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In protest over what she called "discriminatory action," Mrs. Charlotte Brewer has resigned her position as Supervisor of Elementary Education in East Haven.

The Board of Selectmen, Board of Finance, Town Council, Teachers' Salary Committee and all employees of the Board of Education are invited to the hearing which will take place in the high school auditorium at 8 P.M.

The Board of Education at its meeting of March 30, 1951, reached a compromise agreement with the Teachers' Salary Committee to revise the salary schedule to be effective September 1, 1951 and for one year by granting an increase of \$300 to each step in the schedule, but limiting the amount of increase to any individual in any one year to \$400 inclusive of increments.

This salary proposal was presented to the Board of Finance, May 14 by the Teachers' Salary Committee and Board of Education.

The Board of Finance rejected this salary schedule and proposed a 10-step salary schedule for the year 1951-52 beginning with a minimum of \$2,400 and a maximum of \$4,200 for teachers with bachelor degrees.

Other points emphasized by the Board of Finance were the following: they oppose the inclusion of any employees other than teachers on salary schedule based on annual increments.

The Board of Finance proposed any salary increase for 1951-52 to employees who will benefit by the Connecticut Municipal Employees Insurance Plan, which is being inaugurated as of July 1, 1951.

In connection with the public hearing the school teachers of the town have issued the following statement:

"The teachers of East Haven are very happy that the matter of salaries is being handled before the public. Salary negotiations have been going on since mid-winter and although the legal date for the issuance of contracts is long past, continuing stalemate have prevented any final action.

"No effort will be made by the teachers to fill the meeting with friends pledged to their support. On the contrary every effort will be made to urge a very large general attendance. It is hoped that the High School Auditorium, which holds 1000 people, will be over-crowded.

The teachers feel the question should be settled entirely on merit, and ask only that all citizens attend, hear the facts, and then act according to their personal convictions. They do not wish to have the important matter settled by a partisan minority, but by the widest possible expression of general public opinion. For these reasons the teachers urge that every effort be made to attend the hearing. They are not asking for support, pledged in advance. They are asking that the public show its interest in this and other school questions by a turnout so large that there can be no doubt as to the amount and extent of that interest."

### GREAT EXPECTATIONS

Several hundred people sat in high school auditoriums this week and heard brilliant students reflect an account of stewardship, with God's eye in every individual endeavor, and pleaded not to break the thread of friendship which has made the class stand apart from all other classes. This formula has applied through the years.

In Branford last Sunday, there was another valedictory address. It was delivered by a young minister, ordained only last week in Baltimore and graduated last Monday from the Divinity School of Yale University.

His was a severe task, for, speaking only to a small congregation, sought in fire the few to go forth and bring the realization of all that a Short Beach Church should mean into the hearts of the public.

Almost bravely, he scoured himself for not attaining the ideals which he hoped for when he first stood trembling in the pulpit as a student minister more than two years ago. Most appalling was the condemnation of himself for failure to arouse the congregation to the possibilities of its church.

Then, pleadingly, he called upon the parishioners to recognize the sins of "unpreparedness, unconcern, uncharitableness, unreality and disunity."

Each topic made the congregation twist with uneasiness. Yet the courage of the young man's convictions was the beam of sweet oil on deep rawhide cuts. Rawhide, because the lashes were stinging in an old-fashioned verbal flogging designed to awaken the community to its spiritual needs.

Yet, when the summation of the faults was completed, and they are the same in all faiths and all congregations, the soothing voice of hope was ministered to the members of the church. In words which were vibrant, Rev. Ken S. Jones, newly ordained and but twenty-four hours away from being graduated from the Yale Divinity School, implored all to look to God. "The Lord of this church is Jesus Christ and his greatness is beyond measure, and his power beyond our imagining."

And then in tender words, full of realization of the chastisement he, as shepherd, was called upon to administer, he climaxed his valedictory sermon in sharing words which were their tenure of two years and many opportunities which they had been given him through the love of the church members.

Yet, though much is hoped for, accomplishments have not been lacking in the two years. Short Beach oversubscribed its Every Member Canvass by over fifty percent in 1949. The promise of additional space in the church basement attracted many men. These who believe in sharing were fired with the hope of expansion of missionary and benevolence programs.

Most humbly, the young minister thanked all for following his leadership and promised that despite callings to other parishes, small and great, the welfare of the Short Beach Union Church would ever be asked for in his daily prayers.

And in his final words he called upon St. Paul and asked remembrance:

"Stand firm and hold to the traditions which you were taught by us. We have confidence in the Lord about you, that you are doing and will do the things which we command. May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the steadfastness of Christ."

Thus did the account of stewardship end on the same note of hopefulness and sadness that all June classes experience and, though unspoken, the word is, "Ave," Hail and Farewell.

### LET'S LOOK AT THE BOOKS

INSURECTION by Liam O'Flaherty (Little Brown & Co., \$3.00; pp 248)

I wonder if you remember when you were a child which someone shouted "Follow the Leader" and everyone in line had to follow the antics of their leader. So it is with the book "INSURECTION" by Liam O'Flaherty. The man who believes in human rights and is willing to die for his beliefs is the man with strength, and men with ideals, there are those who usually escape to headwaters.

In "INSURECTION" Liam O'Flaherty has taken a week in the lives of four people during the Irish rebellion against England. There is Michael, Michael's wife, Mrs. Madeline, Mrs. Madeline, the mother who prays God to provide a protector for her sixteen year old son, Tommy who volunteers; and Bartly Madolen who only serves for a plot of ground on which to mate and breed his kind in peace.

On Easter Monday 1916 the uprising began in Dublin. Although Bartly was only a bystander he becomes involved because of Mrs. Madolen and soon finds that he has stolen a rifle from a dead imperial soldier. At first he is frightened, then thrilled by his possession. Bartly wants to have the rifle, but he is carried forward by the crowd.

This entire book is one desperate, fierce battle to hold off the enemy so that Ireland will unite against England. There is the brutality and the sweetness of man towards his fellow men and their work and their leader. In "INSURECTION" Liam O'Flaherty, as always, has done a splendid job.

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### Geo-Politically Speaking

An election in almost any part of Europe is of great importance to the United States during these days of tension. When a French man, or an Italian worker, or a German industrialist goes to the polls, he registers not only in his native land but in Washington as well, and from Moscow, too. The same point in Sicily, where there is a small insular vote the Communist - not 30.2% of the vote compared with the Government blocks 31.2%.

Emerging from both Hitler and the Communist party on the left and the forces of General de Gaulle on the right swing into action against the governing Center, or Socialists, in Germany, Austria, and Italy, other elections have already been held, and they are expected to have out every possible danger for the future.

The most immediate and recognized danger is the strength of the Communists in France and Italy. The two largest organized parties outside of the Soviet Union have been in power in each of these countries for the past few years. This has not only made them powerful, but it has also made them a part of the political machinery of these countries.

A less urgent danger, and one which has been largely ignored, is the rise of the neo-Nazi movement in Germany and the resurgence of the Fascist movement in Italy. In these countries surprise power has been conferred upon parties which have not only come into the open and returned to power, but they have also been definitely a minor threat at present.

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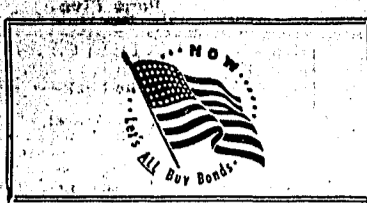
