itizens. For instance, start an election argument, and the oratory goes on and on But at the last national election about half of us didn't bother to vote.



New Local Telephone Cable Project Nears Completion in Branford



On a cable platform, twenty feet above the intersection of the Boston Post. Road and Matthew Road, cable splicer L. Richard DeBow (right), who lives at 84 Cedar Street, Branford, and his helper, Fergus T. Mooney, of Totoket. Road, Branford; splice in a section of new cable - part of a \$2,000 project to help keep pace with the demand for telephones in the Branford Hills section of the Branford exchange.

New cables, containing more than 95 miles of wire, are being placed on Matthew Road, Brainerd Road and Mona Avenue - extending almost the entire length of each street.

Scheduled for completion this month, this \$2,000 project in the Branford exchange is typical of telephone activity throughout the state in this, the fourth year of the largest construction program in Connecticut telephone history.






