TOWN AWAITS PRESENTATION OF PASSION PLAY NEXT WEEK AT HIGH SCHOOL AUDITORIUM

The Passion Play, From the Manger to the Throne, will be presented for the first time in history in East Haven for five straight nights in the High School auditorium starting next Monday evening at 7:30. The production is identically the same as the Play which has been presented in the Plymouth Church in New Haven for the past nineteen years.

The Rev. Duane Hatfield, of Old Stone Church will portray The Ohristus, Over 125 other East Haven residents will appear in the twelve part, drama.

Over eighty others are concerned with producing the Passion Play which was written and is directed by Raymond L. Clarke. The drama taken from the Life and Passion of Jesus as gleaned from the Four Gospels.

Unique in the production will be a dramatic musical composition, "March to Calvary" written by an East Haven man, Cornelius R. Johns, Mr. Johns is professor of music and philosophy at Larson College, and studied with David Dean Smith while a student at the Yale School of Music.

FOUNDER'S DAY PROGRAM FOR PARENT-TEACHERS SLATED THIS EVENING

The new expressway will intersect Saltonstall Parkway in the vicinity of Vergason's Flower Shop. First Selectman, Frank S. Clancy said this week following Monday's meeting with state highway commissioner G. Albert Hill in the East Haven Town Hall.

With minor charges the proposed road is acceptable to the zoning commission and the town planning committee, Clancy said.

The town's chief executive said that the exact location would be withheld by him until certain maps from the state highway commissioner's office arrive in town to substantiate Clancy's claim.

The present highway west of the proposed point of connection will be rebuilt into a six lane road as an approach to the planned new bridge which will extend over the New Haven Harbor.

By locating near the Flower Shop, the town will be able to maintain most of the property designated as industrial zones, Clancy said.

A three percent grade leading to a new railroad overpass will cross the railroad tracks about in the same area. High Street will remain untouched where its overpass extends across the railroad, Clancy said.
