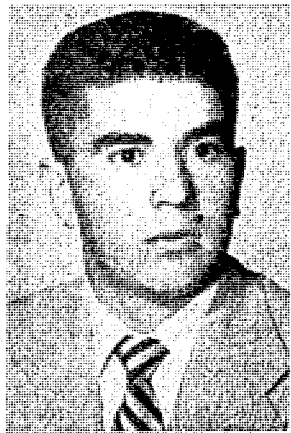

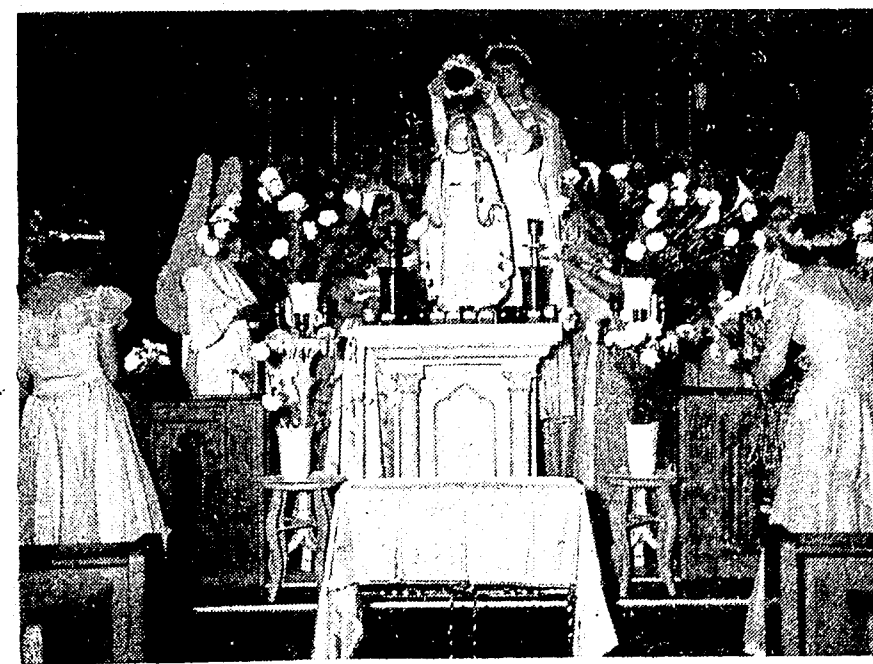
### Mrs. Wm. Degnall Named Chairman Of Dental Council

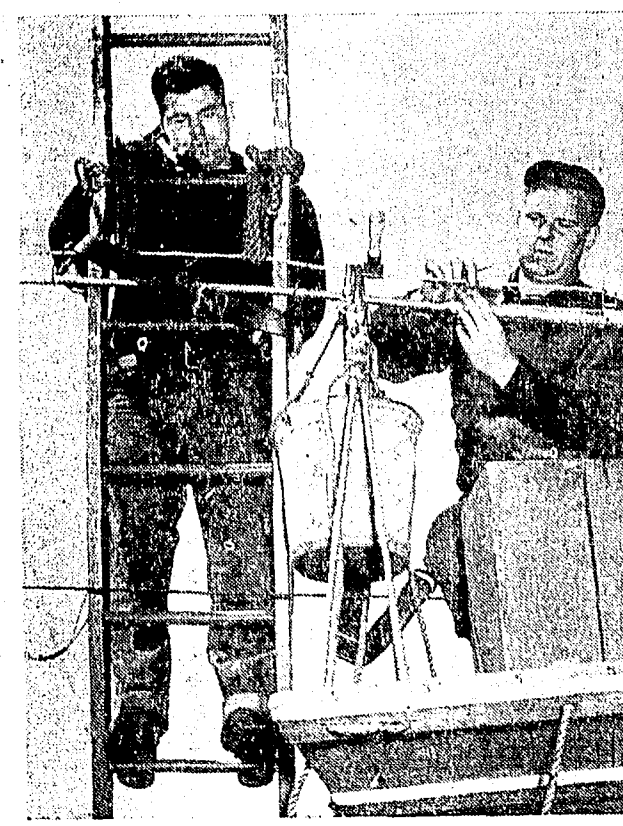

**Install New Telephone Cables Along U. S. 1 To Provide Branford-Guilford Direct Dialing**



A familiar sight along U. S. 1, as telephone crews work on the extensive installations of new cable that will permit direct dialing between the Branford and Guilford exchanges when Guilford is converted to dial operation in July.

Here, on a cable platform twenty feet above the highway, cable splicer Ralph L. Hill (right), who lives at 90 Seaside Avenue, Guilford, and his helper, William B. Hinkley, of Glenmour Drive, East Haven, are shown completing a splice in one of the cable sections.

The cables are being installed from the Branford telephone building underground out East Main Street to Beach Street. Aerial cable then follows the Post Road to within a mile of the Guilford town line where it is to be connected to a portion of existing cable.

In Guilford, aerial cable runs from the town line along U. S. 1 to West River, and then goes underground to connect with the dial equipment in the new Guilford telephone building on Church Street.

This project, which requires cable containing more than 4,800 miles of copper wire, is typical of telephone activity throughout the state. Telephone construction, which has totalled \$142,000,000 in Connecticut since World War II, will continue to be carried on with all the speed that the availability of critical materials permits.

FROM THE CONNECTICUT WATER QUALITY CONTROL BOARD  
 Letter of Advice from the Council

The manager plan simply applies to municipal government the techniques that prevail in the administration of business and industry. The voters (stockholders) elect the council (board of directors) who in turn appoint the city manager (corporate executive) to carry out the day-to-day operations in accordance with the policies determined by the council.

This does not mean that the manager is a mere office boy. He should be a trained and experienced executive, able to deal intelligently with the public and the council. He should be able to assist the council by supplying information and offering constructive suggestions and recommendations for council consideration. The manager's appointment should be for an indefinite term, to serve at the pleasure of the council. Although he may be permitted a public hearing to air grievances, the decision of the council on removal should be final.

The Council Elector The council, elected to the best of the more recently adopted form, is a small body—5, 7 or 9 members—elected, at-large on a non-partisan ballot. The fewer the number and the larger the constituency from which they are elected, the higher the caliber of the candidates. The city of Norfolk, with a population of over 200,000, has only since the 1930 census raised the number of its councilmen from 5 to 7. Cincinnati, with over 400,000 has a seven council. Houston, Virginia, with over 100,000 has 5.

Non-Partisan There is no room for partisanship in local government, no such thing as Republican or Democratic sewer pipes. The national parties might be in a stronger position if they did not.

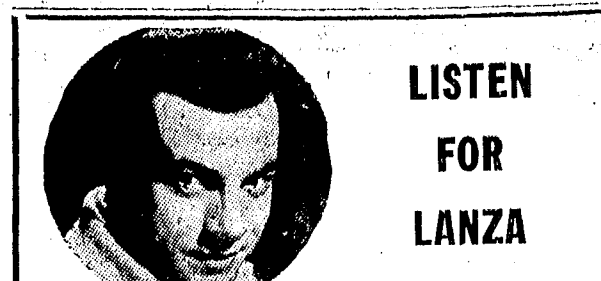

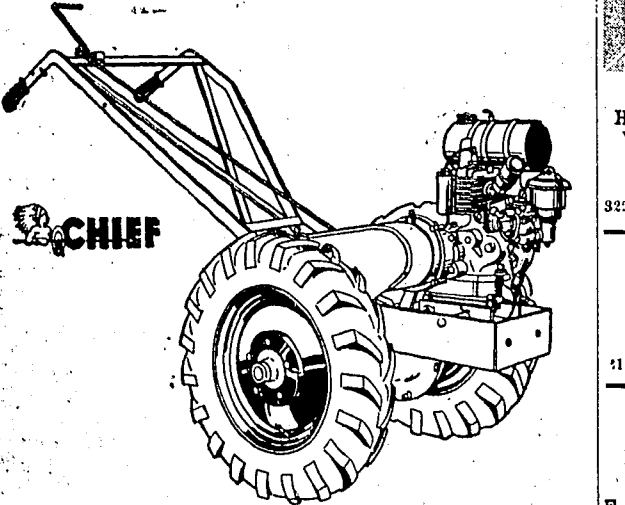
