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


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AMERICAN HEART WEEK

Several of our national holidays and observances have be come tinged with the tragedy of needless and violent death. Like July Fourth and Labor Day, with their traditionally high accident tolls, St. Valentine's Day, which celebrates love and light-heartedness, also brings with it a reminder of lives wastefully and prematurely lost. The very symbolism of the day inescapable that we should consider the rising toll

caused by heart disease.

The subject is a sober one indeed for this season of sweethearts and lacy sentiments. Yet if we are to reduce the toll of heart disease, we must face the facts, and resolve to do

comething about them.

The facts are: In 1948, the latest year for which figures are available, diseases of the heart and circulation killed 637,679 people, representing 44 percent of all deaths in the United States. An estimated 9,000,000 to 10,000,000 Americans have some form of heart or circulatory disease, among them 500,000 elementary and high school children.

The American Heart Association and its affiliates have set aside the week of February 11-18, including St. Valentine's Day, as American Heart Week. Heart Week is the high spot of the month-long 1951 Heart Fund Campaign to bring new hope for fering of heart-affilicted children, to lighten the load of cardiac housewives, to prevent premature deaths among our highly skilled workers, trained business executives and leading statesmen—these are some of the aims of the American Heart Asso-

If the advances against heart disease continue at their present pace, it is reasonable to hope that within the lifetime of many of us now living, there will be no cardiovascular dis ease which cannot be prevented or corrected.

Our aid can bring that day closer. During American He Week, the most valuable assistance we can give is financia support to our local heart association which has taken the dership in this, our battle. Perhaps the most loving Valentin we can give to those we hold dear is our generous contributi







That, too, is a lasting memorial.






