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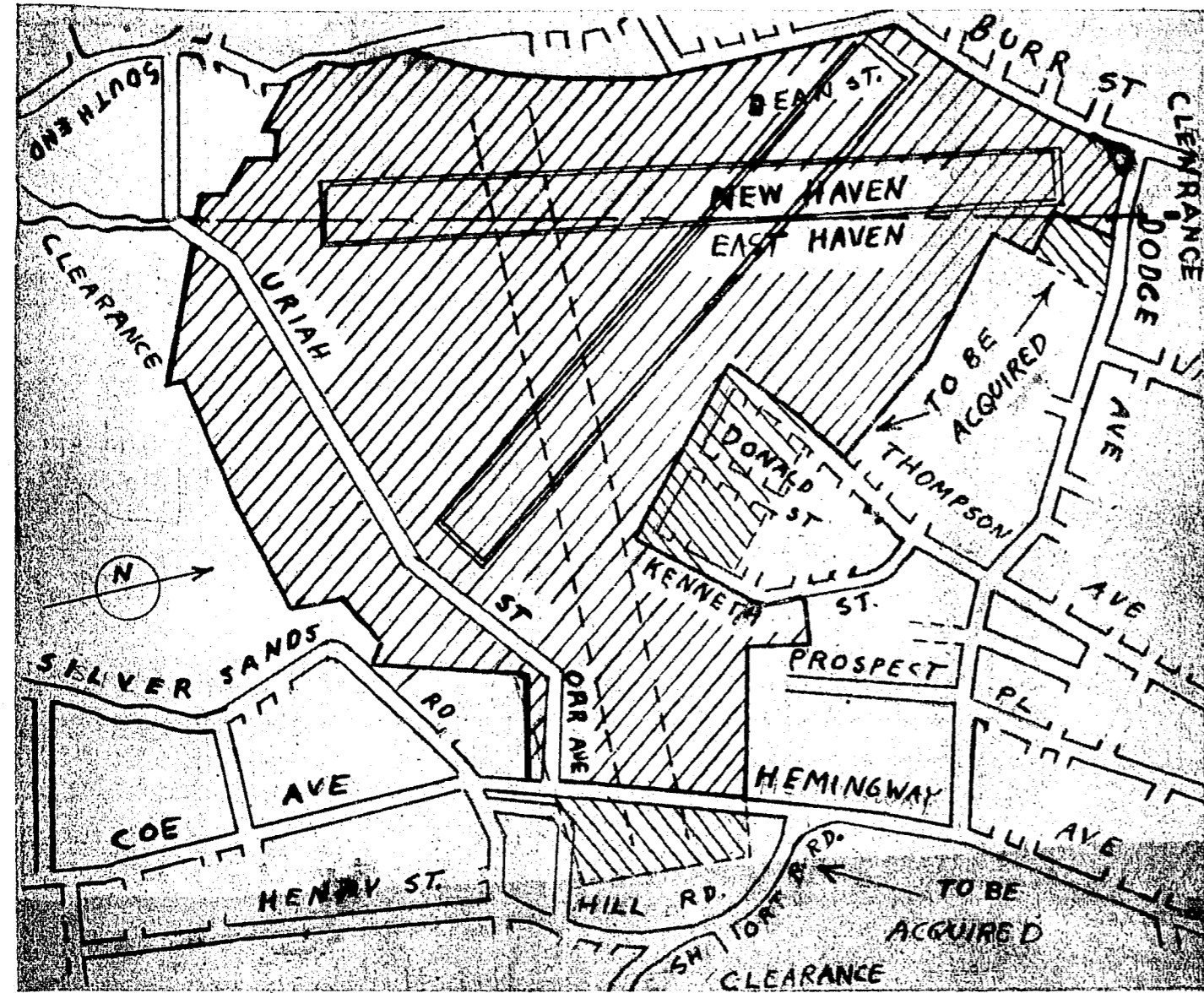

### LeRoy Jordan Named Cancer Drive Chairman

LeRoy Jordan, of 116 Kimberly Ave., has been appointed Chairman of the East Haven Cancer Drive by Charles E. Ebersol, state campaign chairman for the American Cancer Society, Connecticut Division.

The new chairman announced the appointment, in turn, of an executive committee, whose duty it will be to strive to attain the \$2,200 goal set for East Haven.

Named to the committee were Miss Elizabeth Chupkovich, Mrs. James E. Waery, John Kneeton, Mrs. Frank Barker, Mrs. Alfred Holcombe and Benjamin Goodman.

Jordan is associated with the Norden Associates, contractors of East Haven, as business agent and serves in a similar capacity with J. C. Casella, contractors of New Haven. He also conducts a general real estate business.

He is married to the former Ruth Schmidt, of Hazelton, Pa. and has been a resident of East Haven for the past five years.

The local cancer committee has met on several occasions to plan methods for the collection of funds. Chairman Jordan has already appeared before several local organizations including Momauguin PTA, the Mission Society of the Old Stone Church and St. Claire's Guild of Momauguin. He will also present talks illustrated with pictures on the fight against cancer in appearances soon before the Gerrish Avenue and Chills PTAs.

### Taxes Due By Sunday Tax Collector Says

Tax Collector Herman Hachbarth reminded the public this week that tax bills on automobiles, realty and other property are due on Sunday, Mar. 15. The tax office is open from 9 a. m. to 12 noon on Saturdays.

Hachbarth said also that a 30 day grace period is allowed so that penalties are not imposed until after April 15.

Estimated revenue from the new 20 mill tax, on the taxable grand list amounts to \$839,127.78.

### Local Chamber Of Commerce Leads Fight On Bills

Announcement of the naming of a committee of five, headed by former State Senator William Jaspers, whose principal purpose will be to forestall further encroachment of the Municipal Airport on East Haven property was made yesterday by First Selectman Frank A. Barker.

The appointments were made in quick order after the local Chamber of Commerce voted Tuesday night to request the Selectmen to set up such a committee to study the "proposed Master plan" of the New Haven Airport Commission.

The Chamber members present voted unanimously in favor of the resolution after hearing a special committee report that the proposed expansion of the airport would be detrimental to the Town of East Haven.

Committee Named

Other members of the committee named yesterday by Selectman Barker were: John Gould, Desmond Coyle, Town Engineer Charles H. Miller, and Herman Scharf, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

State Rep. Adelbert Mautte, who appeared as a guest speaker, and observed, urged the Chamber to attend the hearings on the state bills over which they were concerned. Expressing his own opposition and that of his House colleague, Mrs. Elizabeth Cronney, in the Senate bills in question, Mautte urged a strong turn-out of local citizens at the hearings on the bills in Hartford. He said that the hearing was scheduled for Thursday, March 20 at 2 p. m.

Mautte told the Chamber "it is very necessary that these people appear before this hearing. 'I do feel,' he said, 'that if the townspeople go before this committee and express their feelings, I think they will do all right.'

"The Republican state representative, who is a member of the Aviation Committee hearing this bill, stated that he felt virtual condemnation powers 'may destroy industrial sites and prevent the reconstruction of structures in the flight paths.'

Petitions Discussed

In addition to requesting the town to name a committee, which will direct official town opposition to state legislation which would grant airport authorities virtual powers of condemnation over nearby communities, the Chamber Tuesday night discussed the possibility of having petitions protesting such legislation placed in stores for signing by local citizens.

The action came after a special committee, headed by Robert Schirmer, reported that it had "come to the conclusion" that the Chamber of Commerce should oppose Senate Bills 611 and 646. Senate Bill 611 would grant to state airport authorities the power of condemnation over nearby communities with or without their consent.

The committee advanced a list of reasons for opposing these bills which would enable the New Haven Airport Commission to proceed with plans for acquiring additional East Haven property and securing regulatory powers over property in the glide paths of the runways.

The committee denounced the bill as granting the commission power to acquire certain lands "by automatic condemnation."

The committee stated that the acquisition by the airport would force the town to "lose considerable taxable property." "At this time or in the immediate future," the report said, "the town cannot afford to lose any property now listed on the grand list."

The special committee also noted that Coe Ave. would be cut off and that a direct route from the town center to the shore area would interfere with quick service from the central fire station and that other additional apparatus would be required or else the rebuying the road would need to be undertaken at great expense.

The committee went on to say that "there is adequate land in the Morris Cove area within the boundaries of the City of New Haven which can be used to complete this program (of airport expansion)."

It pointed out that the town was now in financial difficulties because of needs of schools, sewers and other facilities and that it could not afford to contribute to the Airport.

### No Red Cross Drive This Month—Taken Care Of Last Oct.

East Haven residents are experiencing March without the customary Red Cross financial campaign. It's Red Cross month around the nation but in Greater New Haven there is no Red Cross campaign.

This is a benefit derived from the October Key Drive when Red Cross took part in a joint campaign with the United Fund.

Red Cross officials said communities which were not covered by the Key Drive organization would hold the customary campaign this month.

With no need for a March campaign in East Haven, New Haven, Hamden, West Haven and Woodbridge, many volunteers who would be active collectors are working to recruit blood donors.

Bertram Williams, executive director of the United Fund, said this month without a Red Cross campaign, points up dramatically the theory of a federated drive.

"The United Fund-Red Cross campaign included some 32 former Community Chest agencies and 14 other local and national agencies and causes. Without the federated drive and its principle of one generous gift, once a year, the citizenry would still be having a Community Chest campaign and a dozen or more appeals," he said.

## Gartland Reiterates Stand Opposing Junior High Plan

Notice of continued opposition to the 6-3-3 or junior high school plan adopted last year by the Board of Education was registered this week by Democratic Town Chairman James F. Gartland.

In a statement released to the press, Gartland singled out George Letis and Burton Reed, of the school board, to repeat a former charge that they were advancing the junior high plan against the wishes of the townspeople.

Gartland stated that the plan had been defeated by the fact that it was tabled at a town meeting last July 28 and he appeared to maintaining that the 8-4, or grammar school — high school, plan was substituted by the townspeople instead. However, it is contended, the resolution that was tabled merely would approve a Board of Education recommendation for the acquisition of 20 acres of land as the site for a junior high school. Accompanying resolutions, which were part of the call, were voted with slight amendments.

In addition, it is held that only the Board of Education has the power to initiate plans which the town meeting can only approve or disapprove.

Motion Merely Postponed

First Selectman Frank A. Barker said yesterday that "regular parliamentary law states that a motion that is tabled is merely put aside and can be taken down at anytime and acted upon."

Gartland also expressed wonder over what Letis, who is chairman of the so-called School Sites Committee, was referring to when he said he would "take steps to buy what land is needed if it (the committee) is told by the School Board what the program will be."

Letis told a recent meeting of the Board of Education that his committee could not proceed without a definite decision on the part of the board. Also, this week, he released a statement saying that a preliminary report would soon be made on the availability of land near the Grove Tuttle, Highland, Laurel and Union schools.

Neither Reed who initiated a school board move to study the relative costs of the two plans nor Letis would comment on Gartland's statement.

## Cold Wave Has No Effect On Grass Fire 'Business' Here

Despite the recent wave of cold weather things were hot for East Haven firemen this past week as they were called out on 13 grass fires and several building conflagrations.

Many of the grass fires were started by faulty incinerators and Chief Thomas J. Hayes issued a plea to town residents to cover these burners with wire mesh of not larger opening than one inch square. "If this was done," Hayes said, "we wouldn't be hit with all these grass fires." "It may happen that we may find ourselves behind the eight ball when something really serious happens," he said.

## Sites Committee Has Preliminary Report Ready

Near completion of a "preliminary report" on findings of the so-called Sites Committee with respect to the availability of land in the Grove-Tuttle, Highland, Laurel and Union school areas was revealed this week in a statement by George Letis, chairman of the committee.

The chairman stated in an announcement released by his committee that it would be ready to continue its work after a school building program is completed by the Board of Education. The board recently voted to have the Committees on Buildings and on Schools to prepare estimated costs under the 6-3-3 plan, or junior high previously adopted by the board, and the 8-4 or elementary — high school plan.

The Sites Committee, which was originally designated by the name "Elementary School Building Committee", expected to submit a report to the Board of Selectmen within the next few days.

The committee's statement as follows:

A meeting of the Elementary School Building Committee, known as the 'Sites Committee' was held in February. All members were present. This meeting was called to draft a report to the Board of Selectmen on the availability of land in the Grove-Tuttle, Highland, Laurel and Union areas in compliance with voted motions of the Special Town Meeting held on August 18, 1952. The report will be submitted to the Selectmen's office within the week.

It was decided that the report could only be preliminary in its scope inasmuch as any actual purchase of property in these areas is dependent upon a school building program which to date has not been drafted by the Board of Education.

The committee is ready to continue work immediately upon the completion of a school building program by the Board of Education.

America's Role In World Affairs—II Immigration

Few statutes passed by Congress in recent years have evoked such wide spread criticism as the McCarran Immigration Act. Representatives of all the major religious groups—Protestant, Catholic and Jewish—and of industry and labor have condemned it. President Eisenhower has asked Congress to revise this law. This major anti-immigration law is likely to die in committee unless there is sufficient interest and concern on the part of the American people. This, in turn, depends upon how well informed we are about the answers to two questions: First, what's wrong with the new immigration law? Second, what difference does it make anyway?

After the McCarran Act was passed last June, a special committee composed of prominent Americans was created to study this legislation and the whole problem of immigration and naturalization. It called upon more than 600 witnesses and experts for assistance. The findings of this committee have recently been published.

The Immigration Law is criticized, first of all, because it opens the door to the fallacious concept that racial and national groups are inferior to others. It does this by setting quotas, nation by nation. To some favored nations, such as England, France, Germany, Italy, Canada and Australia, large quotas are given. For other nations, such as Eastern and South Eastern Europe, the quotas are very small. The criticism is not that this country sets an overall limit on immigration, but that the quota is allocated in a discriminatory and undemocratic fashion. We rightly reject Hitler and his Nazi-race theories, yet we are in danger of accepting the same philosophy of competition of our immigration policy. We ought to decide how many persons we are prepared to admit each year and then fill up that quota with individuals by the basis of personal fitness and desirability rather than by the inadequate and unfair test of national background.

This discrimination prevents us from doing what we ought to do in relieving the pressure of displaced persons in Europe. That pressure does not come from England, France, Germany, Italy, Canada and Australia, who have received the big quotas. The immigration is from the least favored nations and the least favored nations are inferior and unwanted. It is a disgrace to judge a man on the basis of his "personal credentials" and "qualifications" but impose the test of nationality and race.

It is hard to measure the damage done to our position in Europe by this law. It is estimated that the Middle East and Far East by this law. A single statute like this can undo the good accomplished by billions spent in foreign aid and can undermine our international leadership.

There are other features of this law. The Act is apparently drawn on the assumption that the citizens of the favored nations are racially superior and desirable and those of the less favored nations are inferior and unwanted. Count Heinrich von Einsiedel says in "I Joined the Russians," a book published by the Yale University Press, that the Soviets are so afraid of an all out war they cannot plan to win.

The former German Luftwaffe ace, who hosted 65 detainees before being shot down and captured near Stalingrad in 1942, also explains why he dropped Communism only to renounce it after five years.
