Watercolor Show By Conn. Society

The Connecticut Watercolor Society will hold its ninth annual exhibition at the Wadsworth Athenaeum Art Museum, Hartford, from Nov. 9 to Dec. 1. Any painter in watercolor or gouache, who is a resident of Connecticut, is eligible to submit entries. They will be passed upon by a jury of four distinguished artists, Mr. Paul Sample, Andrew Wyeth, Dong Kingman and Warren Baumgartner. Mr. Sample, a nationally-known watercolorist, was documentary artist in the service throughout the duration of the war. He painted in Pacific and Atlantic basins, under special assignment from "Life" magazine. For some years, Mr. Sample has been "Artist-in-Residence" at Dartmouth College, where he has executed many sparkling snow landscapes. Andrew Wyeth is a son of the famous painter, the late N. C. Wyeth. He exhibits frequently in New York but most of his paintings are done on the Maine coast. They are distinguished for their deep and glowing hues. The Chinese-American, Dong Kingman, has received a Guggenheim fellowship as well as many awards. His paintings are in the best Museums of the east and West. They are usually brilliant in color and gay in mood. Mr. Baumgartner is an equally successful painter. Seldom, if ever, has Hartford been visited by so outstanding a group of watercolorists. It is hoped that the artists of Connecticut will submit many fine paintings to this excellent jury. Several prizes are being offered.
