CHRISTMAS MAILINGS TO ARMY OVERSEAS

Postmaster Joseph Driscoll of the local post office has announced that Christmas packages for army personnel overseas must be mailed during the period beginning October 15 and ending November 15. Parcels destined for delivery in China, India and the Middle East, as well as the islands of the Pacific, should be mailed as early as possible. Special efforts will be made to effect delivery of all Christmas parcels mailed during these periods. During this time requests for the addresses are not required in connection with Christmas parcels. No more than one package will be accepted in one week when sent by or on behalf of the same person or concern to the same addressee. Boxes for overseas transmission should be stronger than containers used for parcels which do not leave the states. All articles for overseas must be packed in boxes of metal, wood, slid fiberboard or double-faced corrugated fiber board. Each box should be tied with strong cord. The public is urged not to include food and clothing in Christmas parcels. No more than one package will be accepted in one week when sent by or on behalf of the same person or concern to the same addressee. Boxes for overseas transmission should be stronger than containers used for parcels which do not leave the states. According to our Criminal Court records, out of all criminals arrested and convicted, and living in State Penitentiaries or going to the Electric chair, only two per cent of these ever attended Sunday School, and I should think that Parents and those who are responsible for the education of children, should give this matter serious thought. Our National, State and Town authorities, insist and force you to educate your children in secular studies, as a protection to the Community, and why people especially parents do not realize that is even more important to have the mind trained in deep religious thought. Which makes the future Citizen of greater value to his community. Mr. Currie, then Pastor of Stone Church, hired two very expert census takers, to make a survey of the Town, and find out where people went to Church, it was discovered that hundreds of families belonged to churches in

the City, and seldom went to church, and their children did not attend Sunday School. Recently I have had several visits from Missionaries from a City Church, which have again made a survey of East Haven, and it has been a great privilege to me and a good deal of education as well, to hear these business like reports, I wish all the Pastors and Church School workers could have heard these reports. How can Parents be so stupid and short-sighted about their children's education? Here you have five Churches within walking distance of your homes, and two Missions at Momauguin, there is no excuse for an obstinate attitude in this matter. Do you think God is going to excuse you for this neglect of his little. This is an offence against childhood. They need this religious instruction, and it is your business to see that they have it.

Do you know that our great and beloved Nation, has been for some time following the same course of one of the greatest Nations on Earth, France. There is no power or combination of Nations that could have beaten France, as She once was. Any honest student of history will tell you that. But France rotted to pieces inside, she became a thing of great filth, within her own heart, her Morale went down into the gutter, and she lost to an inferior Nation.

Germany became the seat of all knowledge so to speak, her Universities were world famous, Her graduates took precedence over all others. Then she became lifted up of her pride, and then came the fall, and how far God let her go, before he stopped her? We have nothing to fear from Russia, while we remain Christian Nation. She will be nothing against us, if we belong to God, but if we like France, rot to pieces internally, we are gone a thing of the past. All our democracy will be as hot air, dust in a wind storm, only a Nation that knows God, will stand.

What Other Editors Are Thinking About

IS REAL ESTATE TOO HIGH?

Whoever would have dreamed ten years ago—or even two years ago—that real estate prices in this vicinity would skyrocket quite so high? We heard of a farm on Route 77 that sold for \$27,000 the other day . . . we know what the owner paid for the place originally, and while it's quite true it's a vastly improved place as it was sold, you could knock off one cipher of the selling price and you'd be nearly right as to the purchase price.

The Kingman (Kansas) Journal has this to say about the rising real estate prices: "Some people are wondering what is finally going to happen to this ever-increasing price of real estate. Here's what: You walk into a crap game with a dollar bill, let it ride for ten straight passes, and then with \$624 in your hand, you wake up next morning broke and wonder why you thought you could do it just once more."

We don't think the analogy is entirely correct, but the thought is amusing.

Frankly, we believe real estate will continue to boom until such time as the acute home shortage has been cured. At present with ten people wanting every vacancy, and the demand for property greater than it's been before its quite understandable how the prices soar so—the old law of supply and demand is at work. As a matter of fact we have the notion that land values in the Connecticut River valley towns and along the Shore Line have been too low anyway. This "jab in the arm" of demand that has caused the spiraling of prices, may have definitely been a good thing. We have, in this area, what is commonly acknowledged as the finest sort of places in which to

live. For proof of that, just look at the people who flocked into our towns in recent years in order to make their homes here. Certainly there's tacit acknowledgment that for many, residence in this area is the complete answer to finding the proper place to call home. Those who have come here (up until recent times at least) have always been surprised by the reasonableness of the property values hereabouts. Sometimes we forget that we have such "acres of diamonds" right under our noses anyway. We are all apt to forget the quiet loveliness of our village streets—the restful peace of our way of life hereabouts—and the healthfulness of living in one of these ideal New England villages. These intangibles are over looked by us, because we take them for granted, but they may well be considered a legitimate part of the price we pay for a home.
