# Chairman Mathew Anasiasio to obtain the services of a private "group" in surveying the town's

needs for addition school facilities came under sharp attack at Monday night's town meeting in the high school auditorium.

The suggestion was made following the voting of approval by the approximately 200 persons pre-sent of a resolution—authorizing the obtaining of land sites for Highland , Laurel Grove, Tuttle and Union schools.

The meeting had been called in order to initiate action for the expansion of school facilities in the four districts after a previous town meeting restricted itself to authorizing improvements for the Mom-

auguin, Gerrish Avenue and Fox-on Schools. Henry Antz, who served as chair man of the meeting, declared the floor open to discussion of proposed school improvements. Anastusio school improvements. Anustusio then stepped to the fore stating that he would like to make a suggestion. "I'm not proposing any action now", he said, "but I would like to have the like the like the like to have the like like to have this idea kicked around a little because I think it's worth some thought."

"I recommend", said the GOP town chairman," that the select-men of this town consider, while the committee is looking for school sites, getting a private group to come in here and make a real sur-

The chairman said he recom-mended the move because the town meetings appeared to have little factual information to go on. "No matter who gets up", he de-clared, "we don't believe him." clared, "we don't believe him."

Edmond S. Flanagan, of Morgan Point, member elect of the Board of Education, hurried down to the microphone to attack the town chairman's suggestion.
