Grocers do not control the price they must pay for food. They can lower retail prices only to the extent to which they buy wisely, keep their own costs and profits down, and pass along savings resulting from lower wholesale prices to their custome

We base our retail price on the cost to us plus our low cost of doing business including our small profit of about 11/2 cents on each dollar of sales. Therefore, we can say A&P prices will follow the market trend, and that any further reduction in the cost of food to us, or in our costs of doing business, will promptly result in lower prices in our stores.

The Connecticut Light and Power Company's 1947 tax bill was just about one-half the total amount our 188,801 domestic customers paid us for our electric service last year. In other words, each dollar you and our other domestic customers paid us during 1947 was torn right in half by taxes.

Since 1939 our taxes, which YOU pay, have increased 146 per cent. YOU pay them, because every cent we spend in taxes comes directly from the money you pay us in return for your service. Last year YOUR money helped pay our federal taxes, state taxes, local taxes to 154 communities, and Connecticut's new Sales and Use Tax. Although the Sales and Use Tax was in effect only six months of last year, we estimate that hereafter our share of that tax will cost YOU \$375,000 annually.

Our other expenses have also risen rapidly. Since 1939 the average annual wage per Connecticut Light and Power Company employee has increased 62 per cent. The cost of coal per ton is up 86 per cent and the average cost of necessary materials and supplies has increased 56 per cent.

So far, greater use of electricity by our customers and improved operating efficiencies have made it possible for us to meet the rising costs of supplying your electric service without adjusting your rates. However, that task becomes increasingly difficult with each passing day.
