us to start out on our recreational period, the danger of poliomyelitis incites unnecessary fear in many of our hearts. This fear is based not on the number of deaths that occur from this disease but on the fact that, if one does become infected with poliomyelitis virus, the person so affected may be left with a paralysis.

There is usually a considerable variation in the prevalence of poliomyelitis from year to year. It is not possible to predict with certainty when an outbreak of the disease will occur nor where it will strike. It is usually a disease of late summer, being more prevalent in August and September than in other months, but cases do begin to appear at an earlier date. From the first of the year until the present time, 17 cases of this disease have been reported within the state boundaries. This number is small at present but may grow. It is possible that we may have a large number of cases of poliomyelitis during the coming season.

all persons should realize about poliomyelitis. To begin with, polio is not always a fatal disease. Four-fifths of the children may recover with no permanent paralysis. Today, a paralyzed arm or leg can be treated, and this treatment has been very successful. A person who is ill with the disease should be treated actively from the onset; this means that as soon as the diagnosis is established, proper treatment to relieve the pain and spasms of muscles should be carried out. This should be followed by the proper period of re-education of the muscles with good physiotherapy so that a return to normal or near to normal as possible may be obtained.

"Another factor about poliomyelitis that should not be overlooked is that it is frequently a very mild disease and a patient may show only mild symptoms and no paralysis may develop. A mild case may consist merely of a headache, nausea and vomiting and a few aches and pains of the muscles that clear rapidly, but at the same time the disease can be spread by this case. Also, persons who are not ill may be carriers, so it is well to avoid crowds if the disease is rife. Parents need to be on constant guard at such times as the first symptoms of the disease may be very mild. Upper-respiratory infections should not be considered lightly during a season when this disease may be prevalent. After a day or so of indisposition, the more severe indications such as stiff neck

and pain in the muscles may appear and be followed by some paralysis.

"Poliomyelitis may be spread by coming in contact with discharges from the nose and mouth of persons ill with the disease. These discharges may be spread to others before the paralysis appears in the patient. Discharges from the bowels and bladder may also spread the infectious agent of polio. Ingestion of contaminated water, milk and other foods are other possible means of spreading the infection. Carriers, who play an important part in the spread of the disease, are difficult to discover. Therefore, aid in preventing the spread of the disease, those with mild illness such as gastro intestinal upset, upper-respiratory infections, headache and malaise should stay away from crowds.

"It is also well during the period of the warm summer months when we are apt to carry out more physical activities than usual to restrain children so that they do not become overtired and that they do not eat too fast in order to hurry out and play again. With restraint, keeping away from crowds, controlling of files and eating a properly balanced diet, some protection is afforded. As the polio season approaches, all low a sane routine of living, thus aiding prevention by maintaining general health and resistance against this disease.

## Gamblers Will Serve Time If Caught Again

Judge Arthur T. Connor made it clear in a statement from the bench during the town court session Monday that those who operated a gambling house which was raided in Foxon Park early Sunday morning by local and state police, will serve jail sentences if they are found operating here again. In addition to fines of \$100 each (in one case an extra fine of \$100 was imposed) Judge Connor ordered 30-day jail sentences but then suspended them for a year. He told the convicted men that he noted they all gave Bridgeport addresses. He advised them to stay away from East Haven and warned them that further operations here would mean jail.

The court collected \$2,280 in fines and forfeited bonds and also \$900 in cash which was seized from the tables.

Only six of the 42 men who had been arrested as frequenters in the early morning raid, appeared in court. They paid fines of \$35 which was the amount of the individual cash bonds which were ordered forfeited in the case of those who did not appear.

The Police station presented a hectic scene in the hours before dawn Sunday when the prisoners were brought down for booking, bond arranging and other routine. It was the largest raid ever conducted in this town.




