PLANNING PROBLEMS

We have a letter from Director Elmer R. Coburn, director of the Research and Planning Division of the State Development Commission, calling attention to a discussion program on planning and development problems to be held Wednesday, Nov. 12 in the Hotel Bond at Hartford.

This year's clinic, he tells us, will be concerned mainly with specific local planning problems and the methods and procedures used in their solution. Round Table groups will be formed offering such topics for discussion as:

1. Facilitating zoning legislation and administration.
2. Effective zoning guided by a community development plan.
3. Better neighborhoods through subdivision control.
4. State and local trends in alleviating traffic congestion through highway planning.
5. Requirements for successful shopping and business centers, etc.

This meeting should appeal particularly, Director Coburn says, to local officials and interested citizens of the towns, boroughs and cities of Connecticut. It will provide a clearing house of information with the participants benefiting from the practical down-to-earth experiences of other communities. Top-notch planners and advisers will be on hand to guide the discussion groups and to advise on planning and zoning procedures.

This would appear to be a worthwhile program and one at which East Haven ought to be represented by those officially or unofficially interested in our community progress.

INDIAN SUMMER

Some say that Indian Summer does not come until early November, when a period of bright summer-like weather provides an unseasonable break in the dull gray days of fog and damp that marks the setting in of the colder season. We have been hearing the term "Indian Summer" applied to the warm spell of weather which lasted this fall through much of October. Whether true Indian Summer or no the October days this year have lured many including ourselves out onto the open road and into the country. We have found that due probably to the absence of a preliminary cold snap and frosts, the autumn foliage has not been as colorful as we have often enjoyed in past years. But the season has been a rare one. The hazy days and the mild evenings were an open invitation to all to get out into God's great out-of-doors. Stacked cornstalks in the fields, yellow pumpkins, haze graying the distant hills, grazing cattle in still green pastures, pungent smell of burning leaves, and home windows cheerfully alight in early evening, add to the spirit-warming feel of Autumn.

We are told that many who took, like Indians of old, to the Mohawk Trail found too many others seeking the same pleasures, and the traffic jam over the hills were the worst ever. We enjoyed relaxation on roads more quiet and on the middle reaches of the Housatonic and in the colorful Litchfield Hills, found respite from the stress and strain of daily routine. And on that Sunday, designated as "Foliage Sunday" this year we journeyed through orange and gold splashed countryside to the little Emanuel Church at Killingworth. There in the country hush beside the lonely Hammonasset we heard the Rev. Gilbert's sermon on the Indians' moon of the falling leaves. Humans, he said, can learn a lesson from the falling leaves of Autumn,—as the years of life lengthen, to let go of things gracefully, to relax, to move easily, patiently, pleasantly, as do the colorful leaves as they move earthward in the waning of the year.

HALLOWE'EN HOODLUMS

Chalk markings and scribbles on the sidewalks, and besmudged store windows forecast the arrival of Hallowe'en a week from Friday night. Already pranking kids have been seized by that peculiar once-a-year malady which makes them at Hallowe'en and for a couple of weeks before, veritable young demons of destruction. And mischievous youngsters can too often become Hallowe'en hoodlums leaving disastrous havoc in their wake come the first of November. We hope, but probably in vain, that East Haven's Hallowe'en will run to more quiet lines than usual this year.

Although clothes line is much more easier to obtain this season than it has been since before the war years we hope that back-yard-visiting boys will think twice before they go into the general clothes line slashing such as was reported during previous Hallowe'en seasons. And we venture the wish also that some of the lesser nuisances which the smaller fry have already started to indulge in this year are not a prelude to worse deprivations next week when Hallowe'en actually does arrive.

We are glad to see that in at least one community of the town steps have been taken and funds raised for a community-wide Hallowe'en parade and festival for the youngsters, old and young. The Saltonstall Civic Association is sponsoring such an event on All-Hallows' Eve and it is a good example which could well be taken up next year by other civic groups. Who knows but that it may break the ground for a town-wide supervised Hallowe'en party in the future. Such projects have worked out successfully in other towns where the younger element is kept together under control and their Hallowe'en energies directed into safer channels more profitable to the community than a free run of Hallowe'en hoodlumism.

How Telephone Rates Affect East Haven

New rates for local telephone service and some toll calls within Connecticut became effective October 21 in compliance with an order issued by the Public Utilities Commission October 17 covering the first general increase in telephone rate schedules since 1927.

The new rates were approved by the Commission following a series of public hearings on the request filed by The Southern New England Telephone Company, and will appear on subscribers' bills dated on and after October 21.

In East Haven, the increases range from 30 cents monthly for four-party residence service to \$3 for private line unlimited business service.

Rates for out-of-town calls begin at ten cents under the new schedules and include a five-cent increase in the station-to-station rate between certain Connecticut points. Ten-cent rates continue to cover the first five minutes of conversation; 15 to 25-cent rates, inclusive, cover the first four minutes of conversation; while rates of 30 cents and over continue to cover the first three minutes.

The toll rate from this exchange to Ansonia-Derby and Milford remains at 10 cents, and there is no increase in the rate to Cheshire and Guilford, 15 cents; and Waterbury, 20 cents. A five-cent increase is reflected in the new rates to Branford, 30 cents; Wallingford, 15; Bridgeport and Meriden, 20 cents; and Middletown, 25 cents.

In the "base rate area," which includes the built-up central sections of East Haven, the old and new monthly rates for local service are as follows: Residence service, four-party line \$3.30; two-party line \$3.50 to \$3.85; and private line \$4 to \$4.60. Business service, private line unlimited service 8.50 to \$11.50; and measured service \$4.50 to \$5.50.

Outside the base rate area, the increases will be comparable to those shown above — although better grades of service such as two-party residence lines will be introduced in some sections, and mileage charge will be reduced in certain cases.

The monthly charge for extension telephones goes from 50 to 75 cents for all residence customers, and from 75 cents to \$1 for unlimited business subscribers.

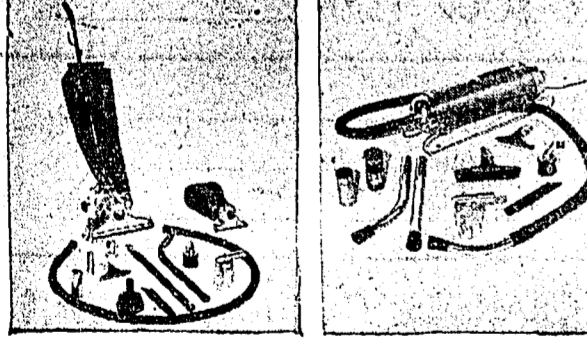

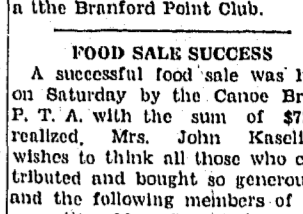
