LOCAL REPUBLICANS HEAR PRESCOTT BUSH IN BRANFORD TALK

Speaking before a large crowd at the social sponsored by the Men's and Women's Republican Clubs last Tuesday night at Grange Hall, Prescott S. Bush, candidate for the Republican nomination for U. S. Senator, discussed the "Forgotten Man and Taxes."

Mr. Bush defined the forgotten man as the average citizen who makes up seventy-five to eighty per cent of the population of the United States, who is a good solid citizen, paying his taxes and his bills, who is thrifty and law-abiding, who is the butcher and the baker, the loyal union member, who may be Republican or Democrat. The twenty per cent of our population who are economically under privileged, usually through no fault of their own, are not forgotten. They rightfully receive more attention than anybody from both public and private sources.

But the average forgotten man is the average taxpayer, who foots the bills.

Bush was introduced by Samuel W. Beach, Chairman of the Republican Town Committee, who also welcomed State Representatives Alice T. Peterson and Frank Kaminsky of Branford, State Senator William Jaspers of East Haven, George C. Rogers, High Sheriff of New Haven County, and Jack Lawlor, Chairman of the Republican Town Committee of East Haven.

There are not enough taxes to pay for current government spending, Mr. Bush pointed out, and therefore the government borrows. This is deficit financing. "How long," Bush asked, "would your family survive if it were living on borrowed money?" The government, he said, is no different from our families and has nothing but what it takes from us in taxes.

The dollar's purchasing power is the measure of government credit, Mr. Bush explained. It is our dollar, our insurance, and our pensions, and its buying power is declining as the value as government credit has declined. "Good Democrats," Mr. Bush said, "and all Republicans agree that there is no excuse for deficit financing today

Impressive ceremonies marked the presentation of the American Legion Merit Medal to Lester Knapp, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Knapp of 22 Clark Avenue, at the high school auditorium last Monday evening.

The medal was presented by Brigadier General James P. Redding before a disappointingly small crowd which included civic and Legion officers in addition to the General. Members of the Legion Auxiliary were also present and assisted in the ceremonies.

Lester was awarded the honor for his courage and quiet thinking when he saved his eight year old brother, James' life last Washington's birthday.

The boys were playing in the woods about a half mile from home when James lost his grip on a "Tarzan Swing" and fell puncturing his lung while breaking two ribs.

Young Lester quickly hoisted his brother on his shoulder and half carried and half dragged the boy to his home where help was summoned.

Doctors later credited the boy with saving his brother's life by his prompt action.

The honor followed on the Knapp boy is national one and represents the wearer as being a person of great courage.

General Redding's congratulatory words, upon bestowing the medal, consisted of, "Done Like A Soldier, Son."

A request for additional appropriations will be made by the School Building Committee when it appears before the Board of Finance at the next meeting, it was announced over last week-end.

A previous request made by the committee to appear before the finance board earlier was withdrawn to enable the building committee to prepare a new list of figures, it was reported.

At an early date today no request for the new meeting had been made. The new requests would cover the costs of completing the Momauguin and Union Schools in order to comply with the minimum standards recommended by Charles F. Riche, Jr., director of the State Public School Building Commission.

In a prepared statement given to a meeting of town officials, school board members and organizational head on April 11, a statement of account estimated that an additional appropriation of \$26,000.10 would be needed to complete the projects. The original appropriation for Union School was \$185,000 and at Momauguin \$165,000 was granted for the work.

It is on these figures that the Building Committee is reportedly working.

Riche reaffirmed his statements made at the meeting by a letter to the committee which reads: "You are correct in assuming that I am ready and willing to recommend that State Aid be granted to town of East Haven for Union School extension and alteration project in the amount of one-third of construction costs, provided the building and grounds are completed in substantial accordance with the architect's plans submitted and cost estimates approximating \$188,705.83."

"Further, I am ready and willing to recommend to the Commission that State Aid be granted for the Momauguin School extension and alteration project on the basis of the \$300 per pupil formula, provided the building and the present site of approximately three and one-half acres are completed in substantial accordance with the architect's plan submitted and the cost estimates approximately \$188,705.83."

Two Formulas Used

Riche in his visit to meeting of various town board and organizations explained the two formulas used in determining the amount of State Aid for an elementary school building, one being an allowance of \$300 per pupil for the capacity of the building counting 30 pupils per classroom; the alternate formula is one-third of the construction cost and the grant is the lesser of these two amounts.

Landscape Architect Davis recommended that the work on the high school field should be started within the next two or three weeks in order to take advantage of the Spring rains so that the new seeding would be able to carry through the dry months of the Summer otherwise seeding should not be done until September. If postponed until September the turf would be so thin by the football season of next year that it would be greatly damaged by use, he said whereas if seeded in May of this year it would have two full growing seasons which would permit substantial development of turf. Mr. Davis also explained his proposal for the development of Union, Gerrish and Laurel School grounds showing his preliminary estimates on the cost of completing each project and also showing the amount of work which could be done on each project by using only the fund provided in the original appropriations. No definite action was taken on any of the proposals. Mr. Davis stated that he would be able to complete preliminary studies for all projects within three or four days.

O'Connor Resigns

The chairman, Edward Donroe, submitted a letter from Arthur T. O'Connor, tendering his resignation as a member of the School Building Committee. The appointment of a new member for this committee will be made by the School Planning Committee.

THE VARSITY SHOW

Eleven years ago the still unfamiliar students at East Haven High, in the manner of all kids their eyes immediately focused on productions styled a cinema. Many of the students had been enrolled at New Haven High School previous to matriculating at the new school west of Branford and had seen the "Happy Days" production which played added to the efforts of the athletic association treasury of Hillside. Others who had been enrolled at Commercial, remembered their light operatics which nearly always featured some Gilbert and Sullivan show.

In the short run, the school had only recently departed on a program of interscholastic athletics and then, as now, was looking for outside ways to carry its program to a satisfactory financial completion.

A review, which would bring out all the latent talent of the students, was decided upon and from that moment the Blue and Gold Varsity Show was born.

From its first year it was successful beyond the hopes of the most optimistic student or teacher. Constant rehearsal had put a professional polish on the thespians and more than amateur touches, in the orchestral pit and in the lighting and direction and scenery, gave the show the smoothness of which an audience is barely conscious but to the experienced observer, it is a vital part of the show's success.

When the applause had died down after the three night effort of the youngsters a substantial sum had been realized and in the mind of the faculty officer, a new show was a-born.

For ten years the pattern has been nearly the same. Different styled and called for a different presentation but in general the songs were built around the vobst and the dances about the ability of the dancers to twinkle their toes.

This year the theme was different.

Thanks to the same faculty officer, Joe Mayo, the show was created to follow the song fashions of the first fifty years of the twentieth century. The costumes were authentic from the long silk-stockinging bathing attire of the 1912 belle through the long, flared, flared, flared gowns of the late 20's flapper down to the smooth, flatter, flatter, flatter of the present era.

Although much of the credit went to the direction, the choral numbers as devised and coached by Mrs. John Starnberg, Mrs. Frank Collins, Miss Hilde Swenson and Miss Joan Lynch, the dances staged by Yola Bouzoucos and the music by Freda Sivsky and her orchestra, enough remained for mothers and youngsters to brighten everybody's heart.

The show was not a bad number in the show.

And, there was only a slight tug at each parent's heart; for everybody was grown up.

The same youngster who had gone to school last Friday morning in a white shirt, necktie and sweater, and the boys who had sauntered with studied indifference through the halls, graced in slacks and open throated shirts were smart patterns of professional dignity and the curtain had rolled back on the opening scene, "Then and Now".

Even as the show unfolded the musical history of the years so did their costumes reveal the trends in styles until the final number of the "Up to the Present" scene.

And the Starnberg act, an infusion act, where alumni members return to the school stage and sprinkle the magic dust of their starring days as members of the cast, among the students and audience alike, had their set enhanced with a mirrored globe which reflected colored lights on a plain studied stage where softly roamed girls moved occasionally to break the tableau pressed by their shadows against a spun glass backdrop.

Not easily forgotten in the afterglow of the performance was the thrilling voice of Louise Orelia, whose warbling was offered free from the microphone. Not to be forgotten either was the song of Joan Lynch, especially when she sang with an all girl chorus, Fred Waring style, in the final portion of the show.

Of particular interest is the extensive section dealing with local foundry development and detailed historical treatment of individual foundries in the district. In all close to 50 illustrations are used, together with a thorough index and appendix of past officers of the 48-year-old Society.

The union claim that a second fireman is needed on grounds of safety is sheer hypocrisy. Safety has been dragged into this dispute only in an unsuccessful effort to give a cloak of respectability to vicious feather-bedding demands.

After a careful study of the first demands of this union, a Presidential Fact Finding Board on May 21, 1943, reported to President Roosevelt that there was no need for an extra fireman on diesel locomotives.

Again, on September 19, 1949, after a second hearing on the union leaders' demands, a second Board reported to President Truman that: "there presently exists no need for an additional fireman... upon either the ground of safety or that of efficiency and economy of operation."

extra fireman is needed for "safety" reasons. Here's what the Board had to say on that point:

"The safety and on-time performance of diesel electric locomotives operated under current rules have been notably good..."

"Upon careful analysis of the data submitted on safety, we have concluded that no valid reasons have been shown as a support for the Brotherhood proposal under which a fireman would be required to be at all times continuously in the cab of road diesels. The proposal must be rejected."

The real reason behind these demands is that the union leaders are trying to make jobs where there is no work. In other words, a plain case of "feather-bedding."

The railroads have no intention of yielding to these wasteful make-work demands.
