# A Message To The Community

Again our great nation is faced with an emergency which calls for maximum effort on the part of each individual according to his ability. Only a few of us will be called to bear arms in defense of cur way of life and national

But all of us, as civilians, have a service to perform and duty to make our national effort most effective. Our national economy must not be endangered at home through wasteful hoarding or scare buying ! I. Already under the impact of "scare buying" some prices have started to rise just when the forces of inflation

seemed about to be halted and reversed. As retailers we're in a good position to know the truth about the supply of civilian goods.

At the moment there is no important shortage of any thing as far as we can see. America's productivity today is at such a high level that it can cope with overything except a terrific stampede of panic buying. The struggle in Korea may well last for a long time. It

is a deadly, serious struggle to those who must fight it and to us whose prime duty it is to support it. Its material requirements, it seems, can well be handled by our productive capacity without reducing the supply of civilian goods in any serious measure.






