OLD STONE CHURCH TO SPEND \$250,000 IN NEW EXPANSION

With plans for a \$250,000 addition to the parish house of the Old Stone Church approved at a recent church meeting, preparations are now being made for a building fund drive to be conducted Sunday, October 22.

A series of meetings has been scheduled with various church and town organizations to explain the purpose of the building expansion program and how it will be accomplished. A brochure telling about the project is being mailed to every church family.

More than 100 men of the church have already promised to serve as canvassers. During the week before the drive they will meet evenings with Curtis R. Schmacher, financial advisor of the Board of Home Missions of the Congregational and Christian Churches.

Plans call for renovation of the present parish house as well as a new building to be constructed to the north east and joining the present church house. The new building will include a Fellowship hall seating 400 people and 22 classrooms for the Sunday School Department. The building will have two floors including the basement and will be of brick exterior. The architectural treatment of the front of the building will conform with the church.

Completion of the new auditorium will permit full time use of the present meeting room in the church house as a gymnasium. The basement room under the gym will be partitioned to provide a "drop-in room" for the use of the young people after school, a meeting room for scout troops and three craft and hobby rooms.

Building plans also call for a modern kitchen adjacent to the fellowship hall, a parlor for use of women's organizations, a pastor's study and a church office.

It is estimated that structural changes in the present building and construction of the new building will be completed for \$100,000 and that finishing the interior can be accomplished by church members for another \$50,000.

High Pupils Start Chest Xrays Here

Pupils of the high school from grades 9 through 12 commenced this morning to have their chests x-rayed according to the custom of the past year.

The portable apparatus has been set up on the stage of the auditorium and qualified assistants moved the youngsters along at a rapid pace.

Grades 9 and 12 were due for examination today and grades 10 and 11 will be processed tomorrow.

Pupils, whose religion forbids the practice, will be excused, Principal Carl H. Garvin said.

Further evidence that the high school has settled into its routine practices was indicated by the principal when he said that Richard Cobb of the Worcester Institute of Technology will be at the school next Wednesday to talk on admission qualifications of the university.

Armed Forces To Benefit By Chest Gifts

First Selectman Frank S. Clancy has joined with Mayor William C. Celentano of New Haven, and First Selectmen Michael J. Whalen of Hamden and Elmer E. Scranon of West Haven, to endorse wholeheartedly the current Community Chest drive.

A statement issued by the Mayor and the First Selectman called upon all citizens in the Community Chest area to respond generously to this year's campaign for \$951,032. Associated Services for the Armed Forces has been added to the Chest group this year and funds will be allotted to this agency and the 30 others affiliated with the Chest.

"The Chest campaign is not just another drive. It is 31 campaigns in one. If the 30 Red Feather agencies and Associated Services were not united in the Chest, all would have to conduct separate drives as was done before the local Chest was founded in 1924 by providing one big campaign for 31 different organizations; the Community Chest saves time, reduces campaign costs, and makes sure the money goes to organizations doing a good job where it is needed most," the letter stated.

"Red Feather services are bronca community services which benefit everybody in our community regardless of race, age, religious faith or economic status. The funds raised at campaign time are used throughout the year to help make our own communities better and happier places in which to live. The funds allotted to Associated Services help provide off-post service club and recreational programs for local men and women in the Armed Forces.

"Therefore, we heartily endorse the 31st Red Feather drive and ask all citizens of Greater New Haven to give generously through the Community Chest to the 31 member organizations that are rendering so many vital services to us."

President Truman will give the national Community Chest campaign a send-off tomorrow night (Friday) when he speaks on the combined network broadcast featuring an all-star cast, Bob Hope, Bing Crosby, Ronald and Benita Colman, Dennis Day, Lorne Barrymore, Lucille Ball, Kirk Douglas, Art Linkletter and others are scheduled to perform. WELI will air the program from 10 o'clock until 10:30 with the President and Charles E. Wilson speaking briefly from Washington.

Annual Meeting Set Monday To Approve Budget

Chief business at the Town Meeting to be held in the Town Hall next Monday evening appears to be the acceptance of budget and the laying of the tax rate for the coming fiscal year.

The session is expected to formally approve the action of the Board of Finance which reduced the tax rate one half mill in anticipation of taxes for the coming year.

First Selectman Frank S. Clancy, who doubles as a member of the Board of Finance has indicated that two new policemen will be given full time positions and the fire department will get three new men.

A general raise for all town employees, exclusive of the town officers, has likewise been provided under the terms of the new budget.

First item on Monday's meeting will provide for the appointment of three directors.

Other items of the call deal with the Selectmen's right to borrow money in the town's name for payment of current expenses and outstanding obligations of the town; to issue notes or other general obligations thereof; and to renew such notes or other obligations of the town outstanding, according to their (Selectmen's) terms. The sum to be borrowed is not to exceed \$200,000.

Another item would give the Selectmen power to convey at private sale or public auction any and all premises obtained by foreclosure or deed.

The final item is a resolution which would give the Selectmen and the Town Clerk the right to act as a Board of Admissions for those who seek and have the qualifications to become voters in the town.

Special Conclave Called On Bid To Oust Group

Although the annual Town Meeting, which in general provides for financing the town program is a highlight of next week's East Haven program, not all of the expected fireworks will be confined to the Monday night's session. Instead the demand of forty-seven signers of a petition to force a school building committee to resign will have their say at a special town meeting called for next Thursday evening, October 5, in the Town Hall at 8 P.M.

A second petition followed the one disclosed a week ago when 30 citizens had requested the Board to resign. The new petition has 47 names, First Selectman Frank S. Clancy disclosed yesterday.

In a letter to Burton Reed, chairman of the school building committee, which was written on September 14, Clancy said he would be happy to receive the resignation of the current committee. It was Clancy's belief that the committee had been remiss in its duties.

In an answering letter made public a few days later, Reed said that the committee would not resign and charged a lack of cooperation between the Board of Selectmen and the Building Committee.

To this Clancy quoted from the minutes of the committee meetings and purported to show that cooperation had been evident where cooperation warranted it.

Meanwhile Clancy received a petition from 30 townspeople asking for the resignation of the Building Committee and the establishment of a new school building committee to be selected by the Board of Selectmen.

When the matter was discussed upon the adjournment of a South Civic Association meeting this week, Bart Gaffney, a member of the Board of Education supported Clancy when an attempt to recall the petition was blocked.

Following the session the second petition was received by the Selectmen with an additional 17 names added to the paper.

Because of the nature of the complaints, the Board of Selectmen decided to hold a special town meeting and not include it in the annual session next Monday night. The date for the special meeting was set for Thursday evening at 8 in the town hall.

Edward K. Bernard, 70, of 38 Pardee Place, East Haven, died Friday at his home, following a long illness.

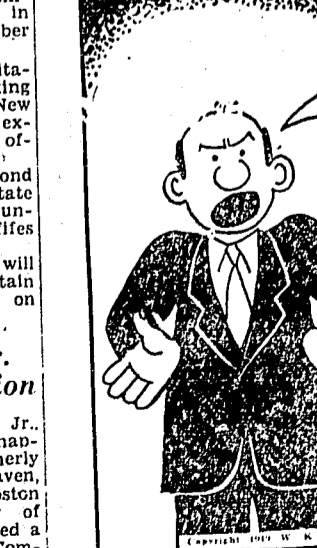

Old Handie And Walkie-Talkie Of World War II Much Improved

Radical redesigning of the walkie-talkie and handie-talkie radio during World War II combat work-

The improvements are the result of a Signal Corps research program which has been carried on in communications and related fields since World War II.

More versatile equipment is an outgrowth of the "interacted communications" concept which guides the planning, integrated communication and different equipment items for varied purposes.

Both the walkie-talkie and handie-talkie now are frequently mounted in the car. The walkie-talkie was first designed in 1939.

The new handie-talkie, weighing six and a half pounds, is no smaller or lighter than its predecessor.

Each radio is a battery-operated receiver-transmitter in a single unit. The handie-talkie has a range of about one mile.
