It was Dave Hylenski who first relayed to the astute Kelly that information that there was a backwoods lad up on a farm who wanted to play football. Brought down to the playing field Chet Tisko moved into the all time ranks as one of the best, if not the best, lineman who ever worked for the Laurels. Literally, if not actually, Tisko is the basis of the old story. "I ask him which way is north. If he takes his finger off the plow handles, I pay no attention. But-if he points the direction with the plow, I sign him up." Chet was strong. He was fast and he had savvy.

There were many individual duels and top notch ones when the Laurels played their state opponents. Billy Druell used to kick sensationally for the East Rocks but Mikey Cooke was greater for the Laurels. Joe Lawson and Johnny King used to match their ability to pick plays against that of Kopski and Jones when the Boys Club faced the Laurels.

It was like a great fight between two wild stallions when Tisko used to face Beans Leary and Jim McDermott in some of the greatest exhibitions of line play ever seen here.

It was in one of those battles in Branford that Hylenski rinned the tendons in his knee and suffered a torn cartiledge at the close of a run in which he ran through the blue and gray of New Haven at least three times.

The power of his name was a great attraction at the gate and brought envy to the opponents. In the last game ever played between the two clubs, in a blizzard at the old Weiss Park, Hylenski, who would not play because of his injuries was prevailed upon to dress and run through signals just to impress and make jittery Branford's opponents.

Some years later he came back under Johnny King and played with the Laurels. It was was a backfield he likes to think about. Parcinski, Laich, King and himself were the starting quartet with Heb Williams doing spot assignments. That unit marked itself with glory in the Wallingford Walco series.

Over the years, he has kept in condition with bowling. For years he has made the trek to the American Bowling Congress, except when the distance has been too far, and each time he has come home with a portion of the prize money-enough to cover expenses at least.

In New Haven they give him credit for being the best big pin roller in these parts.

He likes to bowl best with Hugo Mann, Jack Doolittle, Frank Abiondi. Eddie Kamb and Joe Resjan, at least that is the sextet which he annually sponsors. Deep down he believes that if the Branford bowlers would combine, even as the softball teams should combine, for the benefit of the town's reputation, at least once Branford would be able to knock off top prize money.

Even today, Hylenski takes a second base spot with his own Sportsmen. His accurate batting eye gives him a near top berth among the team's hitters.

He is avid in his interest in youngsters.

In any of the town's undertakings, he is always there in a financial way. This does not make him a sucker in any form but merely one whose interest in public affairs transcends personal recompense.

Many times in his baseball career, he was offered tryouts with bigger clubs. He never took them. In Branford life, however, he never did have a tryout. He was always major league.



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
