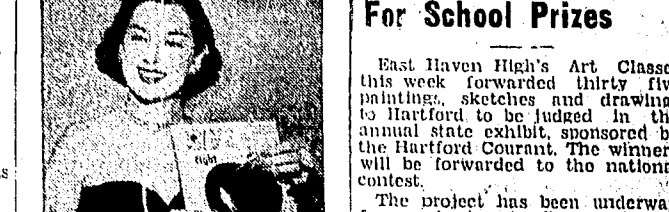

CURTAINING WORK
AT HILLTOP PLANT

The A. C. Gilbert Company is sharply curtailing the operations of its Hilltop Plant at the Probate Office in Branford, Conn., and shifting work formerly done there to its main New Haven plant. A. C. Gilbert Jr., said last week.

The change was ordered for "economic reasons," Gilbert said. With the over-all shortages and allocation of metals being felt, Gilbert said it was advisable to concentrate production in the main plant.

The Branford plant will not be closed. It will be used for some limited manufacturing and for storage.

Gilbert said that "most" of the 125 employees at Branford will find employment in New Haven. The company recognizes seniority rights after three years and those laid off will be among the newer group of workers.

The Branford plant has been used for making various component parts for American Flyer trains, particularly transformers and cars. It also turned out the small HO model narrow gauge railroad sets. This model has been discontinued.

Since metal goes into nearly every product made by Gilbert—both in the instructional toy and household appliance field, the shortage of steel and other metals is being felt by the manufacturer.

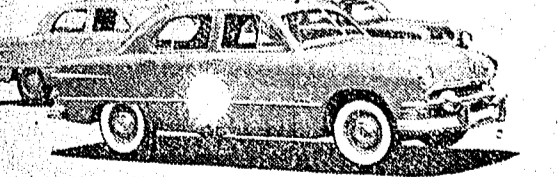
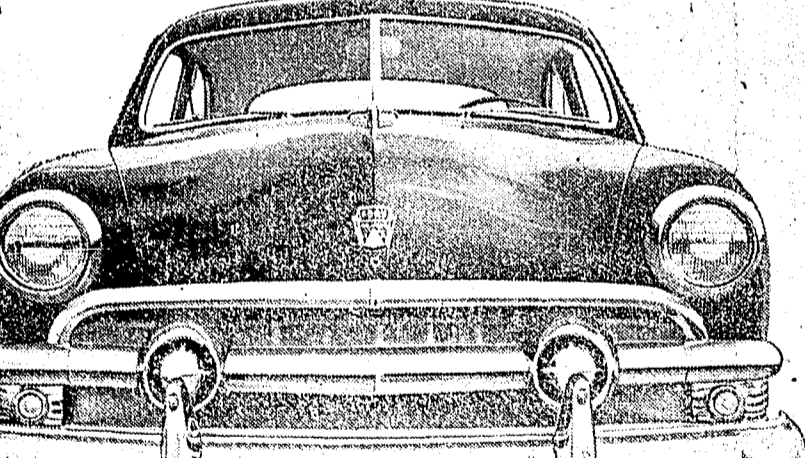

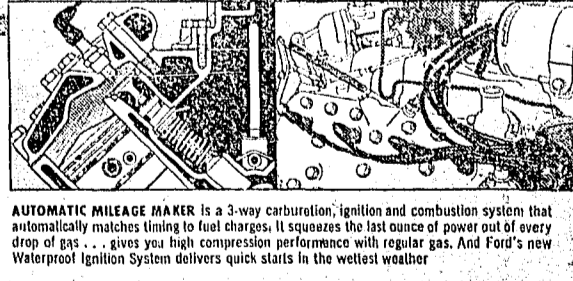
