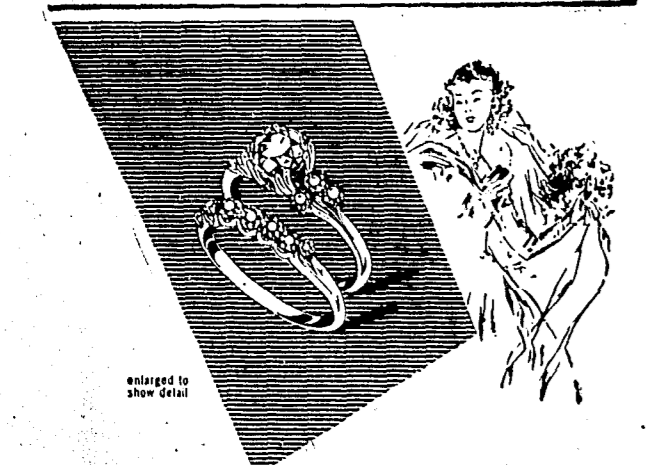

Coem of gladiolus that have been dug should be allowed to dry for at least two weeks, then they may be cleaned and stored. This is a good job for a rainy day. Break off the stalks and remove the withered corns at the base.

The small corns may be saved in a glass jar and grown on in the cutting garden where they will double in size and bloom in the second year.

Place 100 of the large corns in a paper bag and sprinkle about a tablespoon of naphthalene flakes over them. The light so the fungus will kill any thrip. Avoid being too generous with the flakes and remove after a month.

Gladiolus should be kept in a dry place where the temperature ranges between 50 and 65 degrees. Fine needles are plentiful at this season and are ideal for mulching acid-loving plants like rhododendrons, azaleas and mountain laurel as they are light and decay slowly.

In Fall planting of trees tilt them slightly towards the prevailing winds which generally mean South-west. Trees set in exposed areas should be staked or braced by three guy wires until established.

The red raspberry named 'September' has received high praise from fruit growers. Introduced in 1947 this new variety has performed well and is expected to become a leader among Fall-bearing varieties.

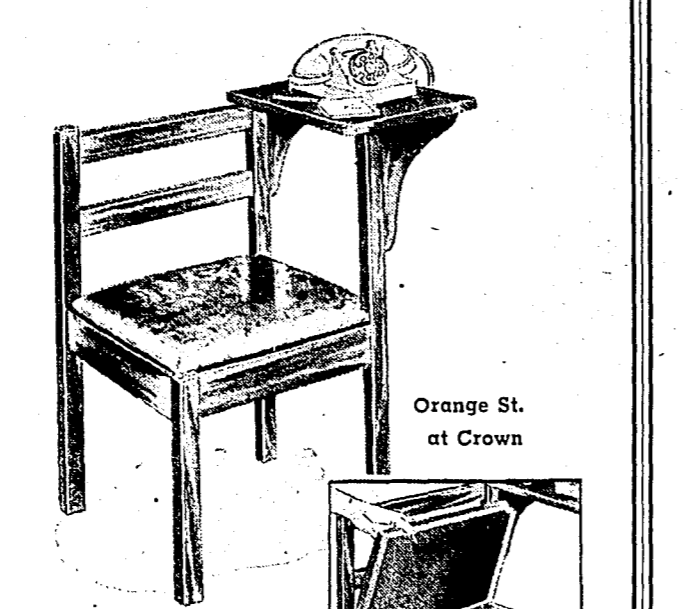


