A ban was placed on all outdoor fires in East Haven this week by Fire Chief Thomas J. Hayes after local firemen were called out 18 times over the weekend to extinguish grass and brush fires.
The ban, which forbids fires

in incinerators or otherwise, will be effective until further notice, Hayes said, under penalty of the

Grass fires in East Haven dur-Grass fires in East layer dur-ing the month of April have been the worst of any month in the past two years. The chief asks townspeople to be "more than careful" during dry and windy weather, and reminded them that one danger of grass fires is that they are liable to extend to other buildings. Hayes said the ban would remain in effect until after a "good heavy rain."
