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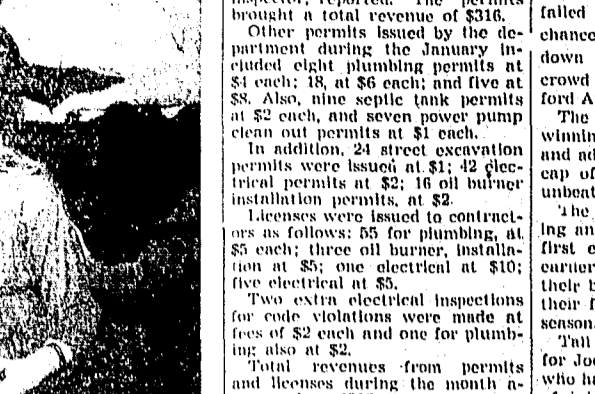

A SALUTE
Since its inception in 1910 the Boy Scouts of America has, as a single organization, outweighed perhaps any other single influence outside of the home and school in shaping the character of our boys.

More than twenty million Americans have been touched by the teaching and fellowship of Scouting and have been strengthened by the high ideals of the Scout Oath and Law since that time beginning 43 years ago.

The East Haven News joins in a salute to its anniversary during Boy Scout Week starting on Saturday.

This year the emphasis is being placed on "The Scout Family." A two-way recognition honoring those many fathers of Scouts serving among the 550,000 adult volunteer leaders and the 127,000 mothers who have been serving as Den Mothers for the Cub Scouts. By encouraging parents and children to enjoy common activities this program is serving to strengthen family ties so necessary in building a strong America.

Youngsters in the 8 to 10 age bracket can start as Cub Scouts, becoming full fledged Scouts during the years 11 to 14 and serving as Explorers at the age of 14 and older.

Certainly, a program which helps install in our young boys a joy for living together with a healthy respect for another and for the world of nature is a program worth supporting and expanding so that many more can enjoy it.

PRESIDENTIAL POLICY
While a radical departure from the policies of previous administrations, the President's State of the Union message to Congress was a fresh view of the problems confronting the nation. It was marked by that same forthrightness that characterized his inaugural address, promising a vigorous approach to both international and domestic matters, although some phases of policy were less clearly defined than others.

President Eisenhower's decision to veto the Senate's legislation of the Foreign Military Assistance Act represents a major departure from his predecessor's policy toward Communist China. What worth or dangers it may entail only time will reveal.

The decision to pursue a "cold, consistent and consistent" foreign policy in the "spirit of true partnership" is a vastly reassuring one. Likewise the pledge to eliminate the waste in our military economy.

In addition to the 111 who died in Greater New Haven area last year as result of accidents, New Haven Safety Council reports that 331 people suffered major injuries. An additional 11,100 required hospital or medical care.

The President is to be commended for his apparent willingness to fly in the face of the traditionally protectionist policies of his party by proposing a study and extension of the reciprocal Trade Agreements Act. Now he intends to define "profitable trade" and "legitimate safeguarding of domestic industries, agriculture and labor standards" and to what extent he intends to pursue the principle of free trade will again be known only with the development of events.

The President has shown himself to be a realist, and not one to be carried away by political fever in his recognition that a national accord must be the first order of business, and that tax reductions cannot come until his goal is achieved. However, he has failed to indicate what he will do about those tax laws which will expire during the next few months and which have been providing about two billions of dollars in revenue annually.

His decision to return the Department of the Treasury and the Federal Reserve Board to the function of stabilizing the economy represents a revision in national policy that has long been overdue. With such an important control on inflation, the removal of wage and price controls may be effected without danger to the system.

In the President's declaration to enact a program of security in government personnel it is hoped he will be able to keep his intention of making such a program "fair to the rights of the individual." All who are sincerely interested in civil rights are hopeful that his assertion that the "primary responsibility for keeping out of the diabolical and the dangerous realm squarely upon the Executive Branch" means he will stand for no malicious "witch hunts" by unscrupulous Congressional committees.

The President's statement on conservation expresses in general terms an intelligent approach to the need for continuing guardianship over national resources. His omission of mention of coastal oil lands, misnamed "tidal oil lands" in the recent election campaign and designated by Harry Truman as Naval oil reserves, does not indicate what his attitude will be toward relationship between mineral ownership and conservation.

President Eisenhower's promise to do all in his power to eliminate racial segregation in the Nation's capital and in the Armed Forces represents a noble gesture. Whether it can come to anything more than that, will depend very much upon Congress. The same is true of the abolition of the McCarran Act as being unjustly discriminatory.

His request for an extension of presidential powers in reorganizing the government had one happy effect. The House Rules Committee, whose 13 Republican members had outvoted 12 Democrats last week by reporting out a bill making it easier for a Congressional majority to kill reorganization measures, voted instead to extend the powers granted President Truman. It was all the result of "confusion" in their lame explanation.

But in broad terms general policy messages must be, the President's message can be taken as a declaration of a middle-of-the-road plan. It must be implemented by specific proposals. The form of those proposals, and the manner in which Congress treats them will decide whether the Congressional leadership and the Administration have "justified" the summons to governmental responsibility issued last November by the American people.

Figures do not reflect these significant variables nor do they indicate the extent to which the declining purchasing power of the dollar accounts for higher expenditures.

By statutory definition, "net current expenses" exclude expenditures for transportation, vocational (industrial arts) programs, and physical handicapped children, and are, consequently, less than "total current expenses." The law also specifies that tuition paid for educating the resident pupils of another town be included in the net current expenses of the sending town but, to avoid duplication, be deducted from the expenses of the receiving town. State participation as shown in the tabulation is limited to grants distributed in accordance with statutory formula and excludes those for transportation, vocational programs, and physically handicapped children.

The basic figures were obtained from the State Board of Education.

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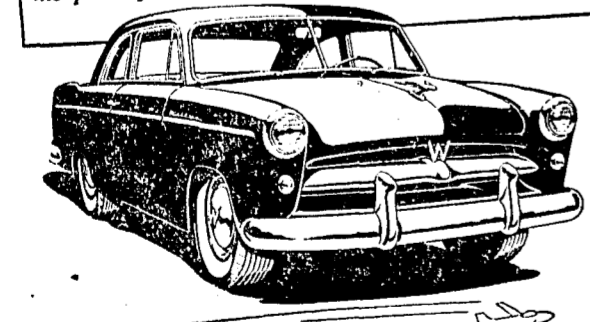

The Clearance and Redevelopment Of Slum Or Blighted Areas In The State; the copy of the proposed bill reads in part as follows:

Section 2. Section 983 of the General Statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof:

Section 983. Financing. For the purpose of carrying out or administering a redevelopment plan or other functions authorized under this chapter, a municipality acting by and through its redevelopment agency, is hereby authorized (without limiting its authority under other provisions of law) to issue from time to time bonds of the municipality which are payable solely from and secured by a pledge of and then upon any or all of the income, proceeds, revenues, and property of redevelopment projects, including the proceeds of grants, loans, advances, or contributions from the Federal Government, the State, or other source (including financial assistance furnished by the Municipality or any other public body pursuant to section 986). Bonds issued under this section shall be in such form, mature at such time or times, bear interest at such rate or rates, be issued and sold in such manner, and contain such other terms, covenants, and conditions as the redevelopment agency shall, by resolution determine. Such bonds shall be fully negotiable, shall not be included in computing the aggregate indebtedness of the municipality, and shall not be subject to the provisions of any other law or charter relating to the issuance or sale of bonds. As used in this section, "bonds" shall mean any bonds (including refunding bonds, notes, interim certificates, debentures, or other obligations) of the Municipality which are payable and the following is substituted in lieu thereof:

Sec. 986. Federal and Local Assistance. For the purpose of carrying out or administering a redevelopment plan or other functions authorized under this chapter, a municipality acting by and through its redevelopment agency, may accept grants, advances, loans, or other financial assistance from the Federal Government, the State, or other source, and may do any and all things necessary or desirable to secure such financial aid. To assist any redevelopment project located in the area in which it is authorized to act, any public body (including the State, or any city, town, county, village, borough, board, commission, authority, district, subdivision, or agency of the State) may, upon such terms as it may determine, furnish services or facilities, provide property, land or contribute funds, and take any other action of a character which it is authorized to perform for other purposes. To obtain funds for the purpose of furnishing financial assistance to its redevelopment agency, a municipality may, in addition to other action authorized under this chapter or other law, levy taxes and issue and sell its bonds or other obligations, provided that any such bonds or obligations issued by a municipality pursuant to this section shall be in
