WORKING TOGETHER FOR GOOD

The Greater New Haven Community Chest Campaign to fill the needs of New Haven, and the adjacent participating towns, got underway this week. The needs for the services by the Chest Agencies are greater than ever before, yet at the same time the public ability to give is at low ebb due to the increasing cost of living and the demands by local, state and national governments for more taxes. We feel that the Community Chest should have a priority upon our pocketbooks when we apportion our budget for the coming year. Therefore we are glad to present the following facts given us by Carl N. Hansen, lieutenant-commander for the East Haven Division in the current Community Chest Campaign:

"Last year, as we all know, was one in which the rising cost of living spiraled almost out of our reasonings. Nevertheless, there were from our town of East Haven over fifty families and children receiving aid from Family Service, Catholic Social Service Bureau, Children's Center, and Highland Heights. It has been estimated that the services rendered these persons cost the Community Chest Ageneies approximately \$4,000.

East Haven persons numbering 680 received either public health nursing or dental care and residents from East Haven spent over 3,300 days in Grace-New Haven Community Hospital. Community Chest cost is estimated at over \$3,600.

"Well over 1,000 boys and girls from our town participated in such organizations as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Y.W.C.A., Y.M.C.A., New Haven Boys Club and Neighborhood Music School which are among the 31 ageneies of the Community Chest Council. This represented a cost to the Council of approximately \$5,500.

'The above estimates, as determined by the ageneies involved are not absolute nor, obviously perfect, but do represent a good basis of comparison with the \$3,500 raised in the town plus an additional \$4,000 from East Haveners working in the eity. It is evident that the \$13,000 spent for East Haveners is in excess of the amount raised by approximately \$5,500."

Why not? Because morials, generally speaking, do not know God. They have been brought up to believe that an accurate knowledge of God is denied them. Why, no one has been able to ex-plain. There is nothing more nat-ural to man than an understanding of God, his source. Christ Jesus said, "I know whence I came, and whither I go" (John 8:14). You and I are en-fitled to know that too.

Reliable Information about God Is it not time to challenge the ignorance and mystery which so many mortals have come to accept as inevitable concerning God? We need to abandon a mere belief that there is a God, and gain an under-standing of what God is, where God is, what God is doing, and how the intelligent power of Deity can be utilized by each individual to bring health, happiness, and suc-cess into his daily life. While the Master ofton referred to God as Father—"my Father" and "your Father"—Jesus certainly was not thinking at some unknown address, high up in the sky, for he defined God as. What is Usually Done Suppose Mr. A awakens on a winter morning with a sore throat, is honrse, and has a fever. If he would say in effect: My material body, its nerves and material sen-sations, say I have a cold, so I have one. My body tells me how I am. I shall get some material medicine and pour it into my siomach, hoping it will in some way drive out this unpleasant thing. Mr. A believes he is a mortal, in a material environment and body, and that he must take what matter doles out to him and then endeavor to get rid of it by pouring some other matter into the body which says it has a cold.

What a Christian Scientist Does What a Christian Scientist Does But it Mr. A were a Christian Scientist, he would do something different. He would mentally deny that he was, an afflictable bundle of material cells, subject to mate-rial climatic and atmospheric con-ditions. He would affirm that God alone is the cause of man, and so of his life, that God causes him to be His expression and to be healthy and harmonious, spiritual and God-like, superior to the so-called ma-terial mind, its heat or its cold, and incapable of being congested, conditioned, or controlled by its unintelligent, tawless, truthless bellets.

beliefs. He would cling steadfastly to the true idea of cause and effect, of God as infinite Mind and of man as Mind's expression, and repudi-ate the false sense of cause and effect—the material mind and its negative, mortal sense of man-see his unity with the true and his

separateness from the false, and so win his freedom. He would know the truth which divine Mind gives him the ability to know, and so would free hinself from the error which has no place in intelligent Mind or its manifestation, man. Simple, rational, logical. The requisites—courage to deny what he has been erroneously educated to believe is himself, willingness to accept the spiritual idea of God and man taught by the Master and Christian Science, and humbly to conform his thought and life, step by step, thereto.

The purpose of Christian Science treatment is, through understand-ing prayer, to deny reality to the unreal, the evil and discordant, and to realize reality to be God and His creation, including man. Is there anything astounding about this? Perhaps it shocks human thought and mortal self to think of denying their claim to reality, and very possibly this mind needs to be shocked until it accepts this inescapable requirement to the discovery of true being.

• Repudiation of Material Self Necessary

The principal work is to over-come, to surrender and get rid of, the false material sense of self which is evil's only agency for self-assertion. We must choose our status-either as a physical puppet of the so-called mortal, material mind responsive to its suggestions status—either as a physical puppet of the so-called mortal, material mind, responsive to its suggestions of fear, hate, selfishness, resent-ment, sickness, animality, and lack, or as the individual expres-sion of the Mind or Intelligence that is God, having no other parent, responsive to no will but the di-vine, daily expressing obedience to the Principle that governs the universe. Christ Jesus said to those who were wanting to follow in the way of spritual life he taught, "11 any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me" (Matt. 16:24). Self-Will, Our Worst Enemy Let' us stop the futile effort of trying, as material self often does, to will our way through life, stop being like the parrot that echoed its owner's poor philosophy, "I want what I want, I want what I want." It is this ignorant. blind human will that Mrs. Eddy calls "the motive-power of error" (Sci-ence and Health, 5 597). It wrecks lives, homes, businesses; It blocks progress and threatens the world's peace.

procifess and threatens the world's peace. One form of human will is to be determined to have one's way in dealing with others, disregarding what is God's will for man. An-other form is to be willing to be apathetic to God's control, to be willing to accept and condone bad habits, old grudges, and continu-ing enslavement to ignorance of God and man. Human will is our worst enemy. The antidote is the understanding of God, and man as His expression, found through hu-mility, or the willingness to let the Mind that is God be the one guid-ing influence in our lives.
