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Parents Should Censor Own Comics, Legislator Advises

"I think we adults ought to buy more comic books," Mrs. Alice Peterson, of Branford, told a meeting of the East Haven Parent-Teacher's Council Monday night in the Hagaman Memorial Library. Mrs. Peterson, who is a veteran member of the lower house of the state legislature and now serving her third term, advocated that parents take a greater hand in selecting the reading matter of their children, rather than resorting to the supervisory services of a state administrative authority to regulate the sale of comic books.

Town To Get New Dump Truck At Cost Of \$2600

Purchase of a new Reo three-year dump truck for the highway department at an approximate cost of \$2600 to the Town was announced this week by First Selectman Frank Barker. Delivery of the new truck, bought from the Reo Sales and Service Company in West Haven, was expected some time this month, he said. The purchase price included the trade-in of a 1947 Diamond-T truck from the department. The trade-in has an approximate mileage of 50,000 registered on its speedometer. Barker explained that maintenance costs were becoming high on the old truck and that expected bad weather in the next few months made it imperative for the Town to have on hand a dependable equipment for snow removal and other emergency use. The new truck will have an attachment for snow plow and other accessories.

The East High quintet, unbeat in six starts this season is rated as a strong favorite over an also unbeaten Lyman Hall squad as they get ready to meet here in the East Haven High gym at 8:30 Friday evening. The Wallingford basketball team in its last game with Wilcox Tech, of Meriden, won by a seven point margin over their opponents after battling by four points in the first half. Captain Bucky Catapano, who opened up in the third quarter to lead his team to a 64 to 57 victory over the Indians, is expected to be the anchor man for the Lyman Hallers. East Haven, which topped a strong Southington team by a 66 to 56 score in an unscheduled game last Saturday, will enter Friday's contest with seven first-rate first stringers headed by Captain Vin Cagliardi and top-shooter Tony Massari. For comparison's sake the East Haven quintet romped over Wilcox Tech by a score of 82 to 52 in its opening game.

Anastasio Foresees Intensive March Of Dimes Campaign

The 1953 March of Dimes campaign to raise funds for fighting the disease of poliomyelitis opened last Friday throughout the nation and will be continued for the remainder of the month. Matthew Anastasio, campaign director of the East Haven campaign, predicted that the local drive would be the most intensive of its kind in local history. He is being assisted by Mrs. Lillian Hurdler, drive co-chairman, and Miss Elaine Homer, R. N., chairman of the local Mothers March on Polio to be conducted on Jan. 30. The East Haven campaign director revealed that plans for campaign activities are now being reviewed and that committee members and other workers are receiving a final briefing of the work ahead during the four-week period of the local drive. "The people of East Haven have always had the welfare of their children at heart and have always demonstrated their loyalty and support in the fight against the cruel disease-infantile paralysis. In that knowledge, your local March of Dimes volunteers will go all-out during the drive to make this campaign the phenomenal success it must be," Mr. Anastasio said.

That is needed is lacking - until outside help arrives. This help consists of doctors, nurses, physical therapists, iron lungs, hot-pack machines, rocking beds and all the other equipment which moves swiftly through the supply-lines of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and which is made possible by the March of Dimes. "So deep-rooted in the soil of our culture is this spirit of helping - or giving - or sharing - that it follows Americans even into battle. For example, there is an epic of the Korean war treasured by the March of Dimes organization. Minter, who received a fractured right leg among other injuries, and was taken to St. Raphael's hospital succumbed last week. He was 72 years old.

Local Public Health Nurses To Get \$2,000 From United Fund

The East Haven Public Health Nursing Association will receive \$2,000 toward 1953 operating expenses from a total of \$1,236,993 in Key Drive pledges being allotted to the 48 health and welfare organizations of the United Fund, Edward M. Galliard, United Fund president, has announced. The recent Key Drive received pledges totaling \$1,236,993 from individuals and organizations in the Greater New Haven area. However, not all that amount can be allotted, Galliard said, because experience has shown that provision must be made for shrinkage resulting from uncollectible pledges due to deaths, removals, etc. Among other agencies which will share Key Drive funds are Grace-New Haven Community Hospital, YMCA, YWCA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Catholic Social Service Bureau, USO and the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation. A grant of \$25,000 has been set aside for the United Fund's special health causes fund, which is used for research and treatment of victims of polio, cancer, heart and other major diseases. During 1952 more than \$50,000 was distributed to local health organizations through this fund.

Winter Term Of Night School Begins At E-H High School

Caryle V. Frawley, Supervisor of Adult Education in the East Haven High School announces that classes have been resumed as of Monday evening, January 5th. This will begin the winter term. Registration is now open for those who did not attend the fall term and wish to participate at this time. Registrations are being limited to those classes which have room left to capacity. Registrations may be made tonight, January 8th at the high school office from 7 to 9 p. m., also on Monday and Tuesday evenings. Courses being held this year include: English, mathematics, social science, general science, sewing (beginners and advanced), typing (beginners and advanced), art, hooked rugs, girls gymnasium, glee club and chorus, woodworking and shop and ceramics. These courses are free to any East Haven resident over sixteen years of age who is not attending school. Each class meets one night a week from 7:10 to 9:15 p. m.

Home Construction Sets Record Here In Past Twelve Months

Approximately 250 family residential units were constructed in East Haven in 1952 to set a record for home construction in the area, according to Building Inspector Clement Catalano. The issuance of eight building permits for the first part of a group of 28 one-family houses on the former property of the Kompter Dairy Farm on North High St. was only one of several indications of continued construction in East Haven during the coming year. The High Street homes will be in the \$12,000 plus class and will be built by the Yedding Construction Company, which has already built a number of one-family units in Yalesville.

A seven pound, 12 ounce baby girl named Delores Ann became East Haven's first baby of the year when she was born at 9:18 a. m. New Year's Day in St. Raphael's hospital. The infant and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Zacks, of 3 Marie Dr., were the recipients of gifts from well-wishing merchants in the town. Zacks is a fireman with the Central Station of the New Haven Fire Department on Olive and St. John St. He is a veteran of eight years of active service with the Navy and has a citation for bravery from Admiral Nimitz. The Zacks have resided at their present home for the past two years. They have two other children, Thomas, who is six years old and attends kindergarten, at Gertrude School, and Sharon, three. Thomas will celebrate his sixth birthday on Jan. 23. The couple were informed of the merchants' "First Baby of 1953" contest by a cousin, who is a subscriber to the East Haven News. Cartons Pain In The Neck To Rubbish Men, Complaint

Use of paper cartons as containers for rubbish set out for collection has created a serious problem for the Town's garbage and rubbish collector, First Selectman Frank Barker said this week. Barker said that the overall picture on garbage and rubbish collection was "considerably better than last year" judging from the reduced number of complaints received. However, he said, the use of paper cartons for rubbish disposal was causing a problem. Use Enclosed Truck He explained that the new contractor, Joseph Ruggieri, used the latest type of equipment consisting of an enclosed truck with built-in conveyor. The cartons, when placed in the conveyor, frequently jammed causing costly delays in the garbage removal. "We may be forced to put a dump truck back on the job if the people fail to cooperate," Barker said. The first selectman asked that residents use solid containers such as bushel baskets and wooden boxes, whose contents may be emptied and the containers returned to home-owners. Cartons which are to be disposed of should be folded so they will fit into the conveyor without jamming, he said. Barker said also that it would be impractical for rubbish men to fold the cartons themselves since it would take too much time. He said also, that the cartons frequently got wet and disintegrated so that their contents were scattered about. The first selectman recalled how, previously, an open truck had been used for rubbish removal and how the Town's highway department was sometimes called out to pick up rubbish dropped by the truck. "It seems to me it would be a step backward if we have to stop using the enclosed truck and return to using an open truck for the collection of garbage and rubbish," Barker said.

Critics of Public Schools Increasing, Declares Scott

Criticism of public schools by laymen in the past few years has been the most severe in the whole history of public education in this country, a Yale faculty member declared last week.

Primary and secondary public schools have become the favorite "whipping boy" of critics ranging from conservative clergymen to radical demagogues, according to C. Winfield Scott, 121 Mill Rock Road, Hamden, of Yale University's Department of Education.

His survey of such criticism was given this morning at the education section of the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. The Yale education authority participated in a special session devoted to public school criticism along with Archibald W. Anderson, of the University of Illinois, and Richard B. Kenan, of the National Education Association.

Education deficiencies of servicemen in World War II encouraged this situation, but some promoters continue to operate on the fringe of the law.

Speedy weight reduction is a health hazard. Fat should be lost gradually and regularly. The heart must be given time to adjust, for every extra pound of flesh contains a large supply of blood vessels.

Another favorite target is the social studies courses, Mr. Scott said, and here a common complaint is that the textbooks are "subversive." These charges "constitute something of a threat to every teacher who wishes to

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face the problems squarely and who believes strongly in the eventual supremacy of reason," he stated. "For to seek facts and espouse free inquiry in certain problem areas today is to run the risk of being labeled subversive."

But some of this adverse criticism of the public schools may prove to be a blessing in disguise, Mr. Scott said. "Such will be the case if it stimulates professional educators to be more self-critical and efficient, and encourage educators and laymen to improve their understanding of education and therefore work together better as an educational team," he asserted.

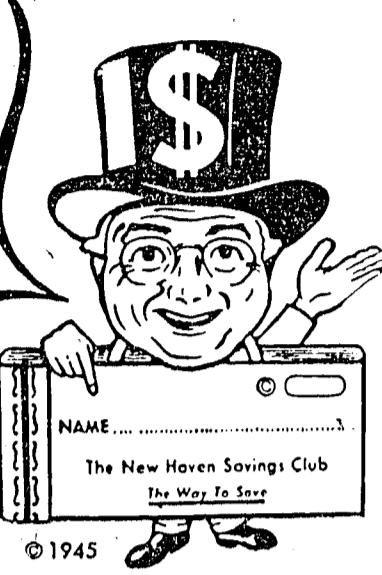
