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## Three Area Youths Fined For Driving Recklessly In Foxon

Stiff fines were meted out to three area hot-rod enthusiasts in Town Court Monday after they were found guilty of reckless driving in charges following their arrest last Wednesday evening.

Albert P. Del Vecchio, 18, of 95 Foxon Boulevard, East Haven, received a fine of \$30; Eugene O. Onofrio, 16, of 149 Main St., New Haven, was fined \$21; and Nicholas J. Aceto, Jr., 23, of 659 Woodward Ave., New Haven, was fined \$27.

Arresting Officer Frank Konesky testified that he had pursued the three youths, driving in three separate cars, after he saw them shoot out of Maple St. onto North High St., drive down Hunt Lane and out onto Route 80 without obeying stop signs.

Cars Race  
He said that the cars raced down Route 80, which has a posted speed zone of 30 miles per hour, passed twice on blind curves and forced one oncoming car off the road. He said his patrol car was unable to exceed 50 miles an hour and that he couldn't catch up with the boys until they stopped at Yulo's Store on Route 80.

The three young drivers pleaded not guilty to the charges, and claiming they were not speeding or driving recklessly.

Officer Konesky told the court he pursued the three cars with his siren blowing and his signal light flashing and that they failed to halt until they pulled into Yulo's driveway.

The court was told that repeated complaints have been received from residents along North High St. and Route 80 regarding hot rod drivers who drove at high speeds in limited speed zones.

Requests by the boys to have the news of their court appearances soft-pedaled so that their parents might not find out were denied by Judge Fasano.

In other cases: Donald A. McClelland, 43, of Jersey City, N. J., forfeited a \$25 bond posted for speeding; William J. Calligan, 19, of East Main St., Danford, was fined \$9 for violation of motor vehicle laws and judgment was suspended on a charge of not carrying his driver's license; Anthony J. Conte, 18, of 339 Legion Ave., New Haven, was fined \$12 for speeding.

Also, Wallace B. Robertson, 37, of Winston, N. C., forfeited \$25 bond for speeding; Stanley M. Engle, 28, of 127 Center Ave., East Haven, charged with violation of motor vehicle laws, received a nolle; and Mary Lou Carnevale, 20, of 65 Palmetto Trail, East Haven, charged with violation of motor vehicle laws also received a nolle. Jack Gerber, 42, of 1175 Chapel St., New Haven, charged with passing a stop sign, received a nolle on payment of \$6, while judgment was suspended on a count of failure to carry license.

## Police Chief Warns Of Crack-Down On Teen-Aged Drivers

A warning of stricter enforcement of motor vehicle laws against errant teen-aged drivers was issued by Chief Edwin Priest in a message broadcast yesterday to students over the public address system at the High School.

"The chief's message was read as follows: 'I have pursued the three youths, driving in three separate cars, after he saw them shoot out of Maple St. onto North High St., drive down Hunt Lane and out onto Route 80 without obeying stop signs.'

"You send cards to your parents? do you really mean what they say? Compliments of the operation of cars to and from school yard, have come to my attention: We have given a number of warnings to high school students operating without license, reckless driving, speeding and so-called hot rods, without much success.

"I have instructed my men to stop giving warnings and to make arrests to see if this will make a safer community to live in. Let's all get together for the holidays. 'Don't drive without a license. Drive carefully and avoid any unhappiness in the home. Remember the life you save may be your own. 'With a Merry Christmas to all and a Happy New Year from the members of the Police Department.'

## Allot \$3,896,376 to 14 Redevelopment Agencies

Capital grant reservations for 14 redevelopment projects in the state, including the local Bradford Cove undertaking, amount to a total of \$3,896,376, according to information released by the East Haven Redevelopment Agency.

Alexander Doran, agency chairman, revealed that of the total funds in the reserved grant, held in reserve by the Housing and Home Finance Agency, an initial grant of \$15,000 was spent by the local agency during the past 20 months in preparation of Momaugun redevelopment plans.

The agency is in the preliminary planning stage and is contemplating a revised budget as soon as an estimate can be made of the cost of completing final plans.

Federal funds approved for the preliminary plans on projects throughout the state amounted to \$220,610 as of Oct. 31. Of this amount \$170,768 has been expended to date by the several agencies.

## East Haven Quintet Strong Favorite Vs. Boardman Tonight

The East Haven quintet will face an underdog Boardman Trade in New Haven tonight as it goes out after its third victory in as many starts.

The Easties, who squeaked through a 49 to 47 win over the powerful Branford Hornets, are not expected to have any trouble with Boardman. The New Haven team lost its third straight tilt last week by a score of 67 to 36 against Bullard Haven in Bridgeport.

A daily hot lunch program will be initiated at the Foxon School after the start of the new year. The program will be operated by a committee of the Foxon School PTA under the chairmanship of Mrs. Ruth E. Thompson.

The hot lunch committee has been working for the past few weeks on a trial basis, and in the meantime has completed the necessary details to make possible the government subsidy of nine cents per meal, and also the surplus foods obtainable through the farm administration.

Equipment for the kitchen and tables for the use of the pupils in taking their hot lunches were provided by the Board of Education some time ago.

The Highland School PTA has also made requests to the Board of Education for hot water in the teachers' room in the event that first aid is required for children and also for more tables and chairs in the lunch room. These requests are being considered by the Committee on Buildings.

The delicacies and gifts were the contribution of 22 freshmen girls who had recently completed a Red Cross course on the care of home sick given by Ruth Eggleston, of the New Haven Red Cross Service.

Under the direction of Alberta Toothaker and Barbara Folsom, department heads, the girls baked butter, refrigerator, peanut butter and oatmeal cookies; baked chocolate fudge and maple walnut creams; and prepared stuffed dates and cranberry sauce for the gift packages.

Other members of the Home-making department clipped in on this mission of holiday good will by preparing room decorations and making up the Christmas boxes.

The girls were assigned to committees in charge of separate sets of gift boxes for the Linden, Seeds and Stewart Convalescent homes. In addition a box was sent to seven patients at Mrs. Emma Fige's home on High Street.

Each committee was permitted to add its own selection of small gifts such as stationery, small books and other items.

According to Miss Toothaker one of the objectives of the home nursing course is to teach the girls how to make a sick person happy and comfortable. "I think this was a wonderful opportunity for them to do just that," she said.

Members of the school glee club visited the homes over the weekend to sing Christmas carols.

## Post Offices Are "Over The Hump" Postmaster Says

The situation in area post offices, including the East Haven branch, is "in good shape" and the postal department is "over the hump" in the handling of Christmas mail, Postmaster William J. Higgins reported today.

Higgins said that the postal department has been working steadily around the clock, seven days a week in order to insure, as much as possible, delivery of holiday mail by Christmas Day.

"There are about three or four men working on every route in East Haven," he said, "and the branch office windows have kept open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m. Unless we have excessively high mailings, we ought to be able to close at 5:30 p. m., our regular time, on Christmas Eve."

The postmaster advised persons mailing parcels to addresses in Connecticut to use special delivery. Anything beyond Pennsylvania and New York should be mailed air parcel post, he said, in order to speed its delivery. "We're just as anxious to have those parcels delivered by Christmas Day as the people mailing them."

Higgins announced that special deliveries will be made all day on Christmas from 7:30 a. m. until 11 o'clock at night. Also, anything resembling a Christmas parcel will be delivered Christmas morning. However, there will be no window service in East Haven on Christmas Day and the post office lobby will not be open.

Postal Service Friday  
Despite a presidential executive order designating Friday as an official holiday for all government employees, Higgins said, regular service will be maintained on that day. Post offices will be open and regular carrier service will be maintained according to usual schedules.

The postmaster said he was very pleased with the cooperation of the public in using department stickers for local and out of town mail in order to permit more rapid handling. "The public cooperated very well, and we appreciate it," he said.

A total of more than one million cards were handled in five days during the peak of the Christmas rush, his office revealed. Postal traffic this year was up about five per cent over the previous record last year.

Leaving porch lights on until six p. m. will be a great help to the late-working mailman. Occupants are requested to place the full names and numbers on mail boxes and to tie up dogs who may be suspicious of, or a nuisance to, the mailmen.

## Meeting On School Sites Next Tuesday; Date Is Confirmed By Barker

Issuance of an official call by the Board of Selectmen for a town meeting next Tuesday evening for the purpose of approving the school sites and a right of way to one of these sites is expected shortly.

First Selectman Frank A. Barker confirmed the Tuesday date and set the time and place for the hearing at 8 p. m. in the High School auditorium.

Town residents will be asked to act upon the following pieces of property, upon which options had been taken following a comprehensive survey by the School Sites Committee:

1) Zuckerman property in Foxon and located off Foxon Road approximately 24 acres at a cost of \$1200 per acre or a total of \$28,800. Expiration date for the option, on which \$100 was deposited, is March 1, 1953.

2) A right of way, measuring 65 feet by approximately 400 feet, to the Zuckerman property, and on Tonnas property in Foxon, at a price of \$4,500. Expiration date on \$100 option, March 1, 1953.

3) Cohen property in Momaugun consisting of 11 and one-half building lots, measuring 40 by 140 feet each, for a total price of \$3,000. Expiration date, \$200 option, January 1, 1953.

4) Connecticut Company property in Momaugun, approximately four acres at a price of \$10,000. No deposit. Expiration date, March 1, 1953.

5) DeCaprio property off Gerrish Avenue, measuring approximately six acres, at a total price of \$20,000. Expiration date, \$100 option, March 1, 1953.

The Zuckerman and Tonnas properties involve land which would be needed for the construction of a new school in Foxon. In Momaugun, the Cohen and Connecticut Company properties would meet requirements for the expansion of the Momaugun School. The DeCaprio property would be used for expansion of West End school facilities, now consisting solely of Gerrish Avenue school.

The Tuesday date was confirmed by the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Finance at a joint meeting Friday. Town Counsel Vincent J. Fasano was directed to draw up a call, complete with official description of the properties for publication as soon as possible.

## Rev. & Mrs. J. E. Waery Feted On Their Wedding Jubilee

Members of boards of education from seven towns met Friday night for the purpose of discussing common problems and exchanging information. Mrs. W. Oren Parker, chairman of the East Haven school board, reported this week.

Mrs. Parker, who said she could not issue any detailed information without first clearing with the school board, said that earlier reports that the conference was held for the purpose of putting a limit on teacher salaries were misleading.

"Because we were invited, we went seeking the information made available through this cooperative meeting with other boards," she said. "They have problems like ours and they wanted to see what they had to say. The conference was mostly an exchange of ideas."

## Struck By Car Pedestrian, 72, In Fair Condition

Bartolomeo Milner, 72, of 21 Barker Place, was seriously injured at 6 a. m. yesterday when he was struck by a car while crossing Main St. near East Haven Clemens.

Milner, who was the third East Haven auto casualty during the past few days, received a fractured right leg and abrasions of the leg. He was taken to St. Raphael's hospital where attendants reported this morning that he had been "resting comfortably."

According to Officer Louis Torello who investigated the accident, Milner was struck by a car driven by Albert E. D'Amato, 30, of 338 Second Avenue, West Haven. The driver was arrested on a charge of violating motor vehicle laws, and released on his own recognizance.

Officer Torello said that the car was traveling east on Main street at the time of the accident, the driver claiming that he was moving at a moderate rate of speed. The victim was crossing the street with the intention of taking an early morning bus, Torello said.

Early morning rain and sleet are believed to have made the road slippery.

Milner was removed to the hospital in Momaugun's ambulance. On Sunday one East Haven youth was killed, and another injured in an accident in Branford.

## Fire Marshall Warns Of Fire Danger From Christmas Trees

With business people and homeowners now in the throes of decorating establishments and residences for the coming holiday week, Fire Marshal Ernest Hansen issued a reminder of the regulations of the Fire Department pertaining to Christmas trees and other holiday displays. He reminds people that the tree, center of holiday festivities in most American homes, can all too easily become the center of a tragic fire.

Hansen also explained that trees set up in places of public assembly should not be adorned with electric lights. There should not be any smoking permitted within 10 feet of the tree.

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Attending with Mrs. Parker were Burton Reed, a member, and former chairman, of the school board, and Supt. William E. Gillis. Charles Copeland, another board member, expressed interest in attending, but was unable to do so because of other commitments.

Mrs. Parker denied that the purpose of the meeting was to fix a ceiling on teacher salaries, pointing out that such a scheme would be impractical in view of the current teacher shortage. In support of her statement, she released a copy of a letter circulated by Joseph A. Foran, Milford superintendent of schools, requesting the meeting.

Nineteen Attend  
Nineteen representatives of seven school systems attended the Milford conference. Present were members of the school boards of Milford, Stratford, West Haven, Orange, Woodbridge, Wallingford and East Haven. The school superintendents from Milford, Stratford, West Haven, Wallingford and East Haven also attended.

The meeting agreed on the following points:  
1. Expansion of school systems has created a teacher shortage.  
2. Higher teacher wage scales will be needed to encourage more (Continued On Page Five)

Saint Giles countered that the principles of the community chest could be applied to the school room, where approximately eight or ten separate drives were held each year, to eliminate duplication of a lot of time and effort.

As Giles puts it in an article for School Executive magazine: "It was decided that monthly collections would be taken during the school year and the proceeds would be allocated to various organizations of a charitable nature. The amount decided upon was ten cents a month for each pupil of the school year. Because of the amount collected each month the plan was called the Dime-a-Month plan and it is purely voluntary. All contributions come from the individual pupils and are not raised through penny marches, shows or sales and the purpose is to eliminate duplication of a lot of time and effort."

From time to time the schools are called upon to contribute to various causes of a charitable nature. It has been found that much time is taken away from regular school work to conduct drives for funds for these worthwhile causes. As a result of this we established a special collection of ten cents a month for each pupil and parents. This plan is in use in our elementary schools only. Contributions have been sufficient to meet our needs. The monthly contribution is ten cents or eighty cents for the year.

The plan was put into action by Supt. William E. Gillis after he found that a great deal of time was wasted in the collection of funds for various campaigns. Not only were children in different classrooms and different schools often placed in a competitive position, but various blue-ribbon "chess" such as the Penny March, were devised to raise total collections. Another scheme was to run a raffle for public sale.

Last Thursday's Christian Science Monitor reprinted an editorial from the old old Hartford Courant. It was slightly whimsical and gently chiding the "upstart" New York Times for a typographical error.

As often happens in the newspaper business, a typo is best ignored. Almost invariably the error is compounded in some way or other. The Times was responsible for the error, the Courant made a previous blunder in pointing it out and the Monitor extended the blip by reprinting the article.

Undaunted, we'll give it another try.

### "Food" Suggestion

"Many of the good things in life including, as they say, roast pig, are the happy by-products of mischance. Many scientific discoveries owe their recognition to an acute eye viewing an accidental happening, and correlating it with other facts. All of which leads to the main point, namely that an earnest, younger contemporary, the New York Times, inadvertently created a new word the other day. It is a word of tremendous possibilities, and it is solely with the thought that its brief life may be savored that we now mention the matter.

"The story had to do with a certain public official who was considered by the state Department to be, so the story said, a "poor" security risk. Obviously there was mental conflict in the production of this word, varying as it does midway between good and poor. A good risk, indeed; how many things are there in life that dangle halfway between good and poor?

"How was the show last night? Oh, not too good, not too bad. Just about good, I'd say."

"In fact nearly everything, including people, fall into the poor category. Most singing is poor. Most people are poor sports. Most cooking ranges from good to poor, or if you are lucky, from good to good. Most people have a poor time at parties, and enjoy poor health.

"We could go on like that ad infinitum to bolster the position that none of the words we now have indicating safe, middle ground is nearly so effective as the portmanteau word created by the Times linotype operator. We suggest that it would be a pretty good idea for the Times to throw its respected weight behind this new word."

Now the entire nonsense of the article is predicated on the fact that there is no such word as "poor." We submit that there is such a word and of a particularly insidious origin when applied to State Department designations.

"A 'poor' is a Russian unit of weight, roughly equivalent to 36.113 pounds. Therefore, if one is classified as a "poor risk" there is an implication that there is some relation between his honesty and how far a "poor" could be thrown.

Perhaps the State Department and the New York Times were right and the Department has a Jim Fuchs to seal the integrity of its officials with a "poor-put." This seems like a good place to stop before we "poor our foot in it."

### 34th President

Programs for the coming inauguration, it is reported, will list Dwight D. Eisenhower as the 34th President of the United States instead of the 35th. This is on the theory that Grover Cleveland should be counted as two separate presidents, since the terms which he served were not consecutive.

It is hard to follow this line of reasoning. Even on the theory that the human body changes completely in seven years it would not be true that Mr. Cleveland had two terms in 1893 was a different Mr. Cleveland from the one who left the office in 1888.

Of course, legalists may have some concept of a presidency exercised from a president. Yet it is peculiar that Republicans should want to count Mr. Cleveland twice. Thereby they give the Democrats 11 Chief Executives (if you go back to Jefferson) instead of 13. And with the advent of General Eisenhower the Republicans will have achieved 13 without counting Andrew Johnson (a Democrat elected on the Republican ticket) or the Whigs and Federalists who preceded them.

If it is the office rather than the man that is counted, one may even argue that the presidency was a different office after Franklin D. Roosevelt broke the no-third-term tradition and that hence he should be counted twice. But we do not think Republicans will take to this theory.

There may be a statistical or legal nicety about calling Mr. Eisenhower the 34th President. But when you ask the average how many presidents the United States has had, do you suppose he is thinking about statistical abstractions or human beings?

young people to enter the profession so that adequate personnel can be obtained for the growing school systems.

The shortage has caused towns to bid against one another for teachers, and a systematic plan of salary schedules, including minimum and maximum pay, number of years service to reach maximum pay, and the amount of periodic increments, ought to be established.

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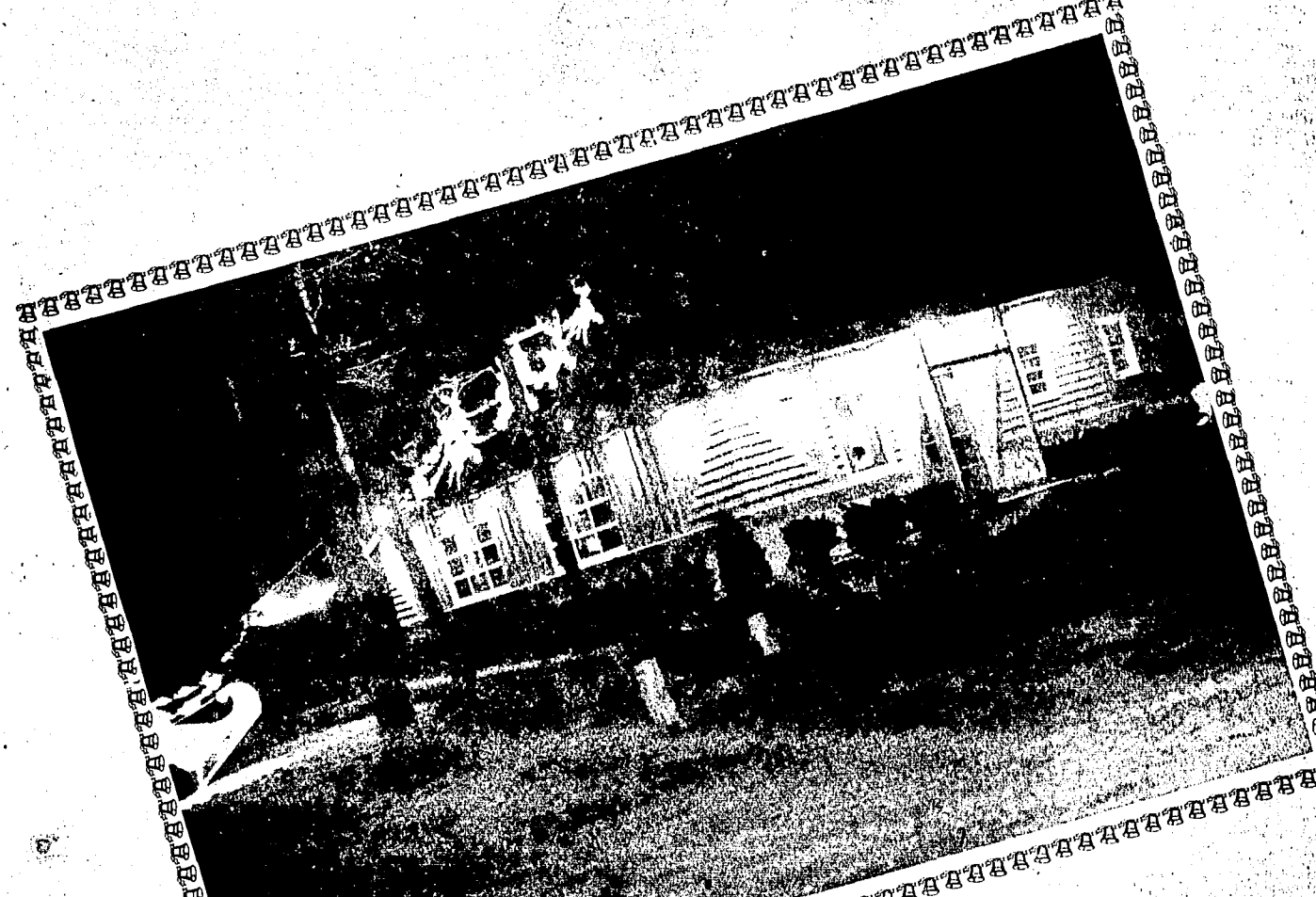

**Dime Per Month** — (Continued From Page Two) work, however, we cannot wait separate drives along with the present plan. Contributions must be to the fund and not to any separate drives which are being conducted by outside agencies.

"The funds are placed in an account and a budget is set up by the superintendent and a committee of teachers. The committee decided the organizations which should be the recipients of money collected, and it also decided on the amount of each contribution. In the past money has been contributed to the Community Chest, Red Cross, Junior Red Cross, Christmas Shops, Salvation Army, Infants' Paralysis and the American Cancer Society. We also sponsored a school either in the South or in a foreign country and have helped the children in the school to secure materials and food.

"This plan saves school time and distributes the load among the pupils so that more pupils contribute but each one gives a moderate amount. **Edible Ornaments Are Fun To Make, Taste Good Too**

"Expendable" Christmas tree ornaments can be fun to make, interesting to look at, and whole-

some to eat, suggests Janina Czalkowski, Extension nutritionist with the University of Connecticut.
