A LITTLE ABOUT THIS AND THAT

A YOUTH RECREATIONAL CENTER

We heard this week that a movement is underway in East Haven to try and pursuade the Town Fathers to open the former Fire Headquarters Building as a youth recreational center. We are told that the Pequot Tribe of Red Men went on record as favoring the project at Hall. He succeeds Edgar Bacon, its last meeting and that other organizations are being approached to whose term expired this summer. take similar action.

THE DOOLEY SWIM MEET

Again preparations are being made for the annual Dooley Swim Meet to be held at Momauguin Beach on Tuesday, August 19. Don Thomas is at the helm once more which assures a successful program of aquatic activities. He has called for volunteers to assist him in the work and we hope he will be assured of support.

This will be the tenth annual event of this kind at the East Haven Shore and as usual it will be under the sponsorship of Harry R. Bartlett post, American Legion, which has a notable record for its work

for East Haven youth and for its safety program.

The Swim Meet is named for Frank M. Dooley, Jr., disabled World-War I veteran, who in years gone by was indefatiguable in his efforts in behalf of healthful recreation for the young people of the community. Until his physical condition prohibited it, Frank Dooley led the swim meet activities and throughout the season was a familiar figure coaching the youngsters from his wheel chair. It is hoped that Frank will be able to come down from the hospital in Rocky Hill to watch the tenth anniversary of the work he so well founded here.

To many the swim meet will again emphasize the crying need in

East Haven for a town-owned beach where this and similar activities can be carried on and where townspeople can enjoy healthful water front recreation without using private property.

NORTH GUILFORD MONASTERY

We paid an interesting visit recently to the Monastery of Our Lady of Grace, established in January of this year in the pre-Revolu-tion farm house built by Samuel Chittenden in 1773 at the junction of Hoop Pole and Race Hill roads in nearby North Guilford. The ancient building situated on a large acreage of typical Connecticut countryside not far from Lake Quomipaug is a fine example of early New England architecture. Now the windows are being made opaque, iron igratings have been installed in the parlor and the entire garden area has been surrounded by a high closely fitted board fence.

This is the first strictly cloistered monastery in Connecticut, the nuns of North Guilford following the rule of St. Dominic who in 1206 founded his first monastery for women in France in order to have a 'powerhouse of prayer and penance' for his Order of Friars Preachers which he launched ten years later and which now cover the earth.

East Haven and vicinity Catholics will find the Monastery a spiri-

tually refreshing place to visit. The present chapel is a tiny one but the welcome is warm and an Extern Sister is always ready to direct visitors and accept requests. The monastery is only a three minute drive north from Route 80.

Rev. Father C. G. Moore, O.P., to whom we talked told us a g deal about the Order, the work it has done and is doing, and the plans for the development of the North Guilford Monastery. The Chapel of Perpetual Adoration is open daily for those who wish to visit, Day and night behind the grating in back of the altar groups of cloistered nuns are constantly at prayer.



One of the prettiest things about Branford is the Green. There are other towns and cities in Connecticut and in other states which boast these greens, but in our opinion none compare with the Branford Green. Probably no other group in Branford appreciates the heauty of the freen as much as the members of the Branford Garden Club. This appreciation was exhibited re-cently when the Club petitioned the Selectmen for the privilege of planting grass on the Green where it had been worn out by cars which parked on the edge of the grass.

It's time the practice of parking on the grass along the Green is stopped. The stretch of road to which we refer specifically, is the roadway i front of Trinity Church as far as the Town Hall For some reason or other the curbstone was not ompleted along this road, thus making it for shoppers, or business men of the Main Street district, to pull their cars a full length in on the We realize well that the number of cars

Branford has increased in the last few years in similar proportion to the rest of the nation, and that eliminating this space as a potential parking area is going to make it difficult for the few people who have found it convenient to leave their ears parked on the Green. The issue, however, is clear: the ears do not belong on the grass and hould be prevented from parking there, or else the entire Green should be turned into a public parking place; so that all may have the same priv-

It should be made clear that our objections ap ply only to the stretch of road on which there is no curbstone. The part of the road which curves from the Town Hall into Main Street has the curbstone; here parking procedure is normal and proper. But the present procedure of parking on the grass-some cars in straight, others at an an gle-gives people the impression that parking reg ulations are haphazard, and that we can't care too much for our Green if we let cars park on the

We hope that this argument will highlight to the Selectmen and to the Branford business men a problem which will become very acute in a short time. If the curbstone is completed all the way along the road through the Green, as it should be quite a few parking places will be eliminated. Soon the Southern New England Telephone Company will begin construction of a new building which will eliminate the only available, public parking lot in Branford. If we are to prevent visitors and shoppers from
