## CHIEF ERNEST HANSEN SUSPENDED BY BOARD

Fire Chief Ernest J. Hansen was suspended from duty this week by the Board of Public Safety.

The action was taken following a special hearing last Sunday on charges of insubordination and "evidencing a lack of cooperation with the town's volunteer department," the Board has been informed.

The East Haven department for many years. He is one of the town's few paid firemen.

## New Tax Forms Due Next Year

East Haven taxpayers will have new tax forms mailed to them next year, Tax Collector Wilfrid Rafter said today.

The new forms will be in five parts, four of which will be retained by the local office and the fifth mailed to the property owner. A change in the present three part form was advocated following disapproval registered by the state Tax Commissioner.

The new forms will be an advantage to the taxpayer, Rafter claims, since it will not be necessary to bring the form to be received to the tax office. Instead a person will go to the window and mention their name. Upon payment they will be given one of two forms for the first half of the taxes. The same procedure will be followed for the second half taxes. The taxpayers will keep their receipts and the office will file the other receipts.

The fifth part will be a reminder to the taxpayers of the amount they owe for each half and the dates that the taxes are due and payable.

The new system will eliminate constant reference to the unwieldy tax books and will give considerable time when people either forget or lose their bills over the months.

Taxpayers were reminded yesterday that the second half of the current taxes are due on August 15. Unless they are paid on or before September 15, property owners will be assessed one half of one percent dating from March 15.

## PLANS FURTHERED FOR STADIUM TRIP FOR LOOP CHAMPS

The absence of George Wells, General manager of the New York Yankees, who is on a business trip through the mid-west has delayed somewhat the announcement of the date for the baseball game which the champions of the Booster league will make to the Yankee Stadium as a reward for their efforts, First Selectman, Frank S. Clancy said today.

The date will be set this week-end, Clancy expected.

A request for a school bus to make the trip is in the hands of the Board of Education and Information obtained from the Public Utility Commission of this state says that the busses may be used to make the trip.

Favorable action on the matter by the School Board will insure the trip for about forty local boys.

In event a proper free date cannot be obtained it is expected that a group of local business men will contribute one dollar and a half apiece to give the boys the trip.

About three teams would be awarded the trip since there are that many leagues operating in the Booster set-up.

In addition the winning club will receive gold charms from the Park Commission as well as the girls' league champions.

The Booster league is under the supervision of the Director of Summer Recreation, Joseph Melillo. Miss Charlotte Gallo supervises the girls' softball league.

Ten thousand spectators lined East Haven's Main streets late last Saturday afternoon to watch twenty five drum corps parade in the second largest Field Day in Connecticut this year. An additional ten corps participated in the competition held on the high school field and in the gym during the day.

Members of the committee stated following the event that it was the most successful in the nine years of the Bradford Manor's corps history. The latter unit sponsored the event.

In all 737 corpsmen participated in the competition. There were 14 junior corps and 21 senior organizations.

"Unlike the conventions, participation in the parade is purely voluntary which explains why more corps competed that paraded. It was explained that senior corps arrive after their day's work, in most instances, and thus are excused from parading.

The largest crowds were gathered about the main reviewing stand where town officials and drum corps personnel inspected the paraders. Additional numbers were congregated on the corners and Tyler Avenue had nearly a thousand watching before the parade disbanded at the high school.

The largest field day was held in Torrington on July 29th where three more corps were entered than played here last Saturday.

## Senator Jaspers Advises Youths On Work Rights

Senator William Jaspers, Reemployment Committee man, this week released information in regards to employees who would leave their company's employ to enter military service.

His communication follows:

While the statutes do not require the employer to be given any particular form of notice, that the individual is leaving to enter military service, it is desirable that such notice be given in writing and that inquiry be made as to the employer's policy with respect to placing persons on military leave.

Persons entering the armed forces are eligible for reemployment rights only if they fulfill all the conditions required by law. It is therefore essential that they be familiar with these conditions. The fact that entrance into military service is voluntary does not prevent the person from having the right to reclaim his old job.

The reemployment rights laws now in effect require that to obtain reemployment benefits a person must:

1. Leave a position other than temporary in the employ of a private employer or the U. S. Government for the purpose of entering upon active duty in the armed forces of the United States;
2. Satisfactorily complete his military service and receive a certificate to that effect;
3. Enlist only once since June 4, 1948, for a period of not longer than 3 years or, if a reservist, serve or as soon after such period as he is able to obtain orders relieving him from active duty.
4. Apply for reemployment within 90 days after he is relieved from duty or from hospitalization continuing after discharge for a period of one more than one year;
5. The statutes require that if the position he left was in the employ of a private employer, the employer's circumstances must not have so changed as to make it impossible or unreasonable to reinstate the ex-serviceman. However, the statute declares it to be the sense of Congress that the ex-serviceman shall be restored in a manner which will give him, upon his return, the status he would have had had he remained continuously in his employment.
