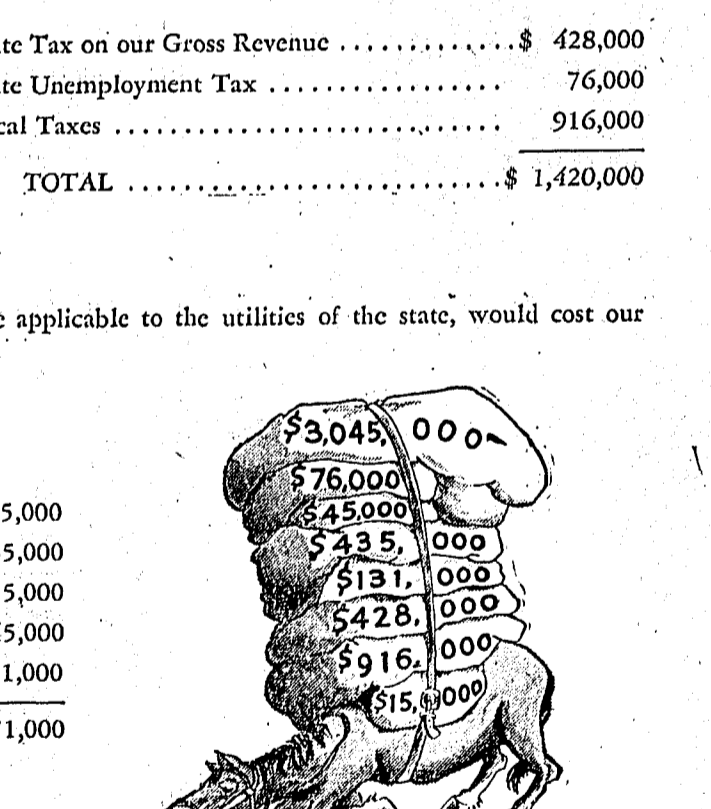
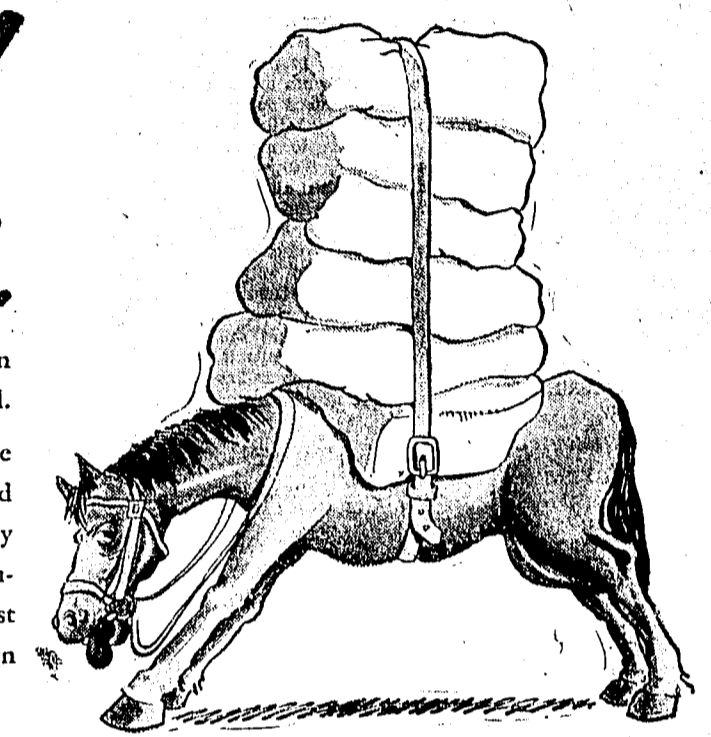

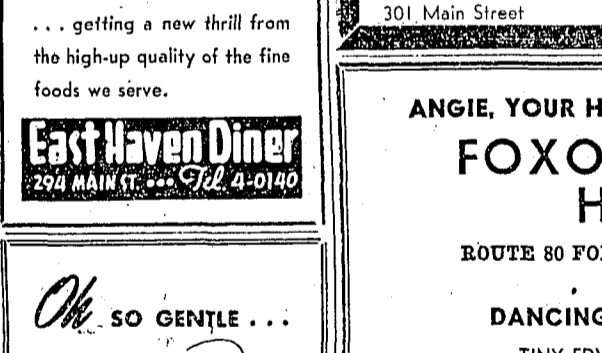

Branford Bows Before Milford

Undermanned, through injuries, but not outfought, a game but outclassed Branford High School football team dropped a 43 to 0 verdict to the Milford Indians at Washington Park in the latter city in a postponed club last Monday.

Paced by Capt. R. D. Ford, the Milfordites took the jump in the first quarter and piled up the score on every possible occasion to win going away. The Sampsonmen played without the help of its two ace backs, Joe Petela and Chandler, who were out of the contest under doctor's orders.

Milford broke into the scoring column early in the first period when Capt. R. D. Ford went over for his first tally. With Capt. Ford holding Gloria's kick was wide. On a penalty play for tackling a punt receiver, Milford was allowed an attempt at a field goal. The first try was wide but Branford was offside and the play was run over with Gloria splitting the uprights. The first quarter ended with the score 9-0. R. D. Ford scored again in the second on a series of ground plays, and Gloria's try for point was good.

Branford put on a drive which ended when Jackson tumbled on the Milford three on third down. The score at the end of the half stood 16-0.

In the third Milford scored once with Jaser taking a pass in the end zone thrown by Capt. Ford, Gloria missing the point. In the fourth period, Lane bucked over for his first touchdown, Milford forced a Branford back into the end zone for a safety; Ford scored his third tally of the afternoon on a 42-yard run and Jaser scored on his interception as the game ended.

Verderame's great height under the hoop was a big help on garnering those baskets, as was Ward's in bringing down the ball under the opposition's hoop.

In the opening moments of the game, Bill Clancy, gallant Townies guard, suffered a severe knee wrench and had to be side-lined. It is the hope of his team mates that Bill will see action next Saturday. All in all, it was an interesting contest to the large East Haven delegation, who gathered to see the inaugural tap-off. The Jewish Center boys excelled in the passing department, but just didn't have enough steam in their boilers to stave off the last minute surge of the Townies.

The local club will make a second appearance in the Arena when they square off against the strong N. H. Boys Club in the opener to the first Pro League game in which the Pros take on the Hartford Hurricanes on Saturday night. This will be a severe test for the Townies, as the Boys Club have been getting into condition for several weeks, and as in the past, always put a real classy outfit on the floor.
