OLD STONE CHURCH PLANNING \$200,000 PARISH HOUSE AND EDUCATIONAL BUILDING, HERE

Plans to construct a new parish house and education building at a cost of between \$150,000 and \$200,000 were announced Monday by Ellsworth W. Cowles, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Old Stone Church, East Haven.

A drive to collect funds for the building program will begin in the near future and it is expected construction will begin in the Fall, he said. The new structure will probably adjoin the present parish house, Cowles said.

The Board of Trustees has announced that the Rev. James E. Waery, pastor of the South Congregational Church of Waterbury, will become pastor of the Old Stone Church September 1. Mr. Waery has submitted his resignation to the Waterbury church effective on that date.

He succeeds the Rev. Duane Hatfield, who resigned on April 11 due to illness. His duties have been temporarily assumed by Assistant Pastor George W. Shafer. The church, the third oldest in the State, has a membership of 1,000.

Mr. Waery has been pastor of the Waterbury church since 1947. He is a native of Iowa. He entered the University of Iowa in 1933, serving at the same time as minister at the Olds, Iowa, Congregational Church. While an undergraduate, he acted as minister to the Bethany Congregational Church in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

He is a graduate of the University of Iowa, and will complete graduate study at the graduate school of Yale Divinity School in 1951.

From 1939 to 1941, he was associate minister, Westminster Presbyterian Church, Minneapolis, Minn. In 1941, he assumed the pastorate of the University Congregational Church on the campus of the University of Iowa in Iowa City where he served until coming to Waterbury.

Sixteen teams in the Booster Club Pee Wee Baseball League will start their respective turns at bat starting Wednesday, July 5. These teams and several boys of various ages have registered to date, and, as time must be devoted to arranging the schedule, no other entries can be accepted. Boys who have not signed with any team will be assigned as soon as possible, so that all may have a chance to play.

The NEWS will go to press next week after regular play gets under way, so the first week's schedule will not be published. But each week after the opening of league play, the schedule will be published a week in advance. Scores of the previous week will also be printed.

All team representatives are requested to contact Frank's by next Monday in order to receive positive information as to time and teams competing. An effort will be made to get in touch with teams scheduled for opening day, so that there will be no delay in starting off right.

Joseph Mellillo, Park Recreational director, has already assumed complete charge of the league, drawing up the schedule and otherwise providing for proper running off of games. His past experience in the athletic field will prove invaluable in this case, where he will handle the entire baseball program.

Mr. Mellillo requests that all teams be on time, which is 10 A. M. daily, so that enough time may be allotted for the completion of games. He has also made a request that any boy who does not get assigned to a team immediately, to see him personally, so that arrangements may be made for assignment.

East Haven High School may do without football next fall unless approximately \$3000 is given to the athletic association to carry out the 1950-1951 sports schedule, the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Finance were told at a special meeting held last Thursday evening.

Another session is slated for next Monday evening at which time the members of the Finance Board, the School Board and the Selectmen will thrash out the matter.

At the present time the A.A. is in the red \$1059.70.

Slightly over nine dollars is in its treasury as of June 22 and outstanding bills of \$95 owed a New Haven Sporting Goods Store and about \$500 for cleaning uniforms still remain to be paid.

The Board of Finance has frequently been requested to pay the New Haven bill by the Board of Education but has refrained because it has no money budgeted to the Athletic Association.

First Selectman Frank S. Clancy said this week that he has no desire to see the sport's program curtailed and that he likewise does not want to see taxes raised another mill or fraction thereof.

"Too little attention is being paid to budget limits," he said, citing failure of the school building committee to stay within its budgetary boundaries.

In a prepared budget statement given those who attended last week's session, \$389 was indicated as needed to carry out next year's program. Specifically, it asked for \$172 for football, \$408 for basketball, \$529 for baseball, \$750 for insurance and \$300 for bowling and swimming.

Present at the meeting was Mrs. Alvin Thompson, chairman of the Board of Education, William E. Gillis, superintendent of schools, Carl H. Garvin, principal of the high school, Frank Crisafi, athletic director and coach of three sports, Mr. Vernon of the Board of Education, three members of the Father's Club and Clancy.

A prominent military figure will address the expected large audience at the dedicatory exercises to be held at Memorial Field next Tuesday morning, July 4th, members of the Park Commission were assured this morning by General James Redding.

The Bradford - Manor Drum Corps, one of the finest bugle and drum corps in the state will furnish the music for the occasion. The field which is under the supervision of the Park Commission.

Others who will appear on the program will be Rev. Alfred Clark, rector of Christ Episcopal Church and Rev. John Buckley, surate at St. Vincent de Paul's Church. Rev. Clark will have the invocation and Fr. Buckley will give the benediction.

A firing squad from the National Guard stationed in New Haven and a bugler from the same organization will complete the military aspect.

Phillets of World War I and II veterans have been invited to attend. Letters were mailed today. The general public likewise been extended invitations through the press.

A memorial stone will mark the field which will be dedicated to all living and dead war veterans of East Haven.

It was explained that the inscription will be simple because the town has two memorials on the East Haven Green which list the veterans of the two most recent conflicts.

First Selectman Frank S. Clancy will assist in the unveiling ceremony as will other town officials. The field which was four years in construction has cost over \$50,000.

Three diamonds make up the field which is enclosed with a chain wire fence and located at the corner of Dodge and Thompson Avenues.

On Wednesday, the Booster League will start its summer program for boys there.

The new flagpole and flag, gifts of the East Haven Rotary Club have been placed at the field and will add additional color to the scene.

Otherwise the day will be spent quietly in comparison with other years for with the weather effective in this state, only the lightest of noisemakers will be used.

In a somber vein, Police Chief Edwin H. Priest this morning cautioned all motorists to be careful over the holiday. Heavy traffic is indicated, in so confirming a report which indicated the possibility of the highest automobile traffic of all time.

The resignation of Edward Donroe, a member of the Board of Education for the past twelve years and of the School Building Committee was received at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the Board held last Friday night. Mr. Donroe's resignation is to take effect immediately.

John Mele of Foxon was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Donroe, which will end at the September 22nd meeting. Mr. Mele is a former member of the board and has been active in many civic affairs of the town.

James Bancroft, who is now serving on the board, was named to fill Donroe's place on the School Building Committee.

Miss Gertrude Harrison of Bronxville, N. Y. was appointed to teach kindergarten in Gerrish Avenue School. Also appointed were Miss Joyce Murray of New Haven to teach in Tuttle and Miss Mary Wall of New Haven to be assigned to Foxon School.

The board voted to appoint an athletic council as an advisory group to the Board of Education. This committee will include three school board members, three members of the faculty and two students from the student council; one finance board member, two citizens of the town and the first selectman, Frank Clancy. There will be one year term for members and will go in effect August 1, 1950.

The registration of Joseph Mayo as the athletic association director was made at this meeting to replace him. Mr. Mayo has been active in extra curricular work for many years in the high school, and has taken an active part in athletics as director for the past four years.
