### A NEW HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

It is gratifying that the powers guiding East Haven's education al policies have seen fit to vote meritted recognition to a member of the local high school staff in the naming of a puncipal to succeed William E. Fagerstrom whose resignation becomes effective June 30. Carl Garvin, the new appointee, comes to the important administrative post with admirable training and background, and has won the place over a number of outside candidates as well as three local ones.

Mr. Garvin has had longer experience, we are told, than any of the other men on the High School Staff, and he has been with the school since its beginning in 1936.

His qualifications are many. He graduated from Berwick Acade my, South Berwick, Me., in 1922 and secured his B.S. and M.Ed. de grees at the University of New Hampshire in 1926 and 1932. He studied at Harvard and Trinity Colleges in 1935 and 1937 and work-Hostesses wi

cd toward Ph.D at Yale in 1939.40 and 1945.46. He began his teaching eareer in Colby Junior College, New Lon-don, N.II., in 1926 and from 1926 to 1936 was head of the Science Department, assistant principal and acting principal of Sauborn Semin-

ary, Kingston, N. H. For the past 12 years he has headed the Science Department at East Haven High, for ten years he has directed the Extra-Curricular Activities, and for eight years has been director of Visual Aids. In 1947 he was an instructor in Extension Courses at New Britain Teachers College and since 1946 has acted in the same capacity a New Haven Teachers College.

It is fortunate that an East Haven man so well fitted to occupy the post as principal of the High School was available. We congratulate the Board of Education for the choice it has made for this key position in our school system, and we wish for Carl Garvin a happy continuation of his already successful career in school teaching and administration.

THAT JONES BOY BY BILL AHERN

Page Eight

In the constellation of Branford baseball brilliance; out of all its diamond stars, one flared with the brightness of Halley's comet. Seen here for only the short minutes of his youth, John Raymond Jones, according to fervent avowals, was the solar sun of excellance around which the national game revolved.

He was the son of James L. and the late Mary A. Jones and was born in Branford on November 16, 1896. He had three brothers, Frank, now deceased, James, now of West Haven and Charles, a carbon copy of his brother's build. Charlle, after carving out an enviable record as a semi-pro athlete, today is a member of the school board. A sister, Margaret, rounded out the family picture.

The dominent feature of Ray Jones' early life was his burning desire to play the big leagues some day. Like every kid of forty years ago, he spent much of his time working the battered glove with oil, picking out the right bat and, even more, playing from early morning until late at night with a sculled, and sometimes, taped, horschide.

After his high school days, where he first commenced to show visible signs of athletic greatness, the lad took a position with the Bouthern New England Telephone Company. There he worked out of both the Hartford and New Haven offices.

Diamond 1-Branford Pkg, But his baseball was born on Driscoll's lot, which was the birthplace, 49'ers—Geler Diamond 2—Old Timers vs Sportsalso, of the fabulous Hustler's A.C., a unit which even today, knows no equal in the pages of Branford's sports history.

It was the same lot which houses the development known as Mill Creek Road.

This amazing bunch of kids numbered among their starting array, besides Jones who played short stop, Jim Carney, at the initial sack. That is the same Jim Carney, who now resides in the city of Burlington, Vt., where he owns the city's biggest haberdashery shop. He was regional director for the Office of Price Administration during the past war. John Kelly, an employee of the railroad, was at second base. At third, Tommy Corcoran held forth with the steadiness and security of the vault at Fort Knox, Ky. Frank Reynolds, Norby Johnson and Joe Driscoll were the outfield pickets. Butch Hall, uncle of Betty Ann Sliney, New Rochelle's greatest college girl athlete, was the pitcher. Charles "Kid" Callahan, member of the Board of Police Commissioners, was behind the plate,

Jumping Joe Dugan, later with the New York Yankees as guard-Sportsmen ian of the dizzy corner, was a shortstop when he played here with the Stony Creek A. A. New Haven Colonials, who were managed by a high school kid, George Saltonstall A. C. Weiss, now general manager of the same Yankees. Chick Bowen, Holy Old Timera Cross graduate, and later in the fold of the New York Glants, who now Pilgrim Brotherhood is the assistant principal at New Haven High School following a specta-Carver Club cular coaching career at the same institution, was at third. Luke Crowe Italian Americans was a member of that unit and later Frank McGowan, of this town reached the major leagues on the strength of his association with that INTER CHURCH BASEBAL organization, 1.

From the Hustlers, the Jones boy went to the Branford Town Team and later was with Waterbury of the old Connecticut League. His fielding grace, batting prowress, alertness and strong throwing arm, soon made him the envy of other state players and the idol of all Connecticut fandom.

But in the midst of that promising career, Ray Jones became sick. At first, it was only a general tiredness which he shook off with the same dogged spirit with which he played his beloved game.

Still the feeling persisted and finally he retired from sports. Later doctors diagnosed bis allment and in 1926 it was determined that he would have to go tr, Saranac Lake, N.Y. for treatment. Once he reached that institution, he never returned to town and there he died on July 17, 1929.

The greatest story of his ability is not told of the hey day of his diamond prominence but only a few days before he left town for all time.

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
