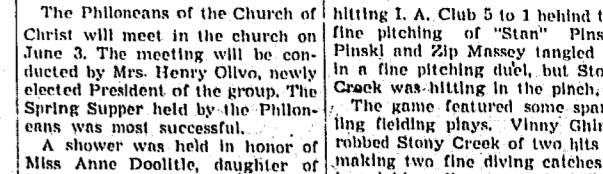

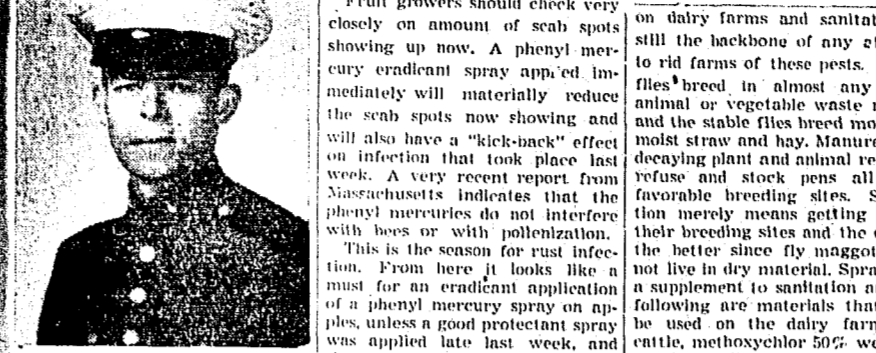

Marine Marksmanship

On dairy farms and sanitation is still the backbone of any attempt to control these pests. House flies breed in almost any animal or vegetable waste matter and the stable flies breed mostly in manure. Many measures have been devised to control these pests, but the most effective is the use of insecticides. The physical measures do not interfere with the breeding of the insects, but they do interfere with their feeding. From here it looks like a spray of an insecticide is the most practical application of a physical measure. The insecticide should be applied to the manure, unless a good protective spray is applied last week, and there are no primary soil insects on the farm.

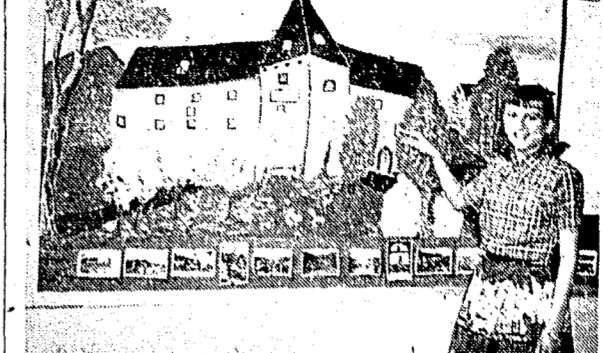
