AND THE FLOODS CAME

A month ago all of us were wondering would it ever rain again. The past week the answer came, and with a vengeance. East Haven received a good share of moisture, and the combination of heavy rain, high tides and flooded meadows brought a lift to the ground water level which sent water into the basements of many a home. Unfortunately the editorial sanctum sanctorum of your editor was one of these flooded areas, and the transformed basement with its wall-board walls and rug-covered floor was a sight to see Wednesday morning with water covering it to a depth of three inches—more or less.

Only by using boots—pre-war and no longer waterproof—were we able to reach our typewriter and it was no fun typing with cold water trickling around ones toes.

A hurry call brought our good friend Larry Madison, the electrician, with one of his emergency pumps. But the more the pump pumped the more the water came in, and by Thursday night there was just as much water, if not more in our cellar, as the day before.

We got some comfort, however, from seeing a picture in a New York paper Thursday. It showed a row of houses very much like our own neighborhood at Saltonstall, only these were somewhere down in Nassau county. The flood waters were up above the foundation walls and above the hubs of an automobile parked in one of the side yards. Nothing is so bad but what it could be worse.

NOVEMBER STILLNESS

It is good to walk in the East Haven woods in October when the trees are flaunting their autumnal glory. It is good, too, in a different way, to go some weeks later when most of the brightest leaves have fallen and those still on the bough are fading to dull red, bronze, russet. For then there is beauty enough and there is something more.

A cloudless day, with no wind or only a little breeze blowing, is best for a woodland walk up Foxon way in November. On such a day the air is cool while the sun lies with gentle warmth on the shoulders. The dry leaves are thick along the path, rustling underfoot—they send up a fragrance pungent and sweet. The light, sifting through the colored canopy above, glows like a thin flame. In it the trunks of the trees, and the tracery of their branches, stand out sharp and clear.

It may be that a squirrel will go racing up a tree and sit scolding the intruder who has disturbed his labors. Or a crow may rise with protesting caws. But stand still and there will come a silence unmarred by any sound. Nothing will move, unless a leaf falls slowly down. Here is peace, deep, perfect.

And yet it is not the peace of death. The woods are only going to sleep. The seasons are changing and the time of waiting is beginning. Somehow there is a sense of expectancy in the stillness, as if the youngest seedling knows that it will wake once more. Slowly the old earth is tilting her northern hemisphere further from the sun—but will tilt it back again.

THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

Governor McConaughy paid a fine and broadminded compliment to a predecessor of another political faith when he, in his 1947 Thanksgiving Proclamation, quotes the 11 year old statement of former Governor Cross as "the most perfect Thanksgiving proclamation ever issued."

And here, without formal prelude or closing, are the words of the former Governor:

"Time out of mind at turn of the seasons when the hardy oak leaves rustle in the wind and the frost gives a tang to the air and the dusk falls early and the friendly evenings lengthen under the heel of Orion, it has seemed good to our people to join together in praising the Creator and Preserver, who has brought us by a way that we did not know to the end of another year.

"In observance of this custom, I appoint Thursday, the twenty-sixth of November, as a day of Public Thanksgiving for the blessings that have been our common lot and have placed our beloved State with the favored regions of earth—for all the creature comforts; the yield of the soil that has fed us and the richer yield from labor of every kind that has sustained our lives—and for all those things, as dear as breath to the body, that quicken man's faith in his manhood, that nourish and strengthen his spirit to do the great work still before him; for the brotherly word and act; for honor held above price; for steadfast courage and zeal in the long, long search after truth; for liberty and for justice freely granted by each to his fellow and so as freely enjoyed; and for the crowning glory and mercy of peace upon our land—that we may humbly take heart of these blessings as we gather once again with solemn and festive rites to keep our Harvest Home."

Main Street Getting Ready For Christmas Plan Big Illumination

Christmas Lighting Program Receiving Generous Response From Business People

Already the tang of the Christmas season is in the air along Main street. With the Thanksgiving holiday a week from today, the week following will mark the beginning of what promises to be one of the busiest shopping seasons East Haven has yet seen. The retail stores are already preparing for the season and have stocked their shelves with the finest display of Christmas merchandise that they have had in many a year.

The store windows will be gay with Christmas things as December opens and already much Christmas merchandise is being placed upon display counters.

Under the leadership of the East Haven Business Association the merchants are again going ahead with preparations for the decorating and illumination of Main street. Eric Curry of the East Haven Radio Company who headed the committee last year, is again at the helm, and at a meeting of his committee Monday night details were worked out which should give East Haven something to again be proud of this year.

It will be recalled that the decorations and illumination of Main street last year and the year before attracted wide attention and was pronounced to be one of the best examples of merchant cooperation of this kind in southern Connecticut. It added much to the community Christmas spirit and when carried through this year as planned should bring many visitors to East Haven evenings during the shopping season to see the colorful setting.

The extent of the Christmas decorations and illumination is not known at this writing and will depend upon the size of the fund raised. Already, we learn, the feeling of the merchants is that the larger the fund for this community purpose the larger will be the return in good will and business from the townspeople and those who visit from 'outside the local shopping area. New establishments have opened since last season and all old and new establishments seem strongly in favor of bringing to East Haven a real bang-up celebration.

A preliminary visit to the stores of East Haven reveals many things that will be of interest to the shopping public. In the first place, merchandise is being displayed more attractively than ever before in the second place this season's merchandise is much better and in more complete variety than has been noted since before the war years. Take the Christmas cards this year for example. They have been on sale now for some time and

are the most attractive and with far more kinds and designs that we have ever before seen. And so it is with the various gift merchandise, notably toys. The toy departments are fairly teeming with delights for the small tots who are eager to be taken down to the Main street stores to see what Santa Claus is likely to bring to them this Christmas.

Something About Early East Haven

Beverly S. Lovell Writes Interesting Of Town's Early History For The Coe Haven Raven

SOMETHING ABOUT EARLY E. H.

A man named Momauguin, and a man named Davenport made a business deal three hundred and nine years ago this month, and that is how our town began. Momauguin was the chief of a tribe of Quinnipiac Indians, peace-loving people, who had been caught up in wars with the Pequots and the Mahawks, and by the time the Reverend Mr. Davenport arrived from England, there were only forty men left in the tribe. Momauguin and his sister Shampshuh sold a large tract of land for the sum of "12 coats of English cloth, 12 alchemy spoons, 12 hatchets, 12 hoes, two dozens of knives, 12 porringers and 4 cases of French knives and scissors."

The lands of the New Haven Haven colony were distributed by lot and several settlers came to what is now East Haven. The first was Thomas Gregson and his family, who had a farm out here

East Haven Began When Mr. Davenport Made A Deal 300 Years Ago With Mr. Momauguin, She Says

The Indians had wigwams where Forbes Avenue now runs and also along by Townsend Avenue down to the harbor and so on to South End. They had summer villages for fishing and in winter they went into the woods to hunt. Settlers and Indians lived in peace and harmony, apparently, but through wars and disease the Indians gradually died out until in 1725 there only were 20 Indians living on the EastSide. And in 1760 "there died in Guilford the only remaining man Indian between Saybrook and New Haven Ferry" and that same year "there was but one wigwam on the East Haven reservation, — and that was occupied by a squaw and her son 16 years old son".

This was father felt that as long as the boy saw the difference between what was real and what was make-believe, he was in no danger of ever after that when the boy told a "whopper" as he sometimes did, the father would again ask the same question. The boy said now, still with a vigorous imagination which is useful to him in his work.

I think this is a fine example of how a small child was made to see the difference between a make-believe story and reality. The father obviously an intelligent man had grasped the problem, and instead of calling the child any unkind names, helped him to see the right way. If we had more such parents who would be willing to help a little fellow understand the meaning of truth, we would have happier, better-adjusted children.

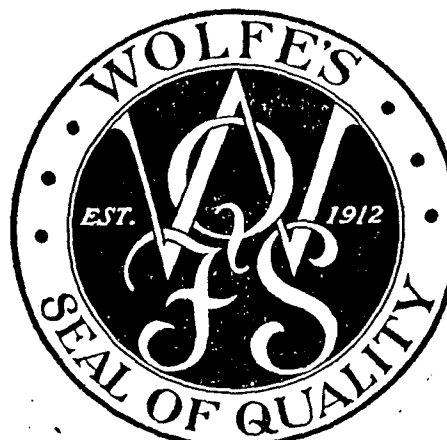
