The buyer goes to the store, makes his purchases, and if he is not satisfied he knows the merchant can always be found at the same old stand.

The post-war period seems to have brought an over abundance of house to house canvassers into East Haven. They come bearing all manner of books and gadgets and once they get a foothold in the door they are there until you sign on the dotted line. If it's Christ-mas cards or something of a minor nature they are selling your loss is only small financially although the loss to the community is large because of the draining off of business that should properly go to your tax-paying neighbors, the merchants. But if it is a costly set of books, which down in your heart you know you or your children will probably never use, or something that really runs into money, your goose is cooked when you sign that innocent looking contract. Let illness or other trouble come and let a payment or too lapse and see what happens.

It is unfortunate too that many of these house-to-house salesmen now are G.I.'s. They should be at work doing something more useful to themselves and the public. Tell them so if necessary, you will be doing them a favor. Don't let these door-to-door salesmen and salesladies get a foothold.
