## New Dial System Slated For July By Phone Company

Telephone subscribers in the East Haven area of the New Haven exchange are being notified by The Southern New England Telephone Company that all telephones in East Haven will be changed at the time a new telephone directory is distributed next July.

The new numbers will have two letters and five digits such as HO 4-9999. All telephones in the East Haven area will have the Hobart name designation, as well as most telephones along the Grand Avenue section of New Haven, east of Mill River.

At the present time the "two letter-five digit" numbering system is in use in the West Haven area of the New Haven exchange where they are designated as West, while in the East Haven area certain numbers in Orange and Hamden numbers in some parts of Hamden. Two letter-five digit numbers with the designation FULton will be introduced for the Westville area of New Haven at the same time the Hobart numbers become effective in East Haven next summer.

The two letter-five digit numbering system eventually will be extended throughout Connecticut, and is already in use in a great many of the large metropolitan areas of the country.

The Gerrish Ave. Parents-Teachers School Investigating Committee recommended a new school in the Gerrish district when it met with the Board of Education in the high school last Friday night.

The recommendation followed an earlier meeting of the committee on November 12 at which time the possibility of adding new rooms on the existing Gerrish School was discussed and the rejected for three reasons.

It was found that property would have to be condemned in order to provide for sufficient playground area to apply for a state grant; that alterations would cost the town more for classrooms than the cost for a new building. Also it was a distinct possibility that during the alteration period, increased half time session would be necessary.

Following a tour of inspection, committee members agreed that the land owned by Mr. M. DiCaprio was the most central of the only two areas sufficiently large to accommodate a new school. The West End Stadium land was rejected by them because it was too small and presents a problem of sewage disposal because of the marshy nature of its surface.

Mr. J. Henry L. Giles Senior Sanitary Engineer of the State Department of Health, concurred with the committee's reasoning and said that the installation of a high cost and high maintenance sand filter and chlorination plant for sewage disposal would be necessary if the latter grounds were used.

Last Wednesday, Mr. Giles and Engineer W. E. Blakely tested the DiCaprio property for run-off. Three test pits were dug thirty inches deep. No. 1 was located 25 feet east of the brook and 80 feet north of the south line. After being filled with water it drained off in twenty six and a half seconds. The soil was fine sand.

The second test pit was dug fifty seven feet west of the street line, seventy five feet east of Pit 1, sixty feet north of south lot line. Filled with water, it was dry in fifteen minutes. The soil was of coarser sand than that in the original experiment.

The third pit was dug in loamy, compact sand, fifty feet east of the brook; 150 feet north of pit 1 and 215 feet west of the street line. It was drained in thirty one minutes.

The last test pit, chosen at the request of the committee as the most desirable parcel of land in the Gerrish Avenue area.

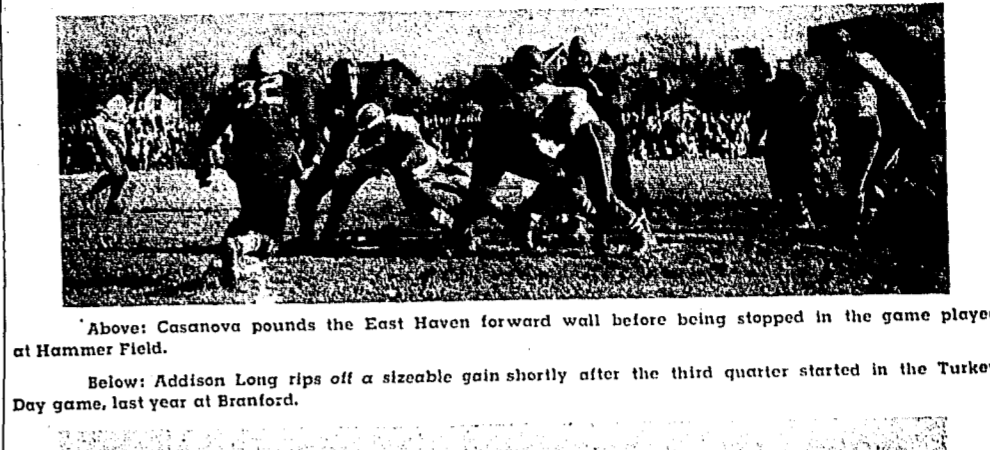

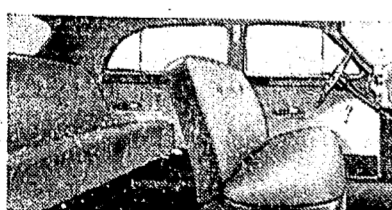
