### A PROMOTION LONG OVERDUE

We do not know why it was necessary for the Board of Public Safety to take nearly five months to promote Sgt. Edwin B. Priest to be chief of the East Haven Police Department to succeed the late Hugh J. Farrell who died last year.

We do not know what transpired at the Board of Public Safety meetings, because as reported in the New Haven Register: "the board's policy is not to make public announcement on business con-

ducted during its meetings."

We do know, however that the promotion, which has now tardilly come to this efficient and qualified member of our Police Department, is fitting and long overdue.

Chief Priest has an enviable record as a guardian of law and order in East Haven. He was appointed as a supernumerary in July, 1927, was made a patrolman Oct. 1, 1928 and received advancements to Grade B in May 1929, Grade A in October 1930, and to the sergeancy in July 1934. He is a career man in the police service, and has demonstrated his merit through very excellent police work, through his studies of modern police methods, his general attitude toward his work during the years, and his ability to get along with his fellow employees and the public.







## SPACIOUS GYM NOT LISTED IN SCHOOL PLANS

Proof That Adequate Gymnasium May Bo Further Away Than Ever Is Revealed In School Chairman John Sliney's Assertion That Present Plans Do Not Include The Floor Space BY BILL AHERN

Any possibility that the new school will have in its makeup a gymasium of sufficient size to make it worthwhile to the town seemed dissapated at last Tuesday night's P.T.A. forum when chairman John Sliney of the School Board stated that in his opinion such a building could not e included in the cost of erecting a new school.

It is believed that such a project is privately endorsed by school oard members but the need for the public institution is so crying that they will not jeopardize the completeness of the proposed secondary school by including in their estimate of the building costs a complete

.They do include a small gym suitable for the elementary purposes

for which it will be put. Many of the town's citizens believe that if a spectator gym is not

built now it will never be erected in Branford. They draw a parallel in the gym built when the present high school was constructed. In less than a score of years its usefulness has ended. Today, it stands as a colossal monstrosity to the shortsighted vision of the town's leaders in the late 1920's.

Loose talk speaks of a super gym.

Such a topic was used to ridicule the proper plans proposed, in the late twenties, for a gymnasium. One supercilious person, doubtless believing himself to be a Mark Antony, orated at length on a swimming pool of ornate style constructed of Carrara marble and a Viennese stairway with a golden ballustrade leading to its perfumed waters.

No one believes such rot. The town wants and needs a gymnasium.
