### AN EAST HAVEN BANK

Because we believe that an East Haven Bank is a Number One need for this community we are pleased this week to present the following excerpts from a prospectus which has been prepared by the Bank Committee of the East Haven Business Association. This prospectus gives a very good statement of progress during the past year toward an East Haven Bank.

"For the past several months, the East Haven Business Association has had under consideration the establishment of a bank in East Haven. After numerous meetings, investigations, and surveys, favorable indications substantiate its need in the community and successful operations after organization.

"At the present time, there is no financial institution of any kind in the town. In fact it is the only community of similar size in Connecticut without any banking service.

"As a preliminary step to establish a reasonable basis for requesting a charter, an analysis of Connecticut towns as populations pertain to deposits of local banking institutions was made from the Connecticut Register, the Report of the Bank Commissioner of Sept. 29, 1945 and the 1945 Bank Directory of New England.

"East Haven now has an estimated population of 12,000. Adjoining communities and areas create a trading center of approximately 25,000 people. These consist of a generally high type of citizens employed as office workers, professional men, salaried personnel, skilled mechanics, and various officials connected with the industrial activities of adjacent cities and towns. It has a grand list of about 15,000,000. A large government plant, which is in process of being purchased by private capital, is located in the town. An extensive portion of the New Haven Airport is also contained within its boundaries. Rail facilities are available on the Shoreline Division of the New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railway Company, and commuting services are established by the Connecticut Company and the New Haven Shoreline Railway Company.

"In the interest of conservatism, deposits equal to one quarter of the average could accrue within a reasonable period, thereby creating sufficient funds to operate profitably.

"Inasmuch as all present real estate financing is provided for by out of town institutions, local investment problems in this field offer greater than usual opportunities. With the expected return of consumer financing and normal commercial credit requirements, current operating earnings can be logically anticipated. Consistent with common banking practice, service charges should also be a source of additional income.

"Although local banking operations are currently transacted in New Haven or Branford, it is felt that the location of the new institution would materially aid in building up deposits and loans. Notwithstanding its proximity to the aforementioned localities, numerous inconveniences are now prevalent, such as the lack of parking space in crowded city areas, loss of time due to increased motor traffic, and delays due to river traffic and drawbridge tie-ups. Obviously the present handicaps would be favorable to a local bank. Adjacent districts of New Haven are also subject to these handicaps and would be potential clients to the proposed institution.

"There appears to be no question as to fulfillment of initial capital requirements of \$100,000 capital and \$100,000 paid-in surplus. The results of a preliminary survey indicated 109 people are interested in becoming stockholders. It is the intention of the organization group to spread the ownership of stock as widely as possible, thereby building up added beneficial influence within the community.

"Although it is impossible to predict an accurate number of accounts or a total amount of deposits to be obtained upon opening, the survey previously mentioned disclosed that 400 individuals signified their willingness to support a new bank in some depository capacity. It is also interesting to note that the previous institution acquired over 200 new savings accounts from September 30, 1930, to September 30, 1931, in face of the worst banking depression in the history of the country. Based upon the general ratio of deposits as presented previously, it is apparent that development possibilities exist and a satisfactory volume of credits should normally accrue.

"The contemplated site for the proposed bank is situated on Main Street in a building to be erected by Mr. Martin Olson. Several stores at present occupy the block to which the intended quarters will adjoin. Construction will be suitable for banking facilities and provisions for ample parking space have been considered. Rental payments are estimated to be \$150.00 monthly.

"On September 10, Mr. K. B. Reynolds called up Mr. Leo Carr, Supervising Examiner, in his Boston office, and discussed requirements of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. Inasmuch as the Insurance Corporation operates in conjunction with the State Banking Department, Mr. Carr was of the opinion that appropriate action would be based primarily upon whatever decision was reached by the Connecticut Banking Commission."

We hope that response to the call for capital to make possible a bank for East Haven will be both general and generous. Spread over a large number of residents the amount from each individual would seem not to be too much. An investment in the future of the town in which we have acquired homes and in which we intend to reside, would appear to be a sufficient reason for backing the Business Association in its labors of the past several months.

Local Boy At Age Of Nine Has Won Acclaim For Ability To Play Xylophone

East Haven and vicinity residents will be interested in knowing that David Watrous, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. S. Watrous of Hemlingway avenue, will mark his first anniversary as one of the talented artists on the weekly "Youth on Parade" radio program of New Haven's popular radio station WELI, the first week in November. David participates in the program which is broadcast from the WELI studio in New Haven each Saturday morning from 10:30 to 11 o'clock.

The local youngster is nine years old, and he began his first practice on the xylophone in November two years ago, when he was only seven years of age. From the very beginning his progress was rapid and today he is one of the most skillful of xylophone players in this part of the state.

## Business Group To Hear Talk On Blue Cross

At the next meeting of the Business Association to be held in the Town Hall Monday, Nov. 11 at 8 P. M. a representative will be present to discuss the Blue Cross Hospital Plan.

The notices which have been sent out for this meet by Secretary Harry Falkoff suggests the possibility of a change in the meeting nights for the coming year and also proposes dinner meetings starting at 7 P. M. All members and prospective members are urged to be present.

## School Board Adopts Rates For School Use

The Board of Education has adopted a new schedule of fees for the use of the High school grounds or building for non-school commercial events. Action on the increases was taken at the Oct. 1 meeting of the Board.

New minimum charges are as follows: Football field, \$55. Gymnasium for Basketball, \$67. Auditorium, \$97; Cafeteria, \$23. Auditorium and Gymnasium for performance and dance, \$77. Auditorium and Cafeteria for performance and refreshments, \$81; Auditorium, Gymnasium and Cafeteria for performance refreshments, and dance, \$86.

A breakdown of the costs shows \$20 for maintenance of property; heat, light and water charge, from \$10 to \$40, salary of supervisor \$5; salary of janitor, \$4; salary of technician, \$5 and salary of policeman \$4 each.

The Board of Finance has been requested to handle all receipts for use of building and grounds for other than school functions in a manner similar to the handling of the school cafeteria account, with disbursements from the account to be made upon order of the Board of Education for such purposes as repair, upkeep and maintenance of bleachers, grand stands, stage scenery, turf and base lines etc., the account to have no connection to any budget appropriations.

The board will employ a night janitor and fireman and also an additional full-time Maintenance man with experience in painting, as a result of its policy of renting the building for outside activities.

# JOHN P. BARRETT Candidate for State Representative Says:

The Democratic Town Committee, in announcing to the voters of East Haven, the names of its candidates for State Representatives, feel sure they have taken into consideration the needs of the citizens in general, and the Town Committee feel confident of the whole-hearted support of East Haven's voters in the coming elections.

As one of its Candidates for State Representative they offer the name of Mr. John P. Barrett, who resides at 32 George Street, East Haven.

c) **FULL SUPPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND WELFARE**—The need for co-ordination of welfare services for neglected and un-cared for children under the State Department of Welfare is paramount together with the enactment of a Youth Correction Act to improve the treatment of youthful offenders and to curb juvenile delinquency.

d) **STATE FULL EMPLOYMENT OF LABOR'S ADVANCEMENT**—Mr. Barrett will support an action to amend the State Unemployment Compensation Act to correct existing weaknesses and to provide for the extending of claims.

e) **SPECIAL STUDY AND REVISION OF THE ENTIRE STATE TAX SYSTEM**—In this connection, Mr. Barrett favors relief of the tax burden on real estate by developing new sources of state revenue for state aid to towns and greater participation by the state in the construction and maintenance of highways within the territorial limits of towns.

f) **SPEED IN THE MATTER OF THE VETERANS WAR BONUS**—Mr. Barrett favors and will support legislation for the payment of a cash lump sum bonus for the veterans and, if necessary, will support immediate legislative action to provide for a referendum on the matter.

These are the items of Special Interest to East Haven's taxpayers which Mr. Barrett believes in, and which he gives special attention to. In addition he will fully support and vigorously encourage the entire platform of The Democratic Party.

He bespeaks the voter's entire confidence and whole-hearted support.

Judge Clifford Sturges, East Haven and former judge of the local town court, who is a candidate to succeed himself as judge of the New Haven District Probate Court, in a final statement this week prior to the election next Tuesday, pointed to his record of eighteen years with the New Haven Probate Court, and said that if reelected he will continue to work for statewide probate reforms.

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
