Scout Camp Fund Drive Reaching Final Stages

William E. Montgomery, chairman of the local Camp Sequassen Fund Drive, announces that the drive is now entering the final stages in East Haven. The local committee is striving to raise a sizeable amount towards the total amount needed for the Boy Scout camp in Winsted of \$250,000. At present, all local units of both Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts are actively engaged in aiding the drive. Chairman Montgomery urges all townspeople who have not made their donations or pledges to date, to do so by calling HO 7-3158 as soon as possible.

Before a crowd of 350 attending the special town meeting Tuesday evening in the high school an attempt to chart a long term school building program for East Haven produced two hours of debate but no definite action was taken. An unexpected motion to adjourn cut off wrangling on the first call of the meeting, which was to purchase land for a Junior High School, before a test limited to qualified voters could be made.

Following the election of Chairman Henry Antz, Mr. Burton Reed, Chairman of the Board of Education, presented the preliminary report on the plan proposed by the board and stated its advantages and reasons for the plan.

Superintendent William E. Gillis commented on the program and stated that the high school would be filled to its capacity by 1958 and the high school property does not allow for further expansion. He stressed the fact that he hoped at this meeting a committee would be appointed to purchase sites.

Two members of the Board of Education, Mr. Charles Copeland and Mr. James Vetrone, submitted a minority report on the program, backing an increase in elementary school space instead of the building of the Junior High School at this time. Mr. Copeland stated he did not believe that the town should spend the money which would be needed for a Junior High School, but keep it in reserve until such time as we would know where the population will increase. He favored building a six room addition to Momauguin and 8 to 12 in the Gerrish Avenue section and 12 rooms in Foxon, which would not cost the town as much as a Junior High School.

A riding vote was taken on the first call of the meeting, which was to purchase land for a Junior High School, which resulted in 133 against and 136 for the school. It was then requested that a check list vote be taken.

This would mean that new property owners in town who are not on the voting list would be barred from voting, which immediately resulted in a motion for adjournment, resulting in 188 for adjournment and 134 against.
