GRANDDAUGHTER AND THE TOOTHACHE

Granddaughter, who is now going on six (how the time does fly) spent a week end recently with a howling toothache, and on the following Monday paid a hurried visit to the Dentist. Incidentally Grandfather, who accompanied her on her next trip a few days later received, from the Dentist, a rather liberal education on the needs for dental care for children. Because there is so much talk in East Haven these days of the need for setting up a dental clinic for school youngsters we pass on some of the information we gained while granddaughter was getting dental attention.

50% of our children have dental decay at age 2
80% of our children have dental decay at age 3
90% of our children have dental decay at age 4
96% of our children have dental decay at age 5
25% of our children are dental cripples at age 5
85% of our children need dental care three times each year.
18,000 out of the first 900,000 draftees in World War II were disqualified because of bad teeth.

Dental care cannot be started too early. The deciduous (first teeth) are designed to perform certain definite and important functions. For this reason, every effort should be made to keep them in a healthy condition until the time arrives for their replacement by the permanent set. The chief reasons for preserving the baby teeth are to prevent bad chewing habits and their evil consequences, to assist growth of the jaws, and to avoid irregularities in the permanent set of teeth.

If decay is allowed to progress and remain untreated, the chewing mechanism is hindered. The child soon learns to avoid chewing on a painful tooth or is unable to chew properly where spaces are left. Proper chewing is important because digestive functions begin in the mouth. Too often lack of proper chewing causes digestive and intestinal upsets which interfere with proper physical development, and in later years, act as a menace to health.

The need for children's dentistry cannot be denied.

MUSIC FOR THE PEOPLE

We are in receipt, thanks to the New Haven Federation of Musicians, of a very beautiful brochure "Music for the People", being a report of the American Federation of Musicians covering the first two years of its free public music program, during which time three million dollars was expended.

East Haven shared in this program of music for the people, the bands played at the Community Christmas parties the past two Christmas seasons, and at the Red Men's Block dance last summer, having been provided by this great fund.

The report was prepared by the much maligned James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians, who fought so hard for the establishment of the Recording and Transcription Fund. That fund, created by a small payment on all records made by union instrumentalists, made possible the hiring of thousands of other union musicians to provide free public music throughout the United States and Canada.

Mr. Petrillo says among other things: "The impact of our fund has been two-fold. It has enabled millions to hear live music, most often in places where it has not up to now been available. It has also served as a shot in the arm to a profession beset by the unbridled competition of canned music of all kinds."

The spending has fallen into four roughly equal parts, projects for veterans, for civilian hospitals and other institutions, for parades and public concerts, and for teen-age dances. Each project, and there were thousands of them has been left in the hands of the local proposing it. Complete records were kept and audited. Sponsors were government groups, park directors, chambers of commerce, fraternal organizations.

The report is replete with photographs and explanatory material giving a complete cross-section of the great movement which brought and is still bringing music to the people. More than 23,000 performances of free music were provided in the 48 states, seven Canadian provinces and the Territory of Hawaii, by more than 700 local unions of musicians.

A RARE MUSICAL TREAT

We are informed that William Steffe, who will be the guest artist at the third in the series of concerts of the East Shore Community Concert Association, is one of the best known of American baritone and his coming to the East Haven High School Auditorium on Friday, March 18 will be a rare treat for music lovers in this area.

Edwin Steffe's successes have been equally noteworthy in grand opera, light opera, in recital and oratorio. Born in Washington, D.C., and a direct descendant of that William Steffe, who in 1852 wrote the music for what was to become practically a national anthem—"The Battle Hymn of the Republic".

At eight, Edwin Steffe was awarded a singing scholarship at the National Cathedral School, and was the soprano soloist at the Washington Cathedral; later he was to be its baritone soloist. Studying at the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore under Frank Bibb, he made his recital and operatic debut in Washington. Soon after the young man was musically encouraged when Nadia Boulanger, the famous French composer and conductor, invited him to sing the baritone part in Faure's Requiem.

Starting as soloist at Radio City in New York several years ago, this versatile artist has won ever wider recognition in the music field. He toured with the Columbia Concerts Opera Company, singing Escamillo in its "Opera-Comique version" of "Carmen" in English. Last season he was soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Toronto Symphony, and the Houston Symphony. He is in constant demand for important oratorio works, and has repeatedly sung with the famous Bach Choir of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.

1948 marked the third successive summer Edwin Steffe was featured at the St. Louis Municipal Opera where he was starred in major singing-acting roles.

The Civilian Blood Bank is the outstanding peace time program which is being sponsored by the National Red Cross, by means of which blood will be available to all civilians without cost regardless of financial status. For this cost, 43% of the amount raised here in Town will be sent to National Headquarters, the remaining 57% per cent being kept locally to continue the regular peace time program of Safety Services, Home Nursing, First Aid, Disaster Relief, Home Service and Production Under Safety Services, more than 150 children availed themselves of the free Water Safety Program which was held this last Summer and for several Summers previously, at the Momauguin. This course is conducted by certified Red Cross instructors and is open to all children over seven years of age. First Aid is taught in the High School and all Police and Fire men are trained in same. Within a short time a Refresher Course will be held for these two departments, same being approved by the Board of Public Safety. "One Great Hour" On Radio March 26

Over 76,000 churches representing every major Christian denomination and communion have united to take one simultaneous offering for world relief at Church Services on Sunday, March 27, according to joint statement issued from New York City by Bishop John S. Stamm, President of Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America; Mrs. Harper Sibley, President, United Council of Church Women; Mrs. Fred W. Ramsay, Executive Vice President, Church World Service and Dr. Winn Fairfield, Chairman of The Secretariat Council, Foreign Missions Conference of North American.

Whole hearted, nationwide support for this history making effort of churches in America was urged in the statement which quoted in full as follows:

"Never before in the history of the world have the churches of Europe and Asia been faced with greater problems and responsibilities. The fate of our civilization may well be in the ability of the churches and especially the churches overseas to meet their responsibilities in carrying forth the Christian ministry. That is why this nationwide united effort by America's Christians has an importance far beyond the practical goal of fund raising. For this great joint program will not only strengthen the vitally important relief and rehabilitation work of the churches overseas but will also prove to all the world just how great is the power generated when Christians unite in such a great common cause."

Among the major denominations and communions participating in this one great offering on Sunday, March 27, are the Northern Baptist Convention; Southern Baptist Convention; Church of the Brethren; Congregational Christian Church; Disciples of Christ; Evangelical Reformed Church; Friends Five Year Meeting; National Lutheran Council; Methodist Church; United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.; Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.; Roman Catholic Church; The Protestant Episcopal Church in Russian Orthodox Church of North America; Rumanian Orthodox Episcopate of America; Serbian Eastern Orthodox Church.

Over 36,000,000 pieces of preparatory literature have already been placed in the hands of pastoral leaders across the country to prepare their congregations for this great Christian demonstration on Sunday, March 27.

This inter-denomination promotion will culminate on Saturday evening, March 26, with a nationwide radio program—"One Great Hour"—which will be broadcast for the churches of America by the contribution of the full networks of C. B. S., A. B. C. and M. B. S. from 10 to 11 P. M. EST (9 to 10 P. M. CST; 8 to 9 P. M. MST; 7 to 8 P. M. PST). "One Great Hour"—written under the great playwright and author, Robert Sherwood, and by Erik Barnouw National President of the Radio Writers' Guild—will dramatize the great need of the people in Europe and Asia for food, medicine and clothing and even more important, the great hunger of these people for the Christian faith and strength that will help them to rebuild their war-torn world.

"One Great Hour" will close with an appeal from the churches in America to the American people to go to church on Sunday morning, March 27, and make there a truly sacrificial gift which will be received in the name of Christ for all humanity.

It is hoped that this one great united offering in 76,000 churches on Sunday morning, March 27, will enable each participating denomination and communion to carry forth its world relief work for an entire year.

Revised Rates Will Provide New Revenue

Revised electric and gas rates of The Connecticut Light and Power Company, as approved by the Connecticut Public Utilities Commission, became effective February 27, 1949, and will provide estimated additional annual revenue of about \$1,044,000.

The number of both electric and gas rates has been materially reduced by the company in the interest of simplification, and each customer of the company will receive a copy of his new rate with the March service bill.

The new electric rates will provide estimated additional revenue of \$1,044,000 annually. This amount, which will be secured from all classes of the company's customers, does not include application of a fuel adjustment clause to residential electric rates as authorized by the Commission's Order of January 28, 1949.

Based on estimates of fuel costs submitted by the company last fall, the Commission calculated that residential electric fuel adjustment would provide about \$408,000 per year. Actually, due to the increase in fuel costs since that time, it is now estimated that the fuel adjustment clause will add seven cents to the bill of the customer using exactly 100 kilowatt-hours.

In sharp contrast to costs of other necessities, the cost per kilowatt-hour of electricity under the new rates will be less than the rate in effect in January 1938. March 1949 costs, with the fuel adjustment applied, will be 20 cents less than in January 1938 for 15 kilowatt-hours; eight cents less for 40 kilowatt-hours; five cents less for 80 kilowatt-hours; ten cents less for 120 kilowatt-hours; and 41 cents less than rates in effect in January 1938 for 180 kilowatt-hours.

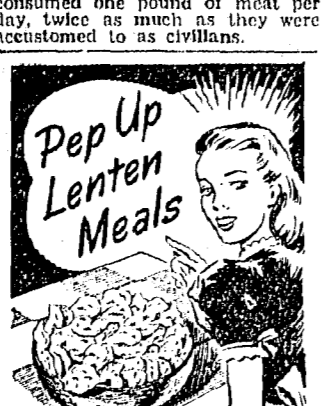
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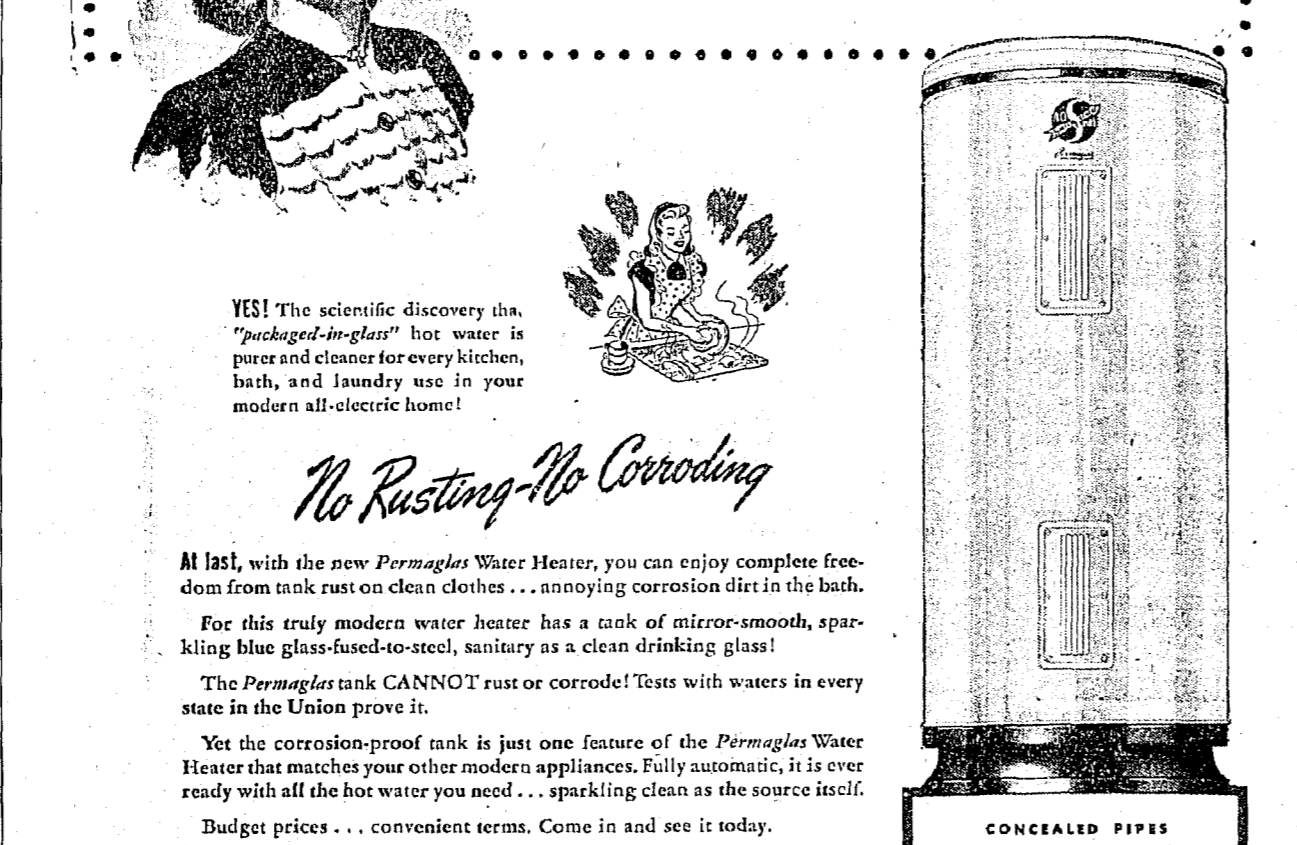

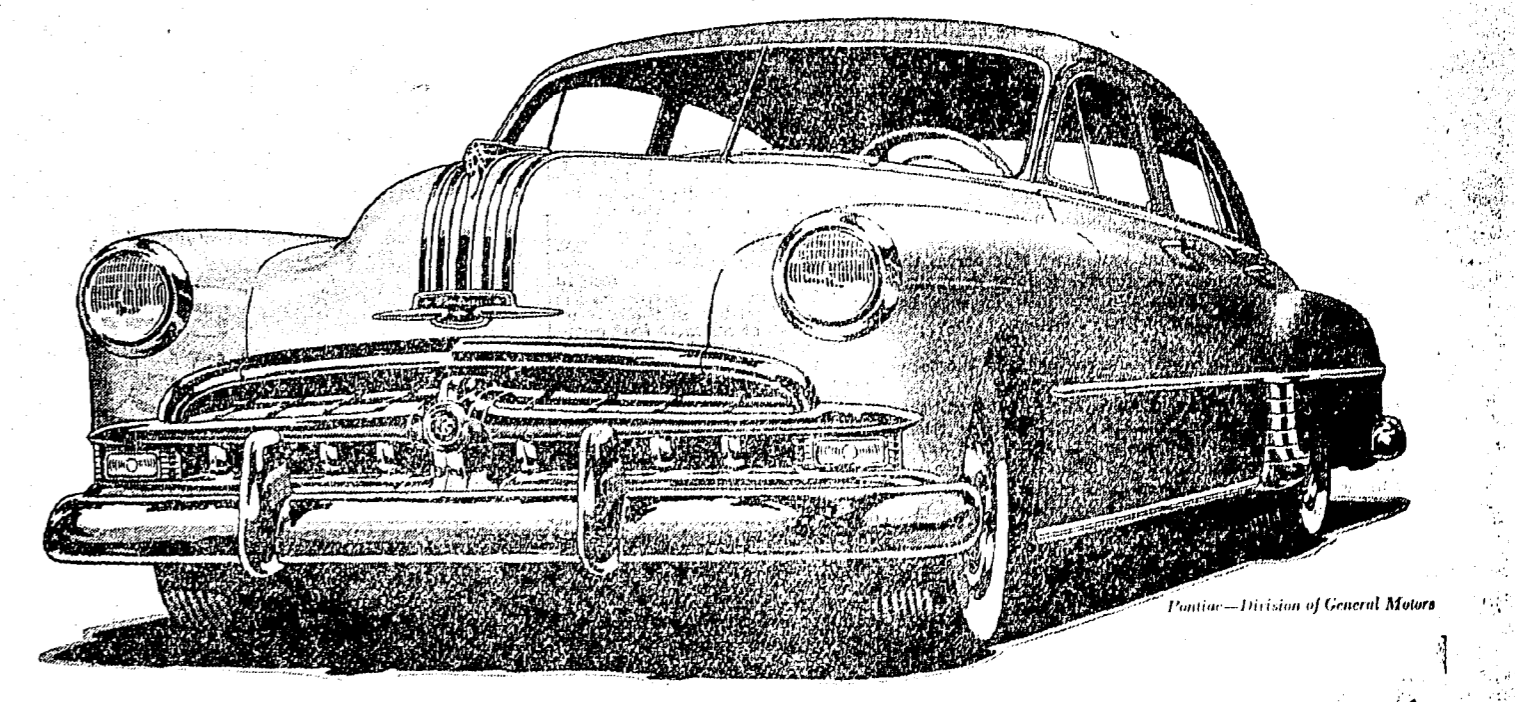
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
