800 FAMILIES ASSISTED BY PHNA HERE DURING '51

Nearly 800 local families were served during 1951 by the Public Health Nursing Association of East Haven. Staff members made 4,212 visits and 1,269 individuals were seen. These facts and many others are contained in the annual report for the United Fund agency, prepared by Mrs. Lillian M. Johnston, senior nurse.

The figures represent increases over the previous year, of 110 families and 499 individuals. Mrs. Johnston said the greater service was possible because a third nurse was added early last year on a part-time basis.

Care of the aged and chronically ill continues to be a major concern, the report stated. With this exception, a downward trend in bedside nursing is anticipated.

New drugs, treatments and procedures are reducing the incidence of illness and they also shorten the duration of many illnesses, the report states. Hospital facilities have been so expanded that many patients formerly treated at home now receive institutional care.

About 40 percent of total visits were made in what the United Fund agency describes as "morbidity service" care of the ill. Most of these patients were those with

TOWN'S GRAND LIST SET AT \$27,086,565.00 NET

The town's non-resident total for 1951 was \$4,450,785. The grand total reached \$19,938,655, while a total of \$2,214,210 was credited to motor vehicles. Personal property totalled \$1,724,550 of the complete figure, Tinarl said.

A breakdown of the totals shows 3,906 dwelling houses, valued at \$15,978,725; 2,870 barns and sheds, valued at \$994,545; 1,109 house lots and building lots valued at \$5,180,655; 173 commercial buildings, valued at \$1,608,440; nine lands valued at \$140,640; and lands valued at \$546,435.

Tinarl said the real property totals were \$24,448,401, of which \$14,407,885 was non-resident and \$10,998,655 was resident. Real property exemptions reached a total of \$1,955,480.

Figures for 1950 showed exemptions of \$1,148,305; a real property total of \$22,940,575; and the grand total of \$26,782,405.

Edgar S. Bacon Rites Held Today, Prominent Here

Services for Edgar Selden Bacon, supervisor of supplies for the Southern New England Telephone Company and formerly an East Haven town official, were held this afternoon in the parlors of Beecher and Bennett, 100 Broadway, The Rev. James E. Wacey, pastor of Old Stone Church, East Haven officiated. Burial was in East Lawn Cemetery.

Mr. Bacon died Monday afternoon at his home, 79 Vineyard Road, North Haven, after a long illness. He was 61 years of age.

A resident of East Haven for many years, he was very active in church, civic and political affairs there. He was formerly a member of the Republican Town Committee and served as chief moderator for numerous town meetings and town elections.

In 1925 he helped to draft the act which established the East Haven Board of Public Safety and he served on the board for several terms. During this period the town's tax system was eliminated and a regular police force took the place of the constabulary force which previously served the town; and at the same time a plan instituted which laid the foundation for the present fire department in East Haven.

He also became vitally interested in a revision of the town's tax system and helped to organize a tax reassessment. Aerial maps which were obtained for this purpose are still in use by the East Haven tax authorities.

After serving on the Board of Public Safety, he became a member of the East Haven Board of Finance and throughout the years assisted in many important town projects in this position.

His employment with the Southern New England Telephone Company dates from 1909, the year after he was graduated from New Haven High School. He started as a shop helper. In 1921 he was promoted to supply agent for the company and five years later became supervisor of supplies.

Well known as a sportsman, he was for many years interested in hunting and fishing and was a member of a local group of sportsmen who leased property and hunted regularly in a wooded section of Willimantic. He was also interested in boating and is a former member of the Branford Yacht Club. An ardent supporter of the town's boys, he found time despite his many activities to share his interest with the Boy Scouts and the Boys' Brigade. He was also a prominent member of the Old Stone Church in East Haven.

He leaves his wife, Lottie Fairchild Bacon and three sons—Donald, of 62 Templeton Street, West Haven, a testman for the telephone company at its switching center in New Haven; Elmer, who is assistant director of the Lasso County Forestry Service in Susanville, California; and Russell, who will graduate in June from Besselaer Polytechnic Institute. He also leaves his brother, Orlis A. Bacon, an assistant vice-president for the Union and New Haven Trust Company. There are four grandchildren.

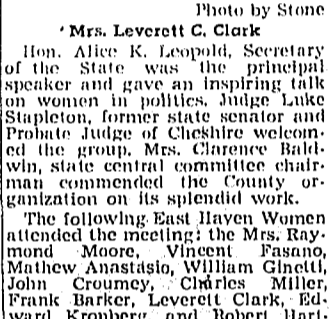

POLICE TRAINING SCHOOL ATTRACTS 75 TO CLASSES

Approximately 75 policemen from surrounding towns have indicated interest in the East Haven-North Haven in-training school which started here Tuesday night.

The school is run under the educational committee of the Connecticut Chief of Police Association, the police department of North Haven and East Haven with the cooperation of the F.B.I., the Connecticut State Police and the New Haven Police Department.

Various phases of law enforcement will be considered weekly until the school ends in mid-April.

Among the instructors is the Special Agent of the F.B.I. office at New Haven, Galen Wilks, who opened the sessions held in the town hall last Tuesday. His subject was "Public Relations."

Other F.B.I. men who will be heard on a later occasion are James J. Deery, James T. Haverly and Charles L. Fisher.

Included among the instructors will be Captain Joseph Folio, of the local department, a recent graduate of the National Police Academy, sponsored by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, in Washington, D.C.

Sgt. Walter Gowrych of North Haven, also a graduate of the National Academy also is slated to conduct at least one class.

Guests at the first meeting included the members of the Board of Public Safety William Crosby, Fred Wolfe Jr., William Friend and Daniel Parilla.

First selection, Frank A. Barker, welcomed the police and extended the courtesy of the town to them.

"East Haven is particularly proud to be chosen as the site for the school," Barker said. "I look for a spirit of cooperation between all towns represented."

Aside from F.B.I. Special Agents, and Captain Folio and Sgt. Gowrych, it is the purpose of the sponsors to present members of the Connecticut State Police, the New Haven Police Department and court officials of East Haven as instructors before the sessions end.

Special graduation ceremonies will be held at which time State Police Commissioner Edward J. Hickey will be invited to attend.

Building Department Allows 33 Building Requests In January

Estimated Costs Of 14 Dwellings Reaches \$175,500

Twenty three building permits, 14 of them for dwellings, were granted for the month of January it was announced today by the office of the Building Inspector.

Estimated cost of the buildings is \$198,250 it was said. The cost of the dwellings is estimated at \$175,500.

In addition 68 electrical permits were allowed and 23 oil burner permits granted. Other permits allowed were eleven for plumbing.

Nine septic tank permits were issued and there were 10 permitted to make street excavations.

Power pump permits, clean-outs, totaled 28, exclusive of those using the town sponsored project which is under the sanitation department.

One outside plumber was granted a plumbing license and 54 other plumbing contractors obtained licenses. One electrical contractor also renewed his license.

Two oil storage permits were agreed upon and the sale of a zoning map and an electric code was executed.

There were five extra electric inspections.

Chief Priest Decrees Improved Safety Laws For Schoolchildren

Several suggestions to improve safety conditions for children in areas where automobiles are numerous were proposed today by East Haven Police Chief Edwin B. Priest.

"The safety of our children is one of the foremost aims of not only parents, but of all adults," Chief Priest said, "yet we often endanger the lives of children by thoughtless use of the automobile."

More and more, he said, it has become customary to take children to and from the movies, the school and the church in cars. The number of parents doing this increases materially on stormy days and the hazard becomes greater, Chief Priest added.

The result is a dangerous traffic situation caused by double parking, parking on both sides of the street, and urging children to cross the street in the midst of traffic on a day when visibility is poor, he said.

"We have had one minor accident this year and we wish to take precautions before we are faced with a serious one," the Chief said. This can be done, he said, by having all cars follow in a single line in front of the building where the child is to be picked up. Do not double park, do not allow children to cross the street to a car unless supervised by an adult, and be especially careful on stormy days, Chief Priest stressed.

Although parking in front of most schools is prohibited, it will be permissible for drivers to follow in single file in front of the school for the purpose of picking up children, he said.

Early Town Meeting Seen To Approve School Bids

Indications of an early town meeting were evident today following the opening of construction bids for new South School.

Apparent low base bidder was P. Francini and Company of Derby with a base bid of \$267,250. Only four companies showed enough interest to offer bids. The others were Mott-Moore Construction, Donofrio Construction, and Kelly Construction.

First Selectman Frank A. Barker said today that a meeting between the Board of Selectmen, the Board of Finance and the School Building Committee has been called for this evening.

Following their expected approval, a town meeting will be held, in the very near future, to obtain the go-ahead from the taxpayers.

Barker said that the project would be pushed with all possible speed. The so-called base bids include foundation work and minimum standards of construction.

An alternate bid was accepted from each of the four bidders which called for the inclusion or exclusion of certain features depending upon the ability of the construction company to remain within the financial limits of \$400,000 plus set by the Finance Board.

The base bid of Mott-Moore was \$272,300; Donofrio, Construction, \$269,800; and Kelly Construction, \$268,200. For the alternate number one bid, Mott-Moore would increase their base bid, \$4,000; Donofrio Construction, \$2,517.72; Kelly Construction, \$3,000; and P. Francini and Co., \$3,165.

Walter O. Lee, Foxon, Promoted To Sergeant

Walter O. Lee of Foxon Road, East Haven, was one of seven area recruits promoted to sergeant recently.

Sgt. Lee is serving with the 43d Division in Augsburg, Germany. The men are all members of the 102d Infantry Regiment.

Their outfit, engaged in the Southwest Pacific in World War II and recruited in New England in the post-war years, this Fall became the first U. S. National Guard division to join Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's Atlantic Pacific Armies.

New Haven Already Exempted \$164,560 In Gross Assessments

Taking the stand that he was against further tax exemption for the City of New Haven on East Haven property, First Selectman Frank A. Barker said today that he was opposed to City of New Haven municipal ownership of the New Haven Water Company.

The matter was thoroughly discussed last Thursday Friday by the mayor and 13 town and city governments serviced by the private utility company. The meeting was held with the New Haven Board of Aldermen.

At that time the town's chief executive was concerned with the possible loss of tax revenue in the town.

This morning Barker said that East Haven stands to lose more than \$17,000 in income if the Water Company becomes municipally owned.

Assessors figures show that real property of the Water Company is assessed at \$87,950 and personal property at \$370,316 for a total assessment of \$458,270. Based on a tax rate of 2 1/2 mills the town's local property amount to \$7,715.06.

Barker's stand is similar to that taken by surrounding towns who see the loss of taxes as a major blow to the community.

Barker said that his sole objection was based on the loss of revenue although other Selectmen have taken the position as seeing mismanagement as well.

Currently the City of New Haven has taxes abated for municipal enterprises, located in East Haven, to the assessed valuation of \$164,560. Included is property of the Municipal Golf Course and the New Haven Airport.

Under law, the Water Company must offer its property for sale to the City of New Haven every 25 years. The company has exercised the right for New Haven to exercise its option until late in April.

Questioned as to the personal property owned by the New Haven Water Company, Assessor Nicholas Tinarl said today that it included mains meters, pipes, etc. Real property refers to direct real estate owned by it.

Tinarl said that the Airport assessment was low because it was based on acreage.

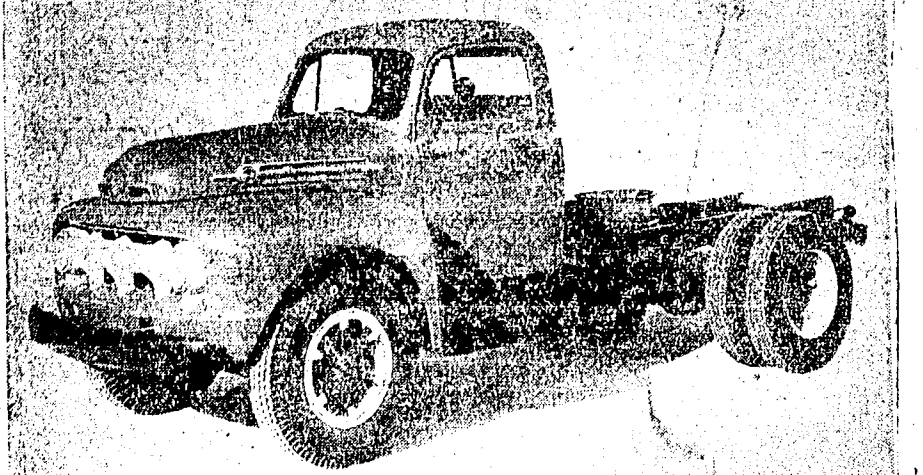

Mr. Mudd joins the staff this week. His headquarters will be in the Association's offices at 152 Temple Street, New Haven.

In making the announcement, Dr. Dollard said: "We are fortunate in getting Mr. Mudd to join forces with us. With his aid we expect to take a long stride forward in developing positive programs to advance mental health education and organization."

Mr. Mudd was graduated from the University of Washington in Seattle, and for two years was in charge of program and community planning for the international students at the university.
